New Power and Milling Plant.

F. J. Englehorn, who is in charge of the Lolo plant of the Nez Perce Power & Water company, which plant supplies light and power for the town of Nez Perce, was in the city yesterday. Mr. Englehorn reports that the sawmill recently installed at the Lolo will soon begin operations. The mill will have a capacity of 50,000 feet daily and as a fine grade of yellow pine lumber will be turned out it is the plan to ship large quantities to the outside market. With the installation of the mill an auxiliary steam plant will be provided for the electric power plant, the latter having a maximum capacity of 260 horse-power with the creek running at a normal stage. In installing the dam for the power plant, a log storage pond one-half mile in length was made, and this pond will store four million feet of logs. There are now between 300,000 and 400,000 feet of logs in the pond which will be worked up at the initial run of the mill.—Lewiston Tribune.

Woodmen Will Build in Yakima.

The Woodmen of the World will soon commence the erection of the largest public hall building in the city. It will be on the site of the old armory at the corner of South Third and Chestnut streets and will cost about \$25,000 aside from the money placed in the lots, which have been purchased from William Poquette.

The building will have a frontage of 75 feet on Third street and 125 feet on Chestnut street. It will be two stories high. The second story will be divided into two rooms for lodge purposes and the lower floor will be one large room to be used for dances, armory purposes, conventions and any other purpose for which it can be put.—Yakima Daily Republic.

New 40,000-Acre Irrigation Scheme.

CAVE DISCOVERY IN KENTUCKY.

Believed to Be Larger and More Beautiful Than Mammoth Cave.

Glasgow Junction, Ky., Nov. 7.—While investigating the geological formation of this district of Barren county, Dr. Hazen and John Thompson found evidence of the existence of a large cave or subterranean passage. With great caution the two explorers penetrated into the cave. They found it to be of enormous size and ramifying in different directions. They explored one branch to a distance of about 20 miles, when further progress was stopped by a wide and swift-flowing river. As their lights were insufficient to reach the other side of the river, they were not able to judge of its exact width. They returned to this place and obtained material for building a boat or raft, with which they will make an effort to cross the river and explore the cave on the other side. It is believed that the new cave is larger and more beautiful even than Mammoth cave.
