GENERAL NEWS.

A special organization of police has been effected in Spain to watch and manage the anarchists, of whom there is an increasing number every year.

At present 500 persons are solely occupied on the Isthmus of Panama at fumigating and other sanitary measures that are not in the line of engineering or sewerage.

A Swiss expedition to reach the highest point of the Himalayas has met with disaster, an avalanche having overwhelmed Lieutenant Bache and a party of scientists.

By the end of 1906 there will be \$50,000,000 cash in sight in the treasury of Ireland with which to facilitate the work of buying out the landlords for the small tenants.

At Hammond, near Ottawa, Canada, a wreck of the Imperial Limited resulted in the death of Engineer John Gaffney and greater or less injury of eight other persons.

President Paul Morton, of the Equitable society, has succeeded in cutting down expenses \$500,000 per year, and declares he will have that beaten before he has had charge a year.

William Kelly, the oldest convict in Sing Sing prison, celebrated his 81st birthday on Sunday by giving a reception to the other convicts. He was sentenced for life 34 years ago for murder.

Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria has strongly favored general suffrage in Hungary, but has been forced to abandon it because it would bring about revolution in other parts of the empire.

The present administration in Spain has been sustained by an overwhelming majority in the recent elections, which are regarded even in that country as a farce. There were many disorders on election day.

William Hilburn has returned to his old home at Mobile, Ala., being the sole survivor of 17 American engineers and trestle builders who left Pensacola, Fla., in August, 1902, to work on the Cape to Cairo railroad, near the Zambezi river.

William Van Brimer, an inmate of the Leavenworth Soldiers' Home, a veteran of company H, fourth Ohio infantry, and who recently fell heir to \$200,000 by the death of an uncle in Holland, has died suddenly of heart disease in a hotel at Leavenworth.

Word has been sent out from the central government that all lotteries in the republic of Mexico must quit business. The franchise held by the Loteria de la Beneficencia Publica expires in a year and will not be renewed. The National lottery, now under the government control, will be put out of business as well, and all forms of business by chance are to be suppressed.

Near Elgin, Ill., Andrew and John Fohrman, old men and brothers, who lived alone, were overpowered by robbers who demanded money. They gave them \$300 and declared they had no more. They were tortured by having their feet burned, until both fainted from agony, but the robbers had the limit of money on the premises and got no more. The Fohrman brothers are wealthy, but keep little money about them. One of the Fohrmans will die from shock.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

There is much trouble along the lower Columbia with fish poachers, and many illegal traps have lately been destroyed. Arrests will follow.

Federal Judge C. H. Hanford, at Seattle, has rendered a decision which credits all federal prisoners with 10 days per month for unexceptional behavior.

D. A. Martin, an old time miner of Burke, Idaho, was suddenly and accountably stricken dumb, and can find no relief. He is not otherwise afflicted in any way.

William Frost went on a protracted drunk at Butte. He beat his wife and finally tried to cut her throat with a razor, which was the limit. She blew his head from his shoulders with a shotgun.

Eugene voted on two propositions—one to issue bonds for a municipal lighting plant, the other to bond the city for municipal water works. Both carried, by 504 to 163, and 501 to 162 respectively.

The three little sons of W. S. Borrowsman, of Port Angeles, Wash., while at play ignited a quantity of kerosene. The oldest escaped. The two younger, aged 2 and 3, were burned to death.

The Idaho state wagon road commission has the contract for 40 miles of road between Boise and Atlanta. Charles Story will do the work for \$25,000. The city of Boise defrays half the expense.

A gasoline cleaner exploded in a Hoquiam, Wash., cleaning and dyeing works and Charles Hague and A. Stroyer were badly burned. The building and equipment were lost by the resultant fire.

The entire town of Salem, near Grant's Pass, has been destroyed by forest fire. It consisted of a hotel, two stores, blacksmith shop, church and several residences. Loss, \$15,000. Very little insurance.

Seattle will soon vote on a proposition to issue \$500,000 bonds for the erection of two new high school buildings. The total school enrollment of Seattle is now 15,906, which is nearly 1000 more than one year ago.

The Italians of Portland raised \$1,000 with which to celebrate "Italian Day," September 20, at the fair. The celebration has been abandoned and the money will be sent to the earthquake sufferers of Culebra province, Italy.

Heppner's Wheat Crop.
It is estimated that Heppner will receive about 100,000 bushels of wheat this season. This will be about 25,000 bushels short of last year. The shortage is accounted for by the fact that the acreage was smaller this year than last. As the grain is being threshed yields are turning out fully as well as last year and the quality of the wheat is somewhat better than usual. There are yet thousands of acres of the best wheat lands in Morrow county in the vicinity of Heppner that have never been plowed. The time will soon be here when this land will all be farmed and Heppner will be a big wheat shipping point.

NEW BRASS BAND.

The Convicts at the State Penitentiary Organize a Band.

There are nearly 400 men there, and will be more than 400 soon, when the courts get down to business with their fall terms. There is not a man in the hospital, excepting a colored prisoner who is suffering from tuberculosis, which assures he had before coming here. There are three women prisoners, two being kept in one department reserved for women, and one, a bad one from the colored "bad lands" of Portland, being kept locked up by herself. Some weeks ago Ben Selling of Portland donated some band instruments to the prisoners. Warden Curtis bought some more, and the prisoners purchased others from a special fund of their own. Now there is a band with 15 instruments, composed of prisoners. They have been practicing for about a month, and they already make very good music, though only one or two of them have before played in bands. Four are serving life sentences. The best prisoners in the penitentiary are the lifetimers, and the ones who are serving sentences for manslaughter. These are generally not born criminals. They may be called accidental criminals. Under the same circumstances and surroundings, with the same training, many men who are thought of as good men might have done the same as they did.—Salem Statesman.

BROKE JAIL AT HEPPNER.

Beat His Wife, Went to Jail, Escaped, and is Recaptured on Butte Creek.

Fred Fehrman, who resides in the mountains beyond Hardman, and who was arrested last week charged with wife-beating, broke jail last Saturday night but was recaptured Sunday evening by Sheriff Shutt. Fehrman was taken before Judge White's last Friday and waived examination. He was placed under \$500 bonds which he was unable to furnish and was placed in the county jail to await the action of the grand jury. Fehrman, who is an inoffensive looking German, protested against being placed in the steel cell of the county jail and said that he had no desire to break out. But he was only playing possum. Saturday night he succeeded in breaking a sharp piece of iron from a closet which he successfully used as a chisel in prying the plaster from the stone wall of jail.

After clearing away the plaster he commenced to dig away at the mortar in the wall of the jail. Getting a stick of wood he hammered a rock loose in the wall and finally succeeded in making a hole large enough to crawl out. When Deputy Hill entered the jail Sunday morning he was confronted with a ray of sunshine shining through what was formerly supposed to be an impenetrable inclosure, instead of a hungry prisoner. After getting out Fehrman made lively tracks toward Butte creek in attempting to get away. In his shoes were some large hobnails that betrayed his foot steps. He was tracked to Butte creek and was found in a clump of brush by Sheriff Shutt, quickly resting on some blankets that he had stolen from the jail. As he had made a good walk and seemed to be fond of this kind of exercise Sheriff Shutt invited him to walk back to Heppner. He is confined in a steel cell where it will not be such an easy matter to dig out.—Heppner Gazette.
