## WATER WHEEL A SUCCESS.

J. S. Mathews Has Completed All Details of an Irrigation Wheel and Will Place it on the Market.

J. S. Mathews, the veteran pump man and foreman in the service of the O. R. & N. has just completed an irrigation wheel, which he will make an effort to place on the market. The East Oregonian gave a description of the wheel a year ago, but Mr. Mathews has improved it and is now certain of its success.

The wheel consists of a tight drum, anchored under the water and revolved by the current. The drum will either float on top of a stream or will work equally well under water. It is fitted with wings which open as the current strikes them, thus giving the wheel an extended surface for the water to strike in producing power.

The wheel can be used in lifting water, generating electricity or in driving machinery and is one of the simplest yet most practical appliances yet invented.

He will make arrangements to place several in operation in the Dead Ox Flat irrigation district in Idaho, and has every assurance that the wheels when anchored in Snake river will generate sufficient power to solve the problem of lifting water for irrigation purposes so cheaply that it will be within the reach of even the smallest irrigator.

Wheels can be made to suit any stream, no matter how small a quantity of water it may contain, if the water runs in a current swift enough to turn the wheel. It seems to be one of the most practical and efficient methods of irrigation yet invented.

# NEW CLASS HAS 50

RANQUET WILL FOLLOW INITIATION MONDAY.

Eagles Expect to Take in Another Class of Fifty When They Move Into the New Hall on November 15—This Will Give the Order an Approximate Membership of Five Hundred in Pendleton—Eagles' Lodge Room is Engaged for Every Night Except Sunday.

With the approaching completion of the new Eagles' building some lively times are being planned by the members of the local aerie. On next Monday night a class of 50 new members will be initiated into the order, the meeting being held in Hendricks' hall. Following the initiatory work a social time and banquet will be given. Also, it is expected that when the aerie moves into the new hall on November 15 another class of similar size will be taken in. Should this be done, the membership of the local aerie will be raised to 500, as there are now 400 members enrolled and the coming class will make the membership 450.

The Eagles' building has now been rented with the exception of one room, the one at the west corner. Of the other two rooms on the ground floor, the center one has been taken by Messrs. Lawrence & Aston for a saloon, while the Siebert room has been rented to John Gagen for saloon purposes.

The lodge room upstairs has been rented for every night in the week excepting Sunday. On Saturday evening the hall will be used by Carl Guoit, Ben Burroughs and Thomas Milarly for dances, while the other five nights have been taken by lodges as follows: Monday, Woodmen; Tuesday, Redmen; Wednesday, Knights of Pythias; Thursday, Elks; Friday, Eagles.

Yesterday afternoon the last of the money was secured for the purpose of paying for the building. Six thousand dollars is the amount that was needed, and it was raised by popular subscription around the city, the money being given as a loan at 7 per cent. The money was secured yesterday by a committee consisting of A. C. Koepfen, Frank O'Hara, Roy Ritter and J. T. Hinkle.

## FOUR WERE CAUGHT.

Smooth Female Swindler Makes a Clean Getaway.

Four local mercantile houses were caught by the bogus check woman who operated here Saturday evening, the fourth being the Peoples Warehouse. However, the latter fact was not discovered by the employes of the latter store until towards evening yesterday. As each check was written for exactly the same amount, and was made out in identically the same manner excepting the numbers, there is no doubt but that the whole affair was a swindle. In all practically \$100 was cleaned up by the woman within a short time, for she made but light purchases at the various places.

Of the four firms that took the checks the Teutsch store is the only one where the fraud was suspected at once. Not over 10 minutes after the woman had left it was learned that no such person as Fred Martin had an account at the Savings bank, and Messrs. Dindinger and Livingood of the store started in search of the woman. However, no trace could be secured of her, and although the train that evening was watched, she was not seen to go aboard, and not a glimpse of her has been seen to this time.

## Hawaiian Trip Contest.

The winner in the contest will be given an absolutely free trip to the Hawaiian islands next February, by the Journal. The party will consist of about 18 girls who will win in the contest, accompanied by some capable woman companion and chaperon.

## Adding Electrical Apparatus.

George Strand, the well known high school student and football player, is once more enrolled in the school here, much to the joy of his fellow students who regretted the prospect of losing him to Whitman. It is said that Strand will play as halfback on the eleven this year, and will certainly greatly strengthen the back field.

## Spicer Estate Appraised.

Yesterday afternoon a report was filed by the appraiser of the estate of Leslie Spicer. No will was left by the deceased, and the personal property of the estate was found to be valued at between \$2000 and \$3000. The appraisers were J. M. Hemphill, James Hawke and Fred Geinger.

## Died While Visiting Here.

Samuel P. Williams of Chicago, who has been visiting in this county since last June, died at the residence of his nephew, Frank Brotherton, several miles from Helix, Monday. He was 79 years of age and suffered for years with a liver trouble which caused his death.

## Will Sing in Germany.

Miss Ina Wright, daughter of W. T. Wright of the First National bank of Union, has just signed a contract as court singer for a period of three years in Germany. Miss Wright has been in Germany studying music for a number of years and will leave again soon for that country.

# BAY CITY TIRES OF GAMBLING.

San Francisco Making an Effort to Crush the Evil.

The following from the San Francisco Examiner shows that the anti-gambling crusade is now on in that city:

"Mike" Golden, proprietor, and one MacGregor, employe, of the notorious "Moorish Palace," at 112 Market street, which was closed last Wednesday through the efforts of the Examiner, are preparing to do their utmost to evade a verdict of guilty when they are brought to trial for operating a gambling game.

Golden and MacGregor were arrested at the instance of A. R. Hawkins, the young business man who secured evidence against the "sure thing" den and then swore to the warrants for the arrest of those operating the place.

The case of Golden was called in Judge Frita's court yesterday, but upon the application of Golden's attorney a continuance was granted until Monday morning and notification given that the defendant would demand a jury trial.

In the meantime every influence that the accused men can muster is being brought to bear upon Hawkins to get him to drop the case. Although Mr. Hawkins is confident that he has enough evidence to secure a verdict of guilty, it would greatly help matters if any persons who have lost money in the place since it opened would appear in Judge Frita's court Monday morning and give their testimony as to the nature of the place and of the gambling game operated there.

## SPRAYING LIVESTOCK.

Machine Invented to Supersede Dipping Vats.

A spraying machine has recently been put on the market in Colorado the purpose of which is to spray livestock, instead of dipping, as in the past, says the Farmers' Sentinel.

According to a description furnished by an exchange, this machine stands on its own wheels and is practically a covered tank, the floor of which is a moving sidewalk. The stock are driven by a chute at one end and pass through a tank down another chute. After being run up the chute the animals have no chance to balk, because the moving sidewalk carries them right on through. On the way through the tank they are doused with a spray from 250 jets, each with three holes placed on all sides of the interior. The spray is under eighty pounds pressure, and drenches the animal to the skin.

The machine is operated by a traction engine and may be moved over the country from one bunch of cattle to another, just as threshing machines are moved in the farming districts. The spray is similar to the dips used for years past, composed of Beaumont oil, lime, sulphur, etc.

The work of spraying may be carried on rapidly, as an animal can be passed through in 30 seconds. The first extensive test of the machine is to be made at Corona, Colo., on a bunch of 75,000 head of range cattle.

The owners charge from 15 to 25 cents a head for spraying, according to the size of the bunch, and they purpose to operate the machines in that way rather than sell them outright. The cost of constructing the machine is given at \$2,000.

## OBJECT TO ASSESSMENT.

Twin Falls Land Company Thinks it Should Be Exempt.

E. B. Critchlow is in the city from Twin Falls to attend to business in the federal court, said the Boise Statesman. He stated last evening the Twin Falls Land & Water company would go into court to contest the assessment of its canal in Cassia county. The canal was assessed at \$500,000. A protest was filed with the board, but the assessment stands on the rolls.

The ground upon which the assessment will be contested is that the project is a state enterprise, the company being merely the agent of the latter. These lands are granted to the state by the general government, the former contracting to reclaim them. The state entered into a contract with the canal company to erect the necessary works for placing water on the land, and the entire project remains under the direct direction of the state. Under these circumstances, it is held, the canal works cannot be legally assessed. Mr. Critchlow has briefed the subject and will go into the courts for a decision.

If the courts should decide the assessment is not legal, it would leave Cassia county in an awkward predicament. The assessment of the state for the year has been equalized and the apportionment is made on last year's assessment, but the assessment of this year will have to be used next year in making the apportionment, and if the assessment should be knocked out, the remainder of the property of the county would have to make up the proportion of state taxes represented by the invalidated assessment, unless it were found the state board were authorized to take cognizance of the decision.

Thirty-Six Registered Today. At 3 o'clock this afternoon 633 had registered for the coming city election, there having been 26 registered up to that hour today. Should this rate be maintained until the time of closing, it is probable that today will break the record for number of registrations.

## Suit to Quiet Title.

Suit was started today in the circuit court by J. B. Despain against Carrie A. Sheurman and Arnold A. Sheurman, infants, to clear a cloud from the plaintiff's title to lots 6 and 7, in block C of South Pendleton.
