

# AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

**Bound, Gagged and Robbed.**  
J. N. Scott was bound, gagged and robbed Thursday night in his store. Two men effected entrance at one of the rear windows and had a gun on him when he awoke. While one held the gun on him the other tied him with belts and suspenders, put a gag in his mouth, then rolled him in all the bedding they could find. They then opened the safe from which they secured nothing. They went through his clothes and secured his watch and \$25 in money and departed. Mr. Scott finally worked the gag out of his mouth, but could not raise anybody and was compelled to lie there bound and nearly suffocated until the carpenters who are building an addition to the rear of his store came to work about 7 o'clock in the morning. On account of the roaring wind last night he did not hear them until they had effected an entrance and had covered him with the gun. There is no clue and their detection is unlikely.—Kennewick Courier.

**Held-up in Nampa.**  
Another hold-up has occurred in Nampa. This time the victim was J. J. Dye, who was relieved of 147 by two thugs on the railroad right of way near the pump house. From their method of procedure it is believed the two men were professionals. They picked up Dye on Front street, strangled him and marched him to a dark spot along the railroad, where they robbed him of his money. Dye says both of the men were very large and one of them was a foreigner. The officers are working on the case, but no arrests have yet been made.—Nampa Leader.

**A "Dead Easy" Was Overlooked.**  
Regardless of the fact that he had \$1240.50 in his inside pocket, a man was stretched out in a drunken sleep in the alley to the rear of Michelbach's saloon last evening, when Marshal Wood found him and conducted him to the city jail, which was at least a safer safe in which to deposit his money.—The Dalles Chronicle.

**Terrible Injury in a Well.**  
While at the bottom of a 50-foot well William Winder met with a very serious accident this morning. In some way the bucket filled with earth and gravel became detached from the rope and fell a distance of 30 feet, striking him on the left shoulder and breaking loose from the spine all but two of the ribs on the left side. It

was with difficulty that he was removed from the well and afterward taken to his home. It is feared that his injuries may prove fatal.—Salubria (Idaho) News-Letter.

**Chased Over a Mile.**  
After an exciting chase of more than a mile, and taking a shot at his man before he could induce him to stop, Officer Merrill this morning succeeded in capturing Sam Shaffer, a young man of 24 years, wanted in the justice court for assault with a dangerous weapon on a Chinaman near the city.—Baker City Herald.

**Under Federal Warrants.**  
Six of the bootleggers who were arrested here Sunday and today will be tried in the federal court on the charge of violating the federal revenue law. They will be turned over to the county authorities to be held till the federal court is ready to take up their case.—North Yakima Republic.

**Verdict in Wool Case.**  
In the circuit court the jury in the case of A. P. Smith & Son vs. S. A. Hellner, after being out until 1 o'clock last night, brought in a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$2344.32. This was an action to recover payment on 15,999 pounds of wool which the plaintiffs claim to have delivered to S. A. Hellner.—Baker City Herald.

**Securing Right of Way.**  
P. A. Worthington, the right of way agent of the O. R. & N. company, was in this city yesterday. He is securing right of way through Wallowa canyon and with the exception of three or four cases, has the deals closed for the right of way as far up as Wallowa.—Enterprise Chieflain.

**New La Grande School House.**  
Contractor Slater has a force of 12 at work on the new school house and this force will be increased just as fast as the material can be delivered. He commenced yesterday on the stone foundation and quite a showing has already been made.—La Grande Observer.

**Crook County Cattle Deals.**  
G. W. Noble, A. J. Noble and Meyer & Brown of the Paulina district, turned off a bunch of cattle last week. The Nobles sold 100 head and the latter firm a small bunch to Walt Brown of Izeo. The price paid for 3 and 4-year-olds was \$20, dry cows bringing \$17.—Crook County Journal.

**Annulment of Existing Franchises Is Possible.**  
New York, Sept. 27.—The Board of Trade and Transportation is holding a meeting here today to consider a report which has been prepared by its executive committee regarding the city's control of its passenger transit service. It is the opinion of the committee, as expressed in the report, that the city should have the power to take back its grants of franchises to railway corporations and substitute short term grants, revocable at its pleasure on payment of stated indemnity. The committee thinks that the subway to be constructed in the city will dominate and control the present subway, and the surface and elevated lines as well. The committee recommends that the mayor, at the beginning of the next session of the legislature, and before the city shall grant additional transit franchises, shall demand that the legislature amend the Rapid Transit law as to give the rapid transit commission powers to separate contracts for construction from operating contracts; to provide for pipe galleries; to contract for operating periods of less than 25 years; and to enable the city to avail itself, if need be, of the power of municipal operation.

**DOMINION EXPOSITION.**  
Open for 10 Days at New Westminster, B. C.  
New Westminster, B. C., Sept. 27.—The great Dominion exhibition was opened here today in the presence of thousands of visitors from all parts of the Dominion. Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada, and his staff, arrived here yesterday and will attend the formal opening of the fair this afternoon. Nearly 12,000 Indians from different parts of the province have come here to see the governor-general and pay him their respects. The exhibition will close on October 7. Among the special attractions will be a big lacrosse tournament, a baseball tournament and a big regatta on the river. Stansbury who recently defeated Towns for the single sculling championship of the world, and his defeated opponent, have been invited for a race which promises to attract many visitors from all parts of the country. It is probable that Scholla, the crack oarsman from the United States, will also take part in some of the racing events. The town is crowded with visitors and the capacity of the hotels is taxed to the utmost.
