GENERAL NEWS.

Since the present outbreak of cholera at Manila there have been 40 cases developed of which 25 were fatal.

Mrs. Mary Emily Donelson Wilcox is dead at Washington, aged 75 years. She was a grand niece of Andrew Jackson and the first child born in the White House.

The new postoffice building at San Francisco has been formally opened under the auspices of the various commercial bodies and is ready for official occupancy.

The new coast artillery post at Point Bonita, commands the entrance to San Francisco harbor completely. Three hundred thousand dollars has been expended upon it.

Baron Kaneko makes the statement that Japan sees the war at a close with an untouched war fund of \$150,000,000 which will be immediately diverted to other purposes.

Gen. W. W. Blackmar, late commander in chief of the G. A. R., left \$2,000 to Nancy L. Creel of Louisville, Ky., because her mother nursed Blackmar when he lay wounded during the civil war.

The hurricane of August 26th did considerable damage to the hop crop in the Yakima district. George Kerr's 20 acre yard near Moxee got the full force of the wind and was blown level with the ground.

Thievery in the country districts near Warsaw, Poland, has reached the proportions of brigandage. The farmers have organized vigilance committees and killed 11 thieves and captured 50 others.

At Chicago Lieutenant William Mayer of the fire department, was suffocated while attempting the rescue of four children at a fire. The children were saved, but Mayer was dragged out dead.

Over 1,000 telegraphers are met in annual reunion in New York. All are members of either the old time telegraphers' and historical association, or the United States signal service department. The meeting is purely a fraternal gathering.

A faint aurora borealis has been seen at different points all the way from Duluth to Spokane, and from this appearance so much earlier in the season that ever before, it is predicted that the coming winter will be uncommonly severe.

Baron Komura and Mr. Takahira attended a garden party given at York, Maine, near Portsmouth. Learning that the proceeds were to go to the York hospital, the two Japanese promptly gave \$1,000 to the hospital. The money will be used to endow two beds.

At Butte someone attempted to kill Joseph Welfelt by exploding a large quantity of dynamite under the corner of his cabin, where he usually slept. That day, however, he had moved his bed and though the cabin was wrecked, Welfelt was practically unharmed.

IDENTIFY BAD MEN

FINGER PRINTS OF ALL PRISONERS TO BE TAKEN.

F. P. Daniels Tells the East Oregonian of New Method of Identification of Criminals Being Adopted at San Quentin Prison—Prison Reform Workers Speak Well of Oregon Prison Conditions.

So urgent has become the need of a certain identification of dangerous criminals that every state is striving to find a new and infallible method.

F. P. Daniels of Brooklyn, N. Y., a well known prison reform worker and student of criminology, who spent last night in the city on his way from San Quentin, Cal., to Walla Walla, says that California officials are now adopting at San Quentin prison, the DePue finger print system of identification, by which it is said to be impossible to make a mistake in the identity of a criminal.

Mr. Daniels attended the recent meeting of Charities and Correction society in Portland and visited the Oregon penitentiary a few weeks ago in the study of prison methods. He found conditions at the Oregon prison to be highly commendable and many degrees better than in eastern prisons, which he visits in his work of reform.

In speaking of the DePue method of identification Mr. Daniel said to the East Oregonian:

"The system includes the method of F. H. DePue, formerly a turnkey at Folsom, which has been used in connection with the Bertillon for years. With the imprint of the fingers on paper and the DePue cross-section photograph a criminal once listed can always be identified. There is no change in finger prints.

"Each of the prisoners was brought into the identification room at San Quentin and the fingers were inked, one at a time, and the imprints made arranged according to number. After the fingers had been imprinted the four fingers of each hand were imprinted together, so if a difficulty is later experienced in deciphering those taken separately a microscopic examination of the four will determine to which hand any other belongs.

"The prisoner's name and number is placed on the identification slip, and with it his photograph is filed. In this way, it is asserted by DePue, there can be no possible chance for a criminal being mistaken once he is subjected to the system.

"After the use of the DePue finger print method has been established the Bertillon system, first installed on the coast at San Quentin, will be abolished. Apparatus has been procured, so it will not be long until this takes place.

"The finger print method of identification was first employed by the Chinese 700 years before Christ, and is the method used in Scotland Yard work. It has been a success in all criminal work because of its infallibility, as the experts assert, once the corrugations of skin are formed on a finger there will be no change through life.

"A recent case of the success of the system was recorded in the return of two French criminals to Paris after they had fled to London, by comparing the finger prints found on a wine bottle used by the men in committing a murder in a Paris cafe. The incident excited interest of criminologists all over the world and may have been material in causing the establishment of the method in California prisons.

"As soon as the records are completed at San Quentin DePue and his assistants will put the Folsom prisoners through the same process."

After More Water at Baker City. W. O. Reynolds, city water superintendent, was in yesterday from the pipe line construction now in progress on Big Salmon and Marble creeks. He has thirty men in two camps pushing the work to a completion. It will be two and possibly three weeks before the work is completed. In the meantime from one stream he has turned in about six inches of water. This, with the prevailing cool nights, has made it possible to resume street sprinkling from the various street stands instead of taking a part of the supply from an irrigation ditch.

Mr. Reynolds says that with the completion of the present source of supply the driest season will find the city with a supply sufficient for all purposes. The city owns other rights which can be made to more than double the present supply when required.—Baker City Democrat.

Fires on Mount Jefferson. The forest fires have afforded a grand spectacle to the people of Madras and vicinity. There has been a fierce forest fire raging on the south side of Mt. Jefferson for the last two weeks, which is visible every evening. When it first began, it would burn up to some height in some very light,

dry material, and it looked like red fire, and then die down again. This would be repeated several times, which brought to the minds of several there a statement in the Portland papers of the Mt. Hood mystery. But now it is a large steady blaze, destroying much timber.—The Dalles Chronicle.

TO OLD MEXICO.

Dayton Party Will Investigate Land Grant of 150,000 Acres.

A party consisting of Judge M. M. Goodmann, George N. Baker and W. H. Richardson of Dayton, were in the city last evening on their way to the western part of Old Mexico.

They will be joined in San Francisco by F. C. Stevens of Pomeroy, and all will take the steamer next Saturday from that city to their destination, the city of Acapulco.

They are making the trip for the purpose of looking at a tract of 150,000 acres of land embraced in an old Mexican grant. If the land is as represented, and other conditions suit the gentlemen, they may interest themselves in the formation of a company for the purpose of purchasing the land.

They expect to be gone for six weeks or two months and will extend their journey to the City of Mexico for the purpose of investigating the titles to the land. They will provide themselves with a complete camping outfit at San Francisco and will be supplied with horses and burros at Acapulco to enable them to travel at their leisure over the land and examine it most thoroughly.

The land is represented to them as being very productive and is suitable for raising cotton, sugar cane, corn and tobacco. It is now being cultivated in a very primitive manner by the native peons, and they predict that the introduction of American energy and methods will work a revelation in the productiveness of the country.
