Probable Explanation of Shortages in Clerk's Office.

No new developments, of any consequence at least, have come to light today regarding the alleged irregularities in the county clerk's office. No statement would be made by the experts other than to reaffirm what was said yesterday that the evidence was such as to show there was no criminal intention on the part of anyone, and also that subsequent findings might set matters to rights. According to court house employees it has been expected all the time that the experts would find that sufficient filing charges had not been made in the clerk's office, and that small shortages would be found as a result. Frank Saling, the present incumbent, is said to have estimated some time ago that he would be found \$25 or \$30 short during his term. ### TWO WERE DROWNED.

Man Who Jumped in the Boat and a Woman Were Drowned.

Portland, Oct. 3.—While two men and a woman were attempting to row ashore in a skiff from a sailboat anchored near the east end of the Madison street bridge about 9 o'clock last night, the boat overturned and James E. Shannon, aged 32, employed at Ben Salling's clothing store, and Miss Julia Bond, a young woman said to be a friend of Shannon's, were drowned.

Mr. Shannon and Miss Bond were members of a party of seven who left the city yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock to sail up the Willamette river. They were returning and while four members of the party took in the sail, Tom Driawell embarked with Miss Bond in a skiff and prepared to row her to the shore. Shannon insisted on accompanying the couple. Heedless of the warning from his friends that the frail boat would not hold more than two persons, Shannon made a leap into the skiff just as it left the sailboat, which caused it to capsize. It filled with water and sank immediately. Both Shannon and Miss Bond were unable to swim. Driawell, an expert swimmer, made a desperate but futile effort to save the girl. Jack Mantz, another of the party, swam to the aid of the drowning couple, and he nearly lost his life.
