restriction of the application of the reclamation law to tracts of 160 acres owned by any one person.

Those who ask for the amendment proposed in the resolution insist that in Oregon and California especially it will be impossible to secure cooperation by landowners under the present law. There are many persons who own more than 160 acres in every large tract it is proposed to reclaim and these, it is alleged will not consent to dispose of their excess holdings, hence they will block the reclamation of immense areas of land that otherwise would soon be under water.

It is believed that this issue will create the main contest in the present congress, and some interesting debates are looked for before the resolution committee and the congress when the report of the committee is submitted.

### WOMEN IN POLITICS.

Public Service Helps a Woman to be Better.

Mrs. Adella B. Scott of Idaho says politics does not detract from the home-loving qualities of a woman but rather adds to them. Mrs. Scott has held many positions and has been benefitted by her experience.

"A woman can be a better mother for being in politics. Woman's attention to politics does not mean woman's neglect of home. Politics is a school an education of a woman."

That is the opinion of Mrs. Adella B. Scott, official hostess of the Idaho building at the fair, and she is competent to speak, says the Portland Journal. Mrs. Scott is perhaps the most prominent woman in Idaho and her political record is enough to place her in the front ranks of the women of the country. She was the first woman in Idaho elected to office outside of the educational department and was on the Idaho Falls school board eight years, and was clerk five years.

For two years she was justice of the peace, so some people call her judge. She declined a nomination but was soon after appointed by the county commissioners to the position she had refused to compete for.

Then when the police judge's chair became empty she was asked by the mayor to sit there, and last fall she was elected county treasurer of Blinnham County. But through it all she has kept her head and she says that her political experience has benefited her.

"Of course," she says, "I have felt a great responsibility, sometimes in holding office, for I knew that I owed a duty to those who had enough confidence in me to elect me. But I know it has done me much good and given me a broader view of life."

"A woman should study politics more than she ordinarily does. She ought to know the government under which she is ruled and woman suffrage obliges her to study it. I knew very little about political subjects formerly, but when I became interested in equal suffrage I studied them."

"My father was a democrat, and so I had always called myself one, but when I studied the platforms the republican appealed to me as being better and I have since been one. My father used to say to me that a son or daughter need not be a horse thief because the father was. But that does not mean that my father was a horse thief, or that democrats are, either."

Mrs. Scott is a delightful woman, and all who know her in the Idaho building are charmed with her manner.

### THE COST OF SALOONS.

Seven Thousand Dollars Saved to the People by Closing Beer Halls One Sunday.

The following letter written to the Kansas City Star, states clearly the enormous cost of intemperance, from a financial standpoint:

To the Star: In St. Louis this week an attorney close to the liquor interests told me that Busch says the "lid on" in St. Louis is costing him over \$7000 every Sunday. If that is the cost to one brewery in one city, what must be the saving in the entire state to the people, and how much must it mean to people in legitimate lines of trade? This money is, of course, actually saved, for the Sunday demand, not being then supplied, cannot be supplied another day, for that demand has died—and Governor Folk is certainly entitled to great credit.

## BACK TO SAVAGERY

### EDUCATED NEGRO CHIEF OF DEVIL WORSHIPPERS.

Rev. Daniel F. Wilbur Colored, De-  
serts the Ministry for a Savage  
Tribe in Africa—Most Remarkable  
Case of Answering the Call of the  
Wild on Record—Was Highly Ed-  
ucated and Followed Lecturing for  
Several Years.

The Rev. Daniel Flickinger Wil-  
berforce has answered the last call of  
the wild in the forests of West Afri-  
ca, where he was born a savage, later  
removed to America and edu-  
cated as a Christian missionary, only  
to return to his native country to re-  
sume a life of heathenism and be-  
come a chief of the Devil Worship-  
ers.

Private advices received at Hunt-  
ington, Ind., in a private letter from  
Missionary Stullis, at Freeton, West  
Africa, state that Dr. Wilberforce  
died in the tribal settlement of the  
natives; but the date and circum-  
stances of his end are not revealed.

The story of Wilberforce offers a  
rare opportunity for the study of psy-  
chology. Forty-five years ago the Rev.  
Daniel Flickinger, missionary of the  
United Brethren in Christ, was in  
Africa on a missionary errand when a  
little negro boy was born and he was  
asked to name him. He suggested  
the name of Daniel Flickinger Wil-  
berforce, and at the same time prayed  
that the youngster would grow up  
with some of the religious spirit that  
animated the famous Bishop Wilber-  
force.

Twelve years later Dr. Flickinger  
ran across this very same negro boy  
in New York where he was brought  
by a missionary to be educated, but  
was cast adrift soon after his arrival,  
through the death of this mission-  
ary.

From that day Mr. Flickinger un-  
dertook to educate the boy. He sent  
him to public schools at Dayton,  
Ohio, and later to Wilberforce Uni-  
versity, from which institution he left  
a full-fledged minister of the church.

A year later the young negro mar-  
ried a respected negress of Dayton,  
by whom he had four children. Two  
sons are being educated at Ottenbein  
University in Ohio. They are excep-  
tionally bright boys.

Taking his two daughters and wife  
the young black minister returned to  
Africa to do missionary work among  
the natives. He achieved great suc-  
cess at first and made many con-  
verts, although many aborigines did  
not take kindly to his efforts. He re-  
turned to America for a lecture tour  
in behalf of the missions, and after  
collecting funds resumed his duties  
among the Africans.

It was then that the call of the  
wild came to him as it did to the dog-  
hero of Jack London's book. It was  
subtle calling him back to heathen-  
ism. He was invited because of his  
position by birth to become chief of  
the tribe of Devil Worshipers. He  
yielded, cast off the obligations of  
Christianity and led their war dances  
and fetish practices.

When the missionary board of the  
United Brethren in Christ Church  
heard of the missionary's desertion  
he was dropped from the rolls of the  
church and pronounced a religious  
outcast.

But Wilberforce was far from the  
reach of letters of excommunication,  
and, perhaps, never heard of the  
board's action.

He took five wives and soon be-  
came as savage as the wildest native.  
He had answered the call of that wild  
nature that was inborn and which  
neither religion nor education nor the  
refinements of culture could over-  
come. And as such he died.

### RECLAIM MORE LAND.

Tract of 12,000 Acres to be Irrigated  
in Idaho.

Pat Gallagher of Pocatello, who  
came to Boise to attend the wedding  
of his brother, Mervin Gallagher, and  
Miss Grace Lindsay, says hopes are  
now entertained that a tract of about  
12,000 acres of land adjacent to Po-  
catello will be put under water in a  
short time, says the Boise States-  
man.

There are two plans under consid-  
eration. One contemplates the con-  
struction of a 50-mile canal from the  
Snake river. The other has in view  
the utilization of the government's  
Blackfoot river reservoir site and the  
building of about 35 miles of canal.  
"The construction of either system  
would mean a great deal to Pocatello,"  
said Mr. Gallagher. "The Gate City  
has long suffered because it had  
no agricultural country around it.  
With 12,000 acres of land under cul-  
tivation the city would be given an  
additional resource of the highest  
value that, coupled with the railroad,  
mining and stock interests, would  
cause it to increase rapidly in popu-  
lation and valuation."
