DECENCY IN PUBLIC OFFICE.

A vital, living, burning truth is being forced down the throats of a class of Americans, who shout loudly that they are good citizens and who are not.

It is that the common, every day, rugged honesty that is a part and parcel of every successful business is none too good for public offices.

This country is full of men holding both large and small places, who have one standard of rectitude for their private life and another for the conduct of their political holdings.

They graft in a manner to make a thief blush. They find no sin or shame in forcing political contributions from those below them. They fill offices with relatives down to the third generation, with the idea of extracting every penny of profit possible. They duck and dodge and evade laws that were enacted for decency and the economical conduct of public affairs.

And nine out of 10 of these men would look you squarely in the eye and say "Certainly, I am an honest man."

The dismissal of W. S. Leib, assistant United States treasurer at Philadelphia, should serve as a warning to the thousands who are in office solely for what there is in it.

The president has set the seal of disapproval on the conduct of public office for personal ends. Recent events has shown an awakening of public sentiment and a desire to put an end to a system of betrayal and swindling that takes so much and gives so little in return.

SOARING REAL ESTATE PRICES.

A piece of sensational real estate news yesterday was furnished by the refusal of an offer of \$3,750,000 for the department store building on the west side of Broadway extending from Thirty-third to Thirty-fourth street, says the New York World. The structure occupies a plot of 25,000 square feet, is assessed at \$2,100,000 and is held at \$4,125,000.

Across Broadway the sale of the old Tabernacle property at the corner of Thirty-fourth street, with two abutting lots in Thirty-fifth street, was arranged last May for \$2,500,000. The Tabernacle plot cost \$78,500 in 1887 and was sold for \$1,300,000 three years ago.

Thirty-fourth street from Fifth avenue westward has for several years been a region of rapidly increasing values. At the Broadway corners the rise in realty is assisted not only by the stretching upward of the Sixth avenue shopping district, but by the prospect of the various tunnel terminals in and about Herald Square.

The financial district, with its phenomenal values, may have to recognize here an uptown rival in average

prices, though there is nothing to approach the \$600 a square foot sale of the southeast corner at Broadway and Wall street.

Interest of another sort attaches to the purchase of the Morris Park tract for between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000 by a syndicate which will turn it into building plots. It is evident from this operation and from coincident plans of suburban transit promoters that Long Island expansion will have competition in the way of building up the outer city.

THE UMATILLA BRAND.

Why don't Umatilla county producers get together and adopt a uniform brand for their products?

Walla Walla wheat, fruit and manufactures are known the world over because Walla Walla county people insist on everything bearing the Walla Walla brand. Walla Walla wheat is given a name and a place on every market in the world and yet Umatilla county furnishes a large proportion of the wheat sold under this name. Walla Walla fruit is the slogan in every market in the east, and yet Milton and Freewater grow a large proportion of the fruit sold as Walla Walla product.

The East Oregonian would like to see a meeting of all the producers of Umatilla county called for the purpose of adopting some uniform trade mark or brand to be placed on every carload of produce, whether grain, fruit, lumber, cord wood, ties, Indian robes, baled wool, flour, bran, potatoes, beef cattle, sheep, hay or other manufactured or agricultural products.

This universal legend or trade mark should accompany the name of the producer and should advertise Umatilla county specifically.

The county is a producer second to none in the west and should not submit to having its glory appropriated by Walla Walla county or any other well known advertiser. Umatilla county should be advertised by Umatilla county people. This is worth considering and the East Oregonian hopes to see a meeting of all the producers of the county called for this purpose.

Let Walla Walla and other well known districts rely upon their own merits. Umatilla county wheat is a distinct and well known variety and grows under conditions peculiar to this county. Umatilla county fruit is well known and is deserving a name and a specific advertisement in the markets of the world.

Let us get together and put the Umatilla county brand on everything we produce, whether it be a pair of shoes or a combined harvester. In addition to the universal legend adopted for the county the name of the maker or producer could also be given prominence and thus the county and the individual business man could receive the wide publicity they so richly deserve.

The East Oregonian today publishes the law regulating land entries in the forest reserves, in answer to the many inquiries which have reached this office concerning land entries in the Wenaha reserve, which is partly in Umatilla county. It will be noticed that land entries already made in good faith at the time the reserve was established on May 12, 1905, will not be interfered with but entries or locations made subsequent to that time are of no validity and will not be recognized. Settlers in the reserve will be allowed to complete title to their land, although they must not trespass on the reserve, and can only cut timber from their own land.

ROOSEVELT'S "BUMPS."

The Washington hatter who, for a half century, has been making diagrams of the heads of presidents, statesmen, and other personages, supplies the following comparison of the heads of President Roosevelt and some of his predecessors in the White House:

President Lincoln had a small head unusually well shaped. The general character of the contour pointed to firmness, caution, and the domestic virtues. President Grant's head was large, showing special genius for construction and generalship. President Arthur had the smallest head of all the presidents within the past 50 years. President Harrison's head was large. President Cleveland's head band is no larger than was Harrison's, and is much like it in other respects. President McKinley's head was very small, being almost twice as long as it was wide, with his bump of cautiousness enlarged almost abnormally.

President Roosevelt's head is very wide for its length, and is particularly broad across the back, showing, according to the phrenologists, an inclination to dependency and an absence of the power to imitate.—The Argonaut.
