STABBING AT NORTH POWDER.

Frank Murray Badly Injures William Pearson.

A stabbing affray in which Frank Murray probably fatally wounded William Pearson occurred Saturday night in a saloon at North Powder. The trouble started between Murray and Pearson over some drunken difficulty and finally led to blows. Murray is a small man and seeing that he was getting the worst of the fight it is said, drew a small pocket knife that he carried, and plunged the blade into Pearson's left breast.

At this period the police and bystanders interfered and pulled Murray off just in time to prevent him doing Pearson any further injury. He was taken to jail immediately after by the officers.

Pearson is in a very critical condition and fears are entertained for his recovery. An examination shows that the knife penetrated to within half an inch of the heart. The blow was struck a little above the left nipple, ranging downward.

It is said that Pearson is a large man, and somewhat of a bully, and that he was in the most part responsible for the trouble.—Baker City Herald.

Shortage of Labor.

Discussing the labor situation, Mr. Brandon, contractor on the Riparian-Lewis branch said: "We have been compelled to turn 120 horses shipped to Riparia into the pasture for lack of men to handle them, and I have delayed the shipment of other horses for a period from California. We have now about 142 head at work, but when the work is under good headway we will use about 500 head. I have been shipping in men from Spokane, Pendleton and Portland, but many have preferred to go into the harvest field. We will continue to ship men for the work on the road and when the harvest season closes there will probably be a flood of labor in this field."

Nez Perce Grain Fire.

Karl Baldus had six stacks of headed wheat destroyed by fire at his place east of town. It was the cutting of 40 acres and would have averaged about 40 bushels to the acre. The fire started in the stubble about 100 yards from the stacks and is supposed to have originated from children playing with matches. It was only by desperate efforts that the house and barn were saved.

Billie Baldus saw the fire from the field where he was working, about half a mile away, and after running the entire distance fell in a faint in the burnt stubble. The smoke and the excitement under which they were laboring trying to save the buildings kept the others from seeing him and he was not found until Mart Malmoe arrived on the scene. He was still unconscious, and after being carried into the house it was some time before he was brought to. The grain was not insured and is quite a loss to Mr. Baldus.—Nez Perce Herald.

Buggy Blown Over and Leg Broken. Yesterday afternoon while coming down Fox hill with his wife and Albert Hunter and family, the wind blew so hard as to lift the vehicle out of the track and upset it, resulting in Fred Holmes, of the Island City M. & Co., receiving a fractured leg. He was brought to the office of Bacon & Hall, where he received the proper attention. The fracture was in the left ankle and will be necessarily quite painful for some time. He was taken to his home at Island City in the evening.—La Grande Observer.

Last evening Webster A. Chandler, son of the above, and formerly of this city, stopped over here for a visit with his father. He is on his way east, where he will locate and practice law.

Returned From Hunting Trip.

Mr. and Mrs. George Hartman, Jr., returned this morning from Astoria, where they have been visiting for some weeks past. From there Mr. and Mrs. Hartman went with a camping party into the Nehalem country south of Astoria, and in the Coast range mountains. They were in a splendid fishing and hunting region, and several deer were killed by members of the party.

In Police Court.

In the police court this morning E. J. McCarthy was given a sentence of \$5 or three days for being drunk, and George Smith was given \$8 or four days for disorderly conduct. The latter was arrested by Marshal Coffman yesterday evening, while he was trying to open up hostilities with a Chinaman.

YOUNG GIRL DRUNK

SIXTEEN-YEAR-OLD UMATILLA FELL FROM HER HORSE.

Disgusting Scene on Webb Street Last Evening—Indian Girl Only a Mere Child, But so Beastly Drunk That She Could Not Ride, Although Tied to Her Horse—Hauled to the Reservation in a Wagon.

"Isn't it a burning disgrace?" "What a terrible shame!" "To think that white men are responsible for it."

"What can be done to stop this terrible evil?" These and other like expressions were made by a crowd of women which gathered in Webb street last evening where a 16-year-old Indian girl had fallen from her horse, in a beastly state of intoxication.

The girl, in company with several other Umatillas started from town for the reservation about 7 o'clock last evening and while passing along Webb street near the Thompson street crossing, fell from her horse to the ground. She was replaced on her horse, but was too drunk to ride and after being tied to her saddle fell to the ground again, and was finally placed in a wagon which passed, and was taken to her home.

As it happened, two saloonmen were the only white men in the crowd that gathered around the girl at first, and while they were assisting the girl into the wagon, they listened to the remarks above quoted from the bystanders.

The girl was only 16 years of age and is an intelligent and comely girl. She is not large for her age, and one man picked her up and placed her in the wagon. Several of the Indian men accompanying her were also intoxicated. They had been in the city all day and were known to have received whiskey during the afternoon.

LABOR DAY PROCLAMATION.

Governor Chamberlain Issues Order for General Holiday.

Governor Chamberlain has issued the following proclamation for the observance of Labor Day on Monday, September 4:

Whereas, the first Monday in September of each year has been designated by law as a legal holiday to be known as Labor Day, now, therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, governor of Oregon, make public proclamation of the fact that Monday, the fourth day of September, 1905, be set apart as a legal holiday to rest from ordinary labors. The present friendly relations between labor and capital in our splendid commonwealth should be maintained in order for a continuance of the prosperity which our people enjoy.

To assist in prolonging this much desired condition, I earnestly pray that all business on that day, thus set apart, and that employer and employee will meet in social and friendly intercourse, thereby coming into closer touch and relationship each with the other and becoming better acquainted with the industrial life and condition of the whole people.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state to be affixed thereto.

Done at the capitol, in the city of Salem, this 25th day of August, A. D. 1905.

BOUGHT AN INTEREST.

W. E. Brock Has Sold Out to A. J. McAllister of This Place.

Some time ago a contract between Manager Taylor and Mr. McAllister was entered into whereby the sale of seats for the coming year should be left under the charge of the latter. At that time it was announced that the seats would be on sale at the Donaldson pharmacy, but owing to the recent change by Mr. McAllister the headquarters will be at the Brock & McComas store.

DEFFRY COMING.

House and Barn Burned.

The forest fire which had been raging in the foothill timber skirting High valley, which lies four miles south of Cove, was carried north over the ridge into the Cove range yesterday and had the wind not changed to the north the damage would have been very great. At one time the fire was within one quarter of a mile of the power station of the Grand Ronde Electric power station. It did burn the house and barn of George White about one and one-half miles from the Cove postoffice. This fire has destroyed a great deal of good timber and while at present it is not scattering, and wind is liable to make it a menace to the farmers in the vicinity.—La Grande Observer.

Population of Culeasac.

An official census report was taken this week by J. F. Edwards and it was found that our town numbers 632 souls, including men, women and children. Mr. Edwards made a thorough and exhaustive house to house canvass of the town and while the report is not official, it can be depended on as being pretty nearly correct.

"The above figure includes only the actual residents of our town. There are at present a number of people living here who have come for only a short period and will leave in the next few months, but these were not counted."—Culeasac Register.

Caught in the Storm.

When the dust storm came up Sunday afternoon the families of C. B. Lyman, Conductor W. H. Kelsay, Claud Paxson and several guests from Missouri, were enjoying a picnic on the Umatilla river east of the city. They were forced to take shelter under the huge cottonwood trees, and for a time trees were being blown down all around them, but fortunately the one under which they sought refuge, stood. They all declare that it was a most exciting time for a few moments while monster trees were being uprooted on all sides.

Severe Storm at Weston.

County Commissioner Horace Walker, who was at Weston Sunday afternoon at the time of the dust storm, has returned home. He says the storm was very severe in that district, but little damage was done. Grain was not shattered and very little injury was done to other property in that vicinity. The heavier soil at Weston made the thick dust more suffocating than here. Mr. Walker says that very little threshing has been done on Weston mountain yet and at least 10 days will be required to finish the harvest in that district.

May Move to Baker City.

Mrs. Hattie Stanfield, one of the extensive property owners of Pendleton, has been in Baker City for the past few days looking over the city with a view to investing in property here and making this place her home. The excessive hot weather of Pendleton during the summer is not very desirable. Mrs. Stanfield was greatly impressed with Baker City and likes the pure, cold water that is furnished by the city.—Baker City Herald.

School Janitors Selected.

Janitors for the different school buildings in the city have been named by the board, and work of getting the buildings ready for the opening of school will begin on September 1. Those appointed to these positions are as follows: T. M. Lowe, high school building and North Side building; W. C. Thompson for the East End building, and Bert Wisdom for the West End.

Indians Trying to Get Home.

Word has been received on the reservation that the Umatillas now with the wild west show at Grand Rapids, Mich., are heartily sick of their jobs and are making every effort to get back to the reservation. Money will be sent some of the members of the party, from here, but several who are in Grand Rapids will not be able to draw on friends here but will have to remain there until they earn enough to buy a ticket to Oregon.

Moved Back to Town.

C. H. Olcott and family have moved back to the city for the winter from the farm near Pilot Rock. They have been on the farm since early last spring. Mr. Olcott raised a good crop of hay and his cattle have done remarkably well this season.
