GENERAL NEWS.

The Cudahy Packing company has lately invested \$350,000 in British Columbia mining properties—a half interest in the Haskins zinc and copper mines.

The freight steamer Flickinger, which went ashore on Redondo beach, near Los Angeles, Cal., in commission 29 years, and was built at Seattle.

Mrs. Mary McWalters, of Chicago, was sandbagged at Los Angeles, Cal., and robbed of \$500 in jewels and money. No trace has been found of her assailant.

William H. Sprout escaped from the Marysville, Cal. county jail while awaiting trial on a charge of blowing a safe at Yuba City. He had served five terms in the state penitentiary.

The anti-American boycott at Singapore has been checked, according to a cable report from the consul general at that point. He states that its force was broken by the British colonial government.

At Polk City, Iowa, Mrs. Floy Anderson, daughter of N. R. Lantz, who is connected with one of the government departments at Washington, committed suicide by jumping into a well. She was insane.

Divers discovered that the torpedo boat S 126, which during the maneuvers in Kiel bay (Germany) sank after colliding with the cruiser Andine, is lying in the mud with a list to port. Four bodies have been recovered.

A year ago Miss Florence Ryan fell into a ditch at Syracuse, N. Y., and was made an invalid. March 7 she fell into a trance, and was unconscious until November 19, when she awoke with all her mental faculties unimpaired.

A firm of Baltimore architects has drawn plans for a building without any wood in its construction. It will be six stories in height, the entire structure to be re-enforced concrete and steel. Even the doors, window sashes and door jams will be metal.

FOR NOMINATIONS

SECRETARY OF STATE NOW PREPARING BALLOTS.

Preparations Under the Direct Primary Law Are Tedious and Costly and It Will Require Two Months to Get Ballots in Readiness for Primary Nominations—Will Cost the State About \$4000.

Secretary of State Dunbar has begun to make preparations for the general primary election to be held in this state and district offices must be filed with the secretary of state by April 1, in order to have a place on the official ballot.

It will require at least 30 days for each candidate or his friend to secure the necessary names and prepare the petitions required by law, so that the name may appear on the official ballot.

The tally sheets will contain space for recording the vote for at least 99 candidates for each party in every county in the state. Two tally sheets will be prepared: One for the republican party and one for the democratic party. No other party cast sufficient votes at the last election to entitle it to recognition in the primary election.

Secretary Dunbar placed an order with the state printer for 32,380 blanks to be delivered by January 1. The estimated cost of the primary election is between \$3500 and \$4000.

Candidates for the legislature, according to the provisions of the direct primary law, have the privilege of saying in the petition which they circulate for signatures to have their names placed on the official ballot that they will not be bound by the state law, which allows the people to express their preference for United States senator.

The declaration on the part of the candidate becomes part and parcel of his canvass both for the nomination and for election after he has been nominated. The declaration which candidates are required to make is embodied in the law, and while they have a choice, the evident intent of the law is that the voter may be advised what course the candidate intends to pursue, in the event of his election as a member of the legislature.

There is nothing to prevent any man from circulating a petition to have his name placed on the official primary ballot. Secretary of State Dunbar has no discretion in the matter but must place every man's name on the official ballot whose petition is regular and complies with the terms of the law.

ANOTHER TICKET AT ECHO.

Mayor L. A. Esteb Will Have Opposition in the Coming City Election. Echo, Nov. 21.—(Special.)—While it was thought for a time that Mayor L. A. Esteb would have no opposition for re-election it has developed that another candidate for mayor will be nominated and a hot fight precipitated.

Mr. Esteb has held the office two terms and under his direction practically all the municipal improvements have been carried out, the town incorporated and the water and electric light plants started.

Among those mentioned for the office in opposition to Mr. Esteb are C. I. Lisle and Ralph Stanfield. Mr. Lisle is now proprietor of Hotel Echo, formerly the De Ville, and Mr. Stanfield is cashier of the Echo bank. Neither of these gentlemen want the place, it is said, but are urged to accept the nomination by numerous friends.

JAPAN LEADS THE WORLD.

Island Empire Holds 180 Medals From the Fair.

Japan at the head of all exhibitors, with Oregon a close second, is the result of the competition for awards in the department of manufactures at the Lewis and Clark exposition.

The four corners of the earth are represented in the award list issued yesterday by Exhibits Director H. E. Doehle and Oregon manufacturers have just cause for exultation that they have succeeded in taking second place.

Japan secured a total of 180 awards, ninety-four of these are for gold medals, four for silver and 12 bronze. Oregon exhibitors secured 114 awards, 43 for gold medals, 24 for silver, 14 bronze and 33 diplomas of honorable mention.

Third place is held by France with 25 medals, one of them gold, 16 silver, six bronze and three diplomas. Washington captured eight gold, seven silver and two bronze medals; California secured 19 gold, two silver and one bronze; Idaho five gold, four silver, four bronze and seven diplomas; New York 14 gold, four silver and three bronze; East Indies, eight gold; Ohio, eight gold; Colorado, two gold; Russia, England, Austria and Germany, one gold medal each; Kansas, Florida and Louisiana, one gold each; Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, three gold each; Connecticut, two gold; Italy, three gold.

FEEDING IN HUDSON BAY.

Four Thousand Cattle Now Being Fed for Markets.

The Hudson Bay and Walla Walla river countries are rivaling the famous Yakima valley district as a winter feeding place. About 4000 beef cattle are now being winter fed in the Hudson Bay and Walla Walla river district.

The opening up of several irrigated tracts in that section of the country is providing hundreds of tons of alfalfa that is being used principally by stockmen in feeding during the winter. Alfalfa in the stack brings from \$4.50 to \$5 a ton and at this price farmers make good money, although the first cutting last spring was away below the normal, making the average for the year about equal to last year's hay crop.

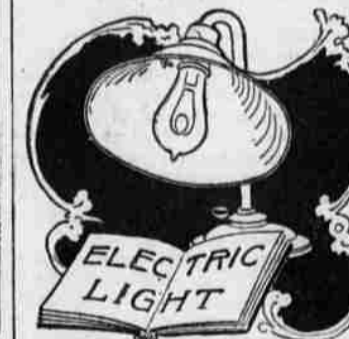
