Amish People Coming West.

A. H. Candland, the Union Pacific emigration agent is in the city with a party of nine representatives of an Amish colony, from Illinois. These people are looking over the west with the intention of finding a suitable location for a colony. They have been over several days and have looked over the valley quite thoroughly, and state that they are well satisfied with the appearance of the Grand Ronde but will look at the country around Portland and also go up to Albany, where there already is an Amish settlement.

An Observer representative called at the hotel and endeavored to learn something of the Amish religion, but about all that could be learned was that their creed is somewhat similar to the German Lutherans, and that four years ago, the entire sect numbered about 48,000 members. The sect is largely composed of farmers, and there is no question but that they would make a valuable addition to our population.—La Grande Observer.

Fire Destroyed Everything.

Sunday afternoon, while the storm was at its height, a forest fire destroyed the home and contents of Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Montgomery who reside on their homestead about seven miles northwest of this city. At the time the fire reached the home, the family were out fighting the fire and attempting to save their property, but the gale was so strong that they were unable to contend against the flames, and barely escaped with the clothing which they wore. They lost everything including their wearing apparel. The family consists of Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery and a little girl two years old and a boy four years of age.—Baker City Herald.

Homing Pigeons Released.

J. A. Whitty this afternoon at 1:15 o'clock released four homing pigeons which he brought from The Dalles this morning, from in front of the Observer office for the birds to return to their home. The pigeons be-

long to Samuel Wilkinson, of that city who raises them as a hobby and who watches them with interest in making these flights. The birds when released from the box flew close to the ground to the south for a few blocks then circled and wheeled to the west going directly towards The Dalles. They made another circle higher up to get their bearings and then disappeared over the hills west of the Gangloff place going directly towards their home.

One of the birds was brought to the city about a year ago and made the flight although it took him two weeks to make the journey. Others have been taken to Baker City and Kamela and released, both making the trips in a much shorter time.—La Grande Observer.

Joseph Stanford, who was the chairman of the Ogden district school board or education for many years, and an ardent supporter of the Ogden choir on their trip to Portland, stated in his public remarks that the man who laid the foundation and fostered the cause of music, was none other than Prof. L. D. Edwards, that silent musician of south Baker, who was the first to teach vocal music in the Ogden district school, and continued for ten years.
