SPENT \$20,000,000

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES GOT ONE-HALF.

Some of the Portland Hostelrys Turned Guests Away—The Guests Averaged Six Days Each, and They Spent an Average of \$5.50 Per Day—Estimated That 75 Per Cent of the People of Umatilla and 90 Per Cent of Morrow Visited the Fair.

Visitors from out of town during the period of the Lewis and Clark exposition spent \$20,000,000 in Portland, according to figures and estimates from reliable authorities, says the Oregon Daily Journal. Of this vast amount of money, it is likely that hotel and boarding house keepers got half.

The four largest hotels of this city in the four and one-half months of the fair gave 127,635 days' accommodations to 31,919 persons, who paid them \$791,400 for the service, and these same visitors, according to estimates, expended as much more in other ways in the city; so that the conclusion is reached after careful inquiry among the proprietors of the four hotels referred to that the 31,919 guests that they entertained expended while here \$1,582,800, almost all of which remains in circulation.

Portland Turned Them Away.

"The Portland hotel," said H. C. Bowers, manager, "gave 60,000 days' accommodations to guests during the exposition. This was an average of more than 400 a day for the 135 days the exposition lasted.

"In my opinion the average actual living expenses were \$5 a day, and that more than that amount was spent for souvenirs and curios and in the various ways tourists have of enjoying themselves. The average stay of the guests was four days."

Basing the calculations upon Mr. Bowers' figures, the result is reached that Portland hotel guests spent in the city during the fair \$750,000, of which \$300,000 was for living expenses and \$450,000 for extras.

Mr. Bowers thought the patronage this summer was double that of a year ago during the same months and that the Portland turned away at least 5000 persons who could not be accommodated. Of these about 5000 went to the American Inn.

Average Stay Six Days.

The Oregon, according to Chief Clerk Mr. Brinstad, "and I am sure" says accommodations during the fair, an average of 201 a day.

"My estimate on the daily actual expenses of these guests would be \$5.50," said Mr. Brinstad, "and I am sure they spent as much more in other ways. Their average stay was about six days."

Clerk Brinstad's figures show that Oregon's guests spent \$298,455, of which half, \$149,227.50, was for living expenses and the other half for souvenirs and other incidentals. At the Imperial hotel, the clerks recorded a total of 26,250 days' accommodations at the rate of \$10 a day.

"I would guess \$4 a day as the average actual living expenses," said Chief Clerk Ladd, "and that \$4 a day would not more than cover the incidental expenses."

For the guests of the Imperial, therefore, the total expenses during the exposition were \$210,500, of which half, \$105,250, was for incidentals.

What the Perkins Did.

At the Perkins hotel figures were given by Chief Clerk Thompson, who said that the average number of persons accommodated a day was 300, which would make for the entire fair period 40,500.

"Every day," said Mr. Thompson, "these people spent \$4 a day for rooms and meals and not less than \$4 for other things."

For that hotel, therefore, the total if money expended by its guests for all purposes was \$324,000, of which \$162,000 was for expenses other than living.

These figures show for the four hotels mentioned \$1,582,800 left in Portland.

Big Four Got One-Sixth.

To determine the amount of money paid to other hotels and boarding houses would be impossible. Only approximate estimates could be made; but it is safe to assume that the four hotels from which statements were obtained accommodated not more than one-sixth of the strangers who visited the fair, which would indicate that close to \$10,000,000 was left in Portland in payment for living expenses and the purchase of goods and souvenirs.

George W. Proebstel a merchant of Weston, stated that he with other business men of Umatilla county had made careful estimates of the number of people who came to the fair from that region, and that they believed it was not less than 75 per cent of the population.

"People not acquainted with conditions in the interior would not believe the truth. One can scarcely find a person there who was not at the fair for a week, and often families who for years had lived economically, spent several hundred dollars. I really believe that our county spent \$750,000 in Portland this summer."

How Morrow County Came.

J. A. Woolery, lone, Morrow county merchant, stated that there was an attendance from his region of almost 90 per cent.

"Why," said he, "every one came and spent lots of money. I could cite numerous instances of families accustomed to live modestly at home who came here, having drawn from the lone bank \$100 apiece, and then sent from Portland for more money."

"All these people bought their winter clothing in Portland, and seeing many things that were new to them bought articles to the aggregate of thousands and thousands of dollars' worth, which we home merchants

This, added to that which was spent by visitors from other states brings the total of money brought to this city during the fair to approximately \$20,000,000.

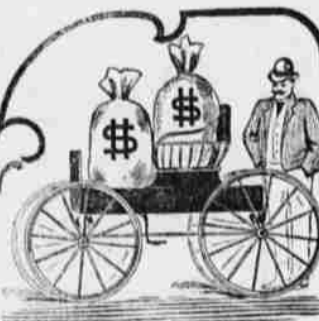
