## Charged With Forgery.

W. Cowles, clerk of the school board of the Yakima city district, was bound over for the criminal session of the superior court in the sum of \$2500 bonds before Justice R. K. Nichols this morning. Cowles was charged with forging a warrant for the sum of \$25.50 and selling the same to the First National Bank of this city. The chief witnesses for the prosecution were the other two school directors of the district, J. L. Baker and W. E. Hunt. These men testified that the signatures on the warrant in question of their names were forgeries. They gave testimony to this effect though the writing on the warrant was very close in its similarity to their usual signatures.

The defense, represented by Attorney W. M. Thompson, did not introduce any testimony, but claimed that the warrant was not a forgery and in the trial before the superior court will probably introduce expert testimony to prove that the warrant was not forged, but that it was legally signed by the board of directors.—Yakima Daily Republic.

### Lewiston Fiscal Statistics.

At the outset it is interesting to note that the total taxes to be raised in this county this year for all purposes reaches \$259,407.21, independent of the Lewiston school tax which amounts to about \$25,000. The assessment rolls show Lewiston will pay municipal taxes of \$19,635.40 this year as compared to about \$17,000 last year. The city will pay \$37,625.28 to the county on original taxes and will pay a district school tax of about \$25,000. This will make a total of \$102,245.62 that the Lewiston people will pay in taxes this year.—Lewiston Tribune.

### \$500 Per Front Foot.

The consideration is \$25,100, or \$200 a front foot.—Boise Statesman.

### Boys' Band at Lewiston.

This week the small hoist at the Sheridan-Empire was moved about 100 feet to an old shaft that was sunk about 30 years ago and the water has been pumped from the old workings. The object is to thoroughly explore the old stopes and locate the shoots when the shaft will be sunk another 100 feet and a station cut.

### Scott Ranch Sold.

Last week Mrs. L. E. Scott sold her ranch in the valley to F. D. McCully; consideration, \$1000. This ranch of 160 acres is situated about 7 miles northeast of Joseph adjoining J. C. Weather's. It has first-class soil and is a good investment. Two streams pass through the ranch, thus ensuring plenty of water.—Joseph Herald.

Between 10,000 and 12,000 bales of the Yakima hop crop of 1905 have been passed from the growers to the buyers' hands since the picking season closed the first week in October. The great number of these hops have been

### Palouse Country Threshed Wheat That Was Thought Spoiled by Inain.

This week will wind up the threshing for the season, and 100,000 sacks of wet wheat, worth \$100,000 to the grower, has been saved since the rain ceased falling some two weeks ago, says an interview with a Colfax man in the Oregonian. The Crisp brothers, who threshed in the vicinity of Garfield, and Steptoe Butte 14 days after the rain stopped coming down in torrents, have finished today, and in an interview Abraham Crisp said:

"We have threshed with two of our machines 14,000 sacks of grain, mostly wheat, that the farmers are selling readily at 50 and 51 cents a bushel, or \$1 per sack. In the locality where we have been threshing since the rain, there have been several other machines, all doing good work. We have saved the farmers in the past two weeks not less than \$14,000, and it is conservative to say that not less than 100,000 sacks of grain, worth not less than \$100,000, have been saved to the farmers throughout the Palouse country the past 14 days.

"The farmers here got discouraged after the rain, and supposing their grain was all ruined, many of them sold in shock to cattlemen for whatever they were offered. James Haun, a prosperous farmer living near Elberton, sold 40 acres of wet wheat in shock for \$40 cash. After the rains ceased and clear weather came on, the purchaser threshed part of the crop and got 463 sacks of fair wheat, which he readily sold for 51 cents per bushel, receiving in cash nearly \$650. A. Johnson, a farmer near Garfield, sold 55 acres of shocked wheat while the rain was falling for a cash consideration of \$153. Our machines threshed for the purchaser 1265 sacks of wheat, that sold quickly for 53 cents per bushel, or about \$1300 cash."

### Will Write of Oregon.
