Elmer Turner, who received a severe injury to a finger some time ago, submitted to an amputation of the member yesterday, as it had failed to heal properly and was crooked from the injury.

### Oregon Lumber to China.

United States Consul General Sammons of Niu Chwang, writes that the first American sailing vessel to enter that port arrived there April 22. The vessel is a five-masted schooner named "Crescent," and she carried 1,555,899 feet of lumber from Blakely, Wash., which lumber is known locally as Oregon pine. The Crescent reached Niu Chwang by way of Taku.

The voyage occupied 70 days from Puget Sound to the Bay of Pechili. The Crescent's registered tonnage is 1334 tons. Having a draft of 21 feet, the schooner was obliged to lighten cargo in order to cross the bar at the entrance of Lao river. She was drawing 21 feet, and when lightened to 19 feet, sailed inside the bar and was towed to Niu Chwang.

The consul says that as a rule American goods reach Niu Chwang via Japanese or Chinese ports, although vessels drawing from 16 to 19 feet according to the season, can cross the bar with safety, and once inside the bar there is ample depth of water to the docks or anchorage at Niu Chwang.

As a rule, goods shipped direct arrive in much better condition than when subjected to handling and re-shipping through other ports. This season the Standard Oil company will send three cargoes of kerosene oil direct to Niu Chwang from Philadelphia via the Suez canal.

### CONTINUANCE GRANTED.

Aged Embezzler is in Bad Shape With Heart Disease.  
San Francisco, Aug. 23.—Death may have saved the aged Jacob Eppinger, ex-grain king, who is alleged to have swindled local banks out of \$700,000, from wearing stripes. When his case was called before Judge Lawler this morning, the attorney for the defendant requested a continuance on the ground his client is in a critical condition as a result heart trouble, and a tedious trial would certainly result fatally. A continuance was granted until August 28.

### Five Cars Watermelons.

Five cars of Walla Walla grown watermelons will be shipped out tonight over the O. R. & N. by the Blacklock Fruit Company, says the Walla Walla Statesman. This is believed to be the largest single shipment ever made out of Walla Walla and establishes the fact that Walla Walla can compete with any of the new irrigated fruit sections. Orders enough for five carloads were received between Saturday and yesterday and growers were instructed to rush their melons into the commission house as fast as possible.

### Prune Crop Is Good.

Notwithstanding the frequent statements by people who are not posted, and by others who are none too careful in their statements, to the effect that the Oregon prune crop is a failure this year, such is not the case.
