CAR OF HORSES BURNED.

Car Took Fire Near Caldwell and Attendant Barely Escaped Alive.

Boise, Aug. 29. (Special.)—Word comes from Caldwell that a carload of horses and household goods was burned between Caldwell and Parma on Saturday evening, the man traveling with the car to attend to the needs of the animals barely escaped with his life. A man from Caldwell, so the story goes, had loaded the car with his domestic effects and included in it eight fine draft horses. With these effects he started for the west, to establish himself in a new location. The train of which this car was a part had hardly started, however, when the car took fire. The inmate finally attracted the attention of the train crew, and the car was set out upon the first sidetrack at Parma, but it was then all ablaze, and none of the horses nor any of the other property in the car could be taken from it.

TWENTY DROWNED.

Freight Steamer Goes Down With Nearly All the Crew.

Jacksonville, Fla., Aug. 28.—The American steamship Peconic, from Philadelphia to New Orleans with coal, in a gale at midnight, sank, carrying down 20 of a crew of 22. Two survivors reached Amelia Island at noon. The survivors are a Spaniard and an Italian. A heavy gale shifted the cargo in the ship to a 66 lead and she listed and sank.

INDEMNITY PROPOSED.

China Will Be Given an Opportunity to Buy the Concession.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 29.—The president this afternoon issued this statement: "After a full discussion with J. P. Morgan, it is decided to offer that the Chinese government pay \$4,750,000 indemnity for the cancellation of the contract for building the Hankow-Canton railway."

Washington, Aug. 29.—The comptroller of the currency has called for a national bank statement to August 25.

WARNER REMAINS HERE.

Popular M. E. Minister Assigned to Pendleton Church for Next Year.

Rev. Robert Warner, who has been pastor of the M. E. church in this city for several years, has been assigned to this city for the coming year. The announcements of the church assignments were made at Moscow last evening, after the close of the conference, which was held there last week.

Rev. Walton Skipworth, of The Dalles, was elected presiding elder of this district in place of Rev. Booth, deceased. Rev. Skipworth was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Rev. Booth and was unanimously elected to the position at the meeting of the conference.

YAKIMA SUGAR BEETS.

Tests Already Made May Lead to Building a Sugar Factory.

A fine lot of sugar beets grown in the experimental gardens in this vicinity this year came to the office of G. S. Rankin yesterday, and Mr. Rankin and others who have been interested in the proposition to establish a beet sugar factory here feel greatly encouraged, says the Yakima Republic. In fact, they have almost reached the conclusion that this is a sugar beet country of the best kind.

Early in the season many of the gardens seemed to be suffering from a peculiar blight. The conclusion was reached that beet culture was too hazardous to be tried here, and the attempt to locate a factory at North Yakima was practically abandoned as a consequence. Today the feeling is that it is worth while to renew the attempt.

Dead Man Found.

Butte, Mont., Aug. 29.—George A. Reed, a woodchopper, missing since early in June, was found murdered yesterday, near Phillipsburg. He had been shot, and earth piled over the corpse and a tree felled over a rude grave. Robbery is believed to be the motive.
