GENERAL NEWS.

A party of workmen was run down by a switch engine in Buffalo, N. Y. One man was killed and three others fatally injured.

Two ladies—Mrs. John Younek and Mrs. M. Miller—were held up at the point of a pistol by a masked man at Great Falls, Mont. All the money they had—90 cents, was taken.

Frank Wright accidentally shot Cleveland Hood in Chicago while playing hold-up on Halloween night. Both are 13 years of age. Hood was shot with a small pistol near the heart, but may survive.

One result of the failure of the Denver Savings bank has been the closing of the National bank at Kingfisher, O. T. All the collateral of the latter was either owned by the former or held as security.

The last foreign legation guard to leave Korea was the American, which set sail from Chemulpo, October 30. The Japanese are now entirely and solely responsible for the preservation of law and order.

Major John Byrne, aged 69 years, is dead at Larchmont, N. Y. He was a millionaire, early day associate of C. P. Huntington, and organizer in 1896 of the "Democratic Honest Money League of America."

In parts of Australia, where the average rainfall is not more than 10 inches, a square mile of land will support only eight or nine sheep. In Buenos Aires the same area, with 34 inches of rain, supports 2560 sheep.

Charles J. Devlin, the bankrupt millionaire coal operator of Topeka, is dead at a Chicago hospital by paralysis. His failure involved more money and wider outside interests than any bankruptcy that ever occurred in Kansas.

Mrs. Margaret A. Todd, a wealthy widow, aged 76, of New York, was found dead on a railroad track at Philadelphia. Several thousand dollars worth of jewelry which she wore was untouched, but a belt which contained an unknown amount of money, had been taken.

Major L. W. V. Kennon has just finished for the government a wagon road from Manila to Baguio, which cost between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000. The road cost \$75,000 per mile for the last 20 miles. Its total length is but 50 miles. The government may transform it into a railroad.

FIRST BOOK IS OUT

RECLAMATION SERVICE ISSUES
GAUGING REPORTS OF STATE.

Complete Statistics of Stream Gauging in Oregon, Washington and Idaho Under Direction of John T. Whistler, D. W. Ross and T. A. Noble Is Being Circulated—The Report Shows That Seven Gauging Stations Have Been Maintained in Umatilla County.

The reclamation work that has been done in Oregon has been of an educational nature, has developed some valuable statistics and has served to widely advertise the state, and especially the many points at which the various features of the work have been operated.

Bulletin No. 125, being a report of the progress of stream measurements conducted by the reclamation service during the year 1904, and compiled from the report of John T. Whistler, engineer in charge in Oregon, D. W. Ross, engineer in charge in Idaho, and T. A. Noble, engineer in charge in Washington, has just been issued by the department and a copy has been received by the East Oregonian.

This is an exhaustive report, containing all the minute details of the work in the three northwest states and is issued in a book of 3000 pages to be distributed free.

Stream gauging stations have been maintained by the department at seven points in Umatilla county as follows: On the Walla Walla river at Milton and on the South Fork of the Walla Walla, near Milton, and on the Umatilla river at Pendleton, Yorkum, Umatilla and Gibbon and on McKay creek near Pendleton.

Two gauges have been maintained at Pendleton—one on Main street bridge and one on the O. R. & N. railroad bridge just west of the city. All the work in this county has been under the direct supervision of John T. Whistler, district engineer for Oregon.

That part of the work referring to the gauging station in this city is as follows:

"The station was established May 29, 1902, by F. W. Huber. A short distance above the bridge at which the gauge is located water is taken out of the river by the Farmers' mill ditch.

"This ditch carries from 30 to 50 second feet, and at extremely low stages the entire river is diverted into this ditch. The water is returned to the river at a point about 4000 feet below the Main street bridge and about 1500 feet above the railroad bridge at which discharge measurements are made. During 1904 discharge measurements have been made by the geological survey office in Pendleton. The gauge was read only when the flow was normal. Following is a tabulated register of the stream from February 18 to August 14, 1904, first made public at this time: February 18, width of stream at bridge, 100 feet; depth 2.80 feet; mean velocity, 4.20 feet per second; discharge, 1065 second feet. March 7, width of stream, 131 feet; velocity 5.67 feet per second; depth, 4.58 feet; discharge, 2735 second feet.

"March 9, width of stream, 182; velocity, 5.54 feet per second; depth, 6.45 and discharge 5645 second feet. "March 23, width of stream 195 feet; velocity, 4.00 feet per second; depth, 2.95 feet, and discharge, 1430 second feet.

"April 13, width of stream, 191 feet; velocity, 6.86 feet per second; depth, 7.05 feet, and discharge, 5597 second feet.

"May 24, width of stream 101 feet; velocity, 4.16 feet per second; depth, 2.70 feet, and discharge, 1185 second feet.

"May 28, width of stream, 100 feet; velocity, 2.28 feet per second; depth, 1.90 feet, and discharge, 570 second feet.

"June 7, width of stream, 87 feet; velocity, 2.07 feet per second; depth, 2.00 feet, and discharge, 492 second feet.

"July 12, width of stream, 16 feet; velocity, 3.07 feet per second; depth, 1.25 feet, and discharge 6 second feet (with 40 feet subtracted for Walter's mill race.)

"August 14, width of stream 25 feet; velocity, 2.30 feet per second; depth, .95 feet, and discharge, 28 second feet.

"On April 13, the depth of the Umatilla at Pendleton was 7.05; the width 191 feet, and the discharge 5597 second feet, while at Yorkum on that date the discharge was 6575 second feet, or nearly 1000 second feet more than at Pendleton.

"The highest discharge of McKay creek recorded was 1100 second feet on April 12, and the lowest 25 second feet on June 2."

GIRL WILL SERVE TWO YEARS.

Myrtle Tipton Boasted That She Is Too Old for Reform School.

Myrtle Tipton, the 16-year-old girl horse thief who spent last Sunday night in the Walla Walla county jail, will soon arrive in the city again, but she will the next time be in charge of the traveling guards of the penitentiary and will begin the serving of a two-year sentence imposed yesterday by the superior court of Whitman county, says the Walla Walla Union.

The crime for which she will serve time is for bringing stolen property into the state, consisting of three head of horses, a hack and harness, which she stole from some Indians of the Coeur d'Alene reservation on or about the 10th of October, and disposed of them to a liveryman in St. John for \$225. While in the Walla Walla county jail she acknowledged the crime and also pleaded guilty in the superior court of Whitman county when returned there on Monday. She refused to have an attorney, and boasted that she was too old to send to the reform school.

From Missoula to Portland.

A special to the Seattle Post-Intelligencer from St. Paul, says:

"It was learned from high official authority today that the Northern Pacific will surely construct the long-talked-of Clearwater valley extension in Montana and Idaho, which will be, in fact, a line from Missoula, Mont., to Portland, Ore.

Engineers of the road have completed the work of taking elevations and surveying. The new line will begin at Missoula, and run southeast throughout Lolo pass across Bitter Root mountains and connect with the existing Northern Pacific lines at or near Lewiston, Idaho.

Work on the proposed extension will begin probably in the spring, though no definite date is named by the officials of the road.

Its construction will follow the completion of the same company's line from Kootenai to Portland. This Clearwater valley extension has long been a subject of controversy between the Northern Pacific and Union Pacific.

Shooting Range Stock.

The Twin Falls News says: Range cattle and horses are coming down in droves from the hills and devastating

the fields of the farmers west of Twin Falls. The farmers are unable to build fences fast enough to protect their growing crops because fencing material is not to be had. If reports be true scores of range horses have been shot and either killed or maimed by irate farmers whose fields have been ruined. The owners of the horses were unaware of the whereabouts of their animals, else they would have run their stock somewhere else.

Frank Armstrong of Ferry canyon, passed through Fossil Tuesday forenoon, after having bought 1250 ewes from Fred Waters at \$3.50 per head, and 550 mixed lambs from Bradbury & Matthews at \$2.50 per head.—Fossil Journal.
