### MERCANTILE COMPANY.

#### Build and Engage in Business at Echo if Deal Carries Through.

Negotiations are now on between Charles H. Miller, of Echo, and Fred T. George, a dry goods dealer of Arlington, for the formation of a company to start a store in Echo in place of the one burned down there a few weeks ago. Should the deal be consummated, another building will be erected on the location of the old one, and the business will be conducted as before, though with an entirely new stock.

The burned building was the property of J. H. Koontz, of Echo, and plans for a new structure are now being prepared here by Architect C. E. Troutman. The new building as designed is to be 50x90, one story, with a full basement. The material will be lumber and the building will be plastered inside and out, thus making it fire-proof and a decided addition to the town.

#### City Engineer Under Fire.

The committee appointed to investigate the suggestion of irregularities in the office of Engineer Sietz, reported that they had made quite an extensive investigation and that the evidence was conflicting. That they had asked for his resignation which they handed the council as a part of their report.

Mr. Sietz, who was present, after securing permission to address the council, asked for a complete exoneration of the charges of bribery, that if the council saw fit to discharge him for incompetency he wouldn't object, as that would be simply a question of opinion, but in so much as he had not been permitted to meet with the committee as a whole he had had no opportunity to offer his side of the question.

After a few remarks the matter was passed and no further action was taken beyond the filing of the report of the committee.—La Grande Observer.

#### New Plant for the Highland.

The last load of machinery for the new mill and plant at the Highland mine was hauled to camp 16 miles west of Baker City yesterday and Manager Neil J. Sorenson says he will have the new mill and power plant completed at once.

This property, as is well known, has a large body of high grade ore blocked out for reduction and when the machinery can be put in commission another dividend payer will add that much to the laurels of the Baker City mining camp.—Baker City Democrat.
