GENERAL NEWS.

Twenty-seven carloads of dressed
turkeys have been shipped from Wa-
co, Texas, since the first day of Octo-
ber.

At Bristol, Conn., a tenement house
occupied by Italians, was burned. All
escaped but five small children, who
were burned to death.

A mob broke into the Henderson,
Texas, jail and took out and hung
John Reese, Robert Askew and an un-
known man, all negroes, accused of
the murder of a farmer.

The first fatal case of yellow fever
in Havana, Cuba, this year, was A.
Zoutwater, an American from Passaic,
N. J. Two Cubans have since died of
the disease and several cases are being
treated.

There are 1700 entries for the Mad-
ison Square horse show in New York,
which is 250 more than last year.
Every class and style of equine—from
drafts to jumpers and Clydesdale to
Shetlands—are on exhibition.

James O'Connell, president of the
International Machinists' union, has
been re-elected, the referendum cast
by the machinists' locals in the United
States and Canada showing 17,000
votes, of which Mr. O'Connell received
over 10,000.

As the result of injuries sustained in
a recent football game in Pacific
Grove, Cal., John Meehan, a 15-year-
old boy, is dying. The lad's spine is
fractured and the physicians state
that there is no possible chance of
his recovery.

Secretary Bonaparte has ordered a
court-martial for the trial of Mid-
shipman Minor Meriwether, jr., of
the third-class, at the Annapolis naval
academy, in connection with the death
of Midshipman Branch, which follow-
ed a fist encounter between the two
students.

Last winter Rev. Dr. Halsey, of the
Presbyterian foreign mission board,
visited the missions in west Africa.
Since his return he is denouncing
Leopold of Belgium and the Congo
Free State as "the most iniquitous
monarch that ever sat on a throne."

John R. Platt, the New York multi-
millionaire, who claimed to have
been buccinated out of \$685,000 by Han-
nah Elias, an octoon adventuress,
has lost his suit to recover the amount
named. He could not disprove what

RAILROAD BOYS WIN THEIR FIGHT

POCATELLO WILL HAVE

\$25,000 Y. M. C. A. TEMPLE.

Local Branch of 700 Members Or-
ganized There Saturday—Railroad
Men Have Made a Strenuous Fight
on Gambling and Have Practically
Closed the Town, Which Has Borne
a Bad Reputation for Years.

Pocatello, Idaho, which has borne
the reputation of being the toughest
town on the Oregon Short Line, for
the past 20 years, has just been in-
vaded by the Y. M. C. A. and last Sat-
urday H. W. Stone, secretary of that
organization, organized a strictly rail-
road association with a membership of
700 at that place.

Mr. Stone passed down the O. R. &
N. Sunday night to his home in Port-
land and speaks in the most encour-
aging terms of the new society, the
only strictly railroad branch of the
order west of Cheyenne, where the
Union Pacific supports and sustains a
strong railroad body of the Y. M. C. A.

For the past year the younger and
more progressive railroad men at Po-
catello, of whom there are about 1000,
have conducted a campaign for the
suppression of gambling in that city,
with excellent results, and as a con-
sequence of this movement this rail-
road Y. M. C. A. has been organized
and a campaign started for the erec-
tion of a \$25,000 building in which
the Oregon Short Line will lend ma-
terial assistance.

Pocatello, being a railroad and an
Indian town, has borne a bad reputa-
tion and has long been the rendezvous
of the toughs from all the surround-
ing states and territories. Whiskey
peddling among the Bannock and Fort
Hall Indians has been carried on per-
sistently, in spite of the authorities,
the old settlers winking at the law
and encouraging the traffic in order
to keep up the rent of their old shacks
which were used for saloons and gam-
bling dens.

Finally a group of railroad men or-
ganized a fight on gambling and
against the old fogies, the bootleggers
and gamblers, have succeeded in clos-
ing the town practically tight and the
splendid body of 700 decent, moral
young men employed on the Short
Line, has been organized.

The new building will be fully
equipped with an excellent gymnas-
ium, baths, swimming pool, amusement
parlors, library, reading and assembly
room, and Pocatello thus takes a com-
mendable forward step.

FIGHT OF GAS COMPANIES.

North Yakima Council Fills Up the
Pipe Line Trenches.

The following from Saturday's Ya-
kima Republic gives the gas situation
in that city:

Under orders from Mayor Fechter
Street Commissioner Adams and a
gang of men are at work filling up
the trenches that have been dug in
the alleys of the city by the North
Yakima Improvement company, oth-
erwise called the acetylene gas com-
pany.

This action was taken upon the ad-
vice of the best legal talent that could
be obtained, on the ground that the
company has no franchise and conse-
quently has no right to dig up the
streets and alleys of the city. The en-
forcement of the order is under the
personal supervision of City Marshal
Curran. A dirt scraper is being used
and all the trench that is open will be
filled in a few hours.

Attorney Fred Parker, who repre-
sents the gas company, said this after-
noon:

"I am at present preparing papers
that will be brought before Judge
Riggs tomorrow asking for an order
restraining the city from interfering
with the work in any manner. There
is little doubt that the city is acting
in a high-handed manner in stopping
this work when we have a franchise
under which we can go ahead. The
action of the council in attempting to
revoke the franchise was certainly
illegal and we shall go ahead with the
construction as soon as the writ is
granted."

The men who will start the erection
of a coal gas plant under the Ander-
son franchise will arrive in this city
from Spokane Saturday and will im-
mediately commence work. They
say that they will go ahead with their
work under any circumstances whether
the acetylene people finish their
plant or not. Judge Riggs is at present
in the eastern part of his district, in
either Benton or Franklin counties,
and no one in this city seems to know
his exact location. He will return to
North Yakima tomorrow when several
cases will be heard before him and
the injunction proceedings will be
brought up at that time.

CALIFORNIA'S PROSPERITY.

Steady Increase of State's Products
Over Previous Years.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 11.—The Oc-
tober bulletin of the California Pro-
motion committee just published,
treats of the year's output in three of
California's principal industries. Their
record shows a steady increase
over previous years.

Shipments of fresh deciduous fruit
in a fresh state, carload lots, approx-

imated 8000 cars, of which over 4400
cars have gone forward to date. That
leaves but 1600 cars of apples, grapes
and pears to be shipped. This total is
the largest ever recorded and ex-
ceeds last year's shipments by over
2000 cars. Fruitgrowers will receive
more than \$5,750,000 for this output
exclusive of canned or dried fruits.
About 250 cars were also shipped by
express in small lots.

California will this year contribute
between 70 and 75 per cent of all the
wine legitimately produced from
grapes in the United States. The cost
value of this vintage will be about
\$7,500,000, calculating the grapes at
a paying price to the growers, coop-
erage not included. The selling value
will be about \$10,000,000, including
cooperage. More than 20,000,000 gal-
lons of wine and brandy will be ship-
ped from California this year.

BOER COLONY FOR TEXAS.

Thousands of Agriculturists to Settle
in Southwest.

The Boer colony of farmers in Mex-
ico have accepted an offer to settle
in southwest Texas, in the new country
recently opened up by the Brownsville
road, says a dispatch from Galveston,
Texas. The tract of irrigated land
comprises about 75,000 acres. Gen-
eral Ben Valjeon, who acts for him-
self and 200 Boer families, promises
several thousand agriculturists within
two years.

Fifty families are ready to move
from Chihuahua, Mexico, where they
have been robbed of their investments
and labor by the faulty land records.
After building their homes and tilling
the soil the Boers found they could
not perfect titles and sought to get
back their money, but the Mexicans
refused and threatened to confiscate
the possessions. The Boers have ap-
pealed to the Mexican government for
relief.

KEEP INLAND EMPIRE HISTORY.

Movement on Foot to Organize an Or-
ganization and Provide Quarters.

Several persons of the inland em-
pire have undertaken the organization
of a historical association for the pur-
pose of stimulating an interest in the
history of the northwest.

The idea is to form an association
to seek out and to collect papers, docu-
ments and letters of the history of the
northwest. The state college lib-
rary has undertaken to act as the de-
pository of all the historical material
collected by the association.

A meeting of this association will be
held at Pullman some time in Novem-
ber. It is desired that all persons in-
terested in this important movement
should be present at the organization.

Further particulars and a date for
the first meeting will be given to the
press as soon as definite plans are
completed. Professor W. G. Beach,
at the Washington state college at
Pullman, is in a position to answer all
correspondence on the matter, from
persons interested in this historical
movement.
