GENERAL NEWS.

The students of Nebraska Central college have voluntarily dropped football from the list of sports until the rules are revised and made more humane and sensible.

President Mellen, of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad, openly and aboveboard comes out in support of President Roosevelt in his efforts to secure railroad rate legislation.

Clovis Bertrand and A. G. Schmidt are on the road today between Chicago and New York in an attempt to break the automobile record between those places. The record is 55 hours and 35 minutes.

The State Mutual Co-operative Insurance company is launched at Moscow, Idaho, under the laws of that state. Frank A. David is president, Henry M. Swartwood treasurer, and C. E. Merwin, secretary.

The management of the Vera Cruz & Pacific (Mexican) railway have dismissed every union man in their employ and filled all places with non-union labor. The organized employees were about to ask for advance in salaries.

Senator Frank Flint, of California, declares that he is by no means antagonistic to Roosevelt so far as railroad rate legislation is concerned, and indulges in many glittering generalities to prove it. However, he cannot be committed to say that he favors any restriction of the railroads at all.

Rear Admiral G. W. Baird, after 43 years' service in the navy, during which time he has had but four months off duty, now asks to be relieved as superintendent of the state war and navy department building in Washington.

On the strength of the certainty of the building of the Panama canal, the government of Peru has begun the expenditure of \$2,500,000 upon a new dock at Callao, and has subsidized a line of steamers between Callao and Panama at \$150,000 per year.

TO GOVERN EGG SUPPLY.

California Professor Offers Novel and Practical Means.

As the result of a series of experiments just completed by Prof. M. E. Jaffa, the food expert at the University of California, it is almost certain that the egg market will soon undergo an upheaval and that the high prices now being paid for eggs will be reduced to normal proportions.

By regulating the periods of moulting among the fowls, Jaffa has brought about a more uniform production of eggs throughout the year, instead of having a superfluity in certain months and a scarcity in others as the conditions are at present.

A statement of the experiments and their outcome was made last night at Petaluma before the Poultry Producers' association of that place. The investigations have been carried on at the University experiment station at Petaluma and at the home of Professor Jaffa during the past six months.

The process by which the results were arrived at is a simple one. It is a well known fact that when hens moult no eggs are laid. The moulting period occupies three months from October through December and during that time the prices of eggs soar skyward.

Professor Jaffa figured out that if he could shorten the time of moulting or carry it over to some other time of the year, he could find the remedy for an equal division of eggs. If the latter scheme were carried out, the scientific producer would have a supply of eggs between October and January, while the regular raiser would continue under present conditions, thus causing a uniformity in the supply.

The following in brief is Professor Jaffa's plan of regulating the moulting. A hen laying regularly has her nitrogenous food supply reduced 50 per cent. Nitrogen being the important factor in the egg, the hen thus dieted stops laying. This having been accomplished the hen having nothing to do directs her attention to the next important thing in her life—namely, moulting. In the experiments thus far conducted, it has been found that the fowls follow this course invariably.

The reduction in the food supply does not impair their vigor but the quantity of eggs produced during what is the regular season for moulting, is smaller than usual.

The artificial moulting is gone through much quicker than the ordinary process. The hen thus treated, at present, only lays about as many eggs in the long run as the usual hen, eggs in the long run as the usual hen, eggs in the long run as the usual hen.

Professor Jaffa expects to overcome this difficulty shortly. Another difficulty was encountered in the experiments. It was found that a few of the hens had been caused to moult prematurely moulted again during the regular season. Professor Jaffa asserts, however, that this state can easily be overcome as soon as some of the various details involved are worked out.

The complete report of the investigations will not be made until January, 1906, when all the hens that are being experimented with will have undergone the period of probation.

Railroad Expectations.

Railroad work is progressing as rapidly as the limited number of laborers obtainable will permit. The steel has been laid to a point about half a mile north of town and the ties are laid for several miles farther. The contractors are offering every inducement to secure more men, but there are simply no idle men in this section to be had and it seems the demand for labor in other parts of the country from which this class of employment is recruited makes it impossible to bring in as many men as could be used, the demand everywhere far exceeding the supply.

However, the work will be pushed with as much energy as the present force and what straggling additions may be added will permit and it seems now certain that the road will be completed at least as far in the canyon as Stephens this winter.

Appropos of railroad matters is the interesting news, recently made public, that the company has ordered and paid for steel enough to reach 100 miles farther than what will be needed and has been bought for the Meadows extension and the Seven Devils branch. This is taken as further evidence that not only will the Grangeville connection be made in the next 10 months, but that there will be something doing on the south end of the line toward the coast.—Council (Idaho) Advance.

New Idaho Sheep Company.

The Bullard & Johnson Sheep and Land company, limited, filed articles of incorporation Wednesday with the secretary of state. The incorporators are J. M. Johnson, of Boise; C. J. Bullard, D. H. Van Dusen, J. E. Van Dusen and Edwin Van Dusen, of Emmett. The principal place of business is Emmett and the capital stock of the company is \$200,000, with shares at \$1 each. All the stock has been subscribed as follows: Johnson, \$50,000 shares; Bullard, \$50,000 shares; and the remaining 100,000 shares are divided equally among the three Van Dusens. The object of the company, as stated in the articles of incorporation, is to transact a general livestock and land business.

Mr. Johnson explains that the corporation will take over the plant formerly owned by Bullard & Johnson, located about 10 miles north of Emmett, and consisting of 2250 acres of deeded land and 30,000 head of sheep.—Boise Statesman.

Hustling for Winter Feed.

Sheepmen are falling over themselves in an endeavor to buying hay at from \$4 to \$6 per ton for winter feeding, says a well informed man to a reporter for the Statesman yesterday.

The fact that the winter range is in bad shape, owing to an unprecedented drouth in this part of the state, and the consequent fact that sheep will necessarily be brought in for the winter feeding from the range earlier this year than usual, are the reasons assigned in explanation of the haste of the sheepmen to lay in a supply of hay before the price advances.

That the prevailing price of \$4 and \$4.50 per ton for large lots on contracts will very soon be increased is the emphatic declaration made by more than one Boise man. Those who keep in close touch with the hay situation in south Idaho, assert that while there is at this time no perceptible falling off in the visible supply, yet the woolgrowers are so anxious to contract large quantities of winter feed at this time at the prevailing rates that there is every reason to believe that the market will feel the effects of a bullish move and increase to \$6 or even \$6.50 per ton in contract lots.—Boise Statesman.

Bell Company Getting a Move On.

"The Pacific States Telephone company is spending large sums of money and intends to spend more in improving its system in this territory," so says District Manager Glessner. The line will be re-equipped and by next summer the Magneto system now used will be abandoned and the express common battery substituted, which provides for doing away with batteries at each 'phone and placing them at the central office. Ringing central will also be a dead letter, as is now the case in larger cities.

The new line spoken of before as being constructed between The Dalles and Portland, is now finished as far as Hood River and will reach this city in about two weeks.

Yesterday morning Harry Knutz, the switch board man, left for Endersby and points farther out to re-equip the line and new circuits will be put in on the Prineville line. When Mr. Knutz returns he will leave for Grass Valley to put in a new switch board at that place.

In fact, Mr. Glessner tells us that the entire line in Wasco, Klickitat, Sherman and Crook will be virtually rebuilt.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Library Affairs at Baker City.

Last evening the library commission appointed by Mayor C. A. Johns, met for the first time in the city hall and elected officers as follows: President, R. D. Carter; vice president, J. T. Donnelly; secretary, Mrs. C. J. Flynn; treasurer, Mrs. F. M. Saxton.

According to the terms of the law the length of the term of office of the commissioners shall be decided by lot. This matter was decided by the members of the commission drawing straws and resulted as follows: Rev. J. R. N. Bell, Mrs. Eppinger and R. D. Carter were selected to serve one year; Mr. Imhaus, Miss Stack and Mr. Donnelly, two years, and Mrs. Saxton, Mrs. Flynn and Mr. Churchill, three years.

A committee consisting of Mrs. Eppinger, Miss Stack and Mr. Imhaus was appointed to draw up suitable by-laws and rules for the library, and have them ready by next Wednesday evening, when the commission will meet again.—Baker City Herald.
