Fighting the Spraying Law.

K. W. Shafford, of the Zillah district, was in the city Saturday. He was here to begin preparations for a suit against the state claiming damages for fruit belonging to him that was destroyed by the state horticultural inspector. A fund of about \$200 was raised by Mr. Shafford among the fruitraisers of the Zillah district to take this case to the courts.

Shafford was arrested last fall for attempting to ship inferior fruit outside the state. Inspector Brown seized the fruit in a car on the Northern Pacific siding at Tappan. He at once condemned it as being badly infected with fruit tree pests. State Inspector Huntley upheld Inspector Brown and the fruit was destroyed.

The case against Shafford came up for a hearing in this city and was dismissed. Shafford was prepared to put up a defense, claiming that the state had no authority to prevent him from shipping infected fruit outside its jurisdiction. He intended also to claim that the law is unconstitutional.—Yakima Daily Republic.

State Selects Lieu Lands.

State Senator George Day, as agent of the state board of land commissioners, has selected 14,594.48 acres in the southeastern part of Fremont county, below Rexburg, and has filed the list with the United States land office at Blackfoot for transmission to Washington for approval and the issuance of patent. The lands are all of agricultural character and the selection is said to be a very fine one.

The selection was made in lieu of land lost by the state in sections 16 and 36 by reason of the creation of the Hitter Root forest reserve and are for the benefit of the common schools. The land board has succeeded in satisfying the Hitter Root reserve losses to the extent of 126,281.21 acres, having selected lieu lands in various parts of the state to that amount. The total losses in the Hitter Root reserve amounted to 152,560 acres, so that there still remains a base for lieu land selections of over 47,000 acres.

It is the intention of the board to make these remaining lieu land selections before the end of the present year.—Boise Statesman.

Ten Inches of Snow.

The weather continues beautiful, clear, cold, pleasant and bracing. The depth of snow on the ground is 10 inches, and sleighing is fine. E. D. York, who has about the most reliable thermometer here, told the editor yesterday that the lowest temperature

recorded so far is 4 degrees above zero and he has been taking regular observations. Other thermometers show as low a record as 8 and 10 degrees below.—Long Valley Advocate.

Notes on the Kamela Wood Market.

H. R. Collins, the Kamela wood contractor, was in the city yesterday after supplies. He states that not for years has the market been so good this early in the season and if orders continue and cars can be secured there will be very little left of the 5000 or more cords of wood. The bulk of the wood this season is marketed in Pendleton and Walla Walla. However, Weiser, Idaho, has been quite a purchaser. The freight to the first two named being \$1.25 per cord, while at Weiser it is \$2.50. The dealers or contractors pay \$3.25 on board the cars at Kamela or Meacham.—La Grande Observer.

Ten Years for Arson.

Judge Ritz late this afternoon denied the motion for a new trial in the case of Morris Plonick, the Jew who was convicted at the last term of court on a charge of arson, and sentenced him to 10 years at hard labor in the Walla Walla penitentiary.

He was arrested for burning the stock in the clothing store in the Wilson building about six months ago. Plonick was acting as manager of the store for his uncle, Morris Gross, of Tacoma, at the time.—Yakima Daily Republic.

Three New Towns.

The survey for the new townsite at Kippen is now about completed and the work of platting the townsite near it will soon commence. This will be followed by the surveys for the platting of the town at Ferdinand in Idaho county. The names of three new towns to be established along the line of the road have not yet been selected but announcement is expected within a few days. All these projects are along the Clearwater branch.—Lewiston Tribune.

Stole Fifteen Turkeys.

An enterprising turkey thief entered the back part of the Lewiston meat market, on the corner of Ninth and Main streets, last night, and made away with 15 fat gobblers, out of a total of 26, which were in the box when the proprietor, Louis Cherrier, closed the place of business about 9 o'clock. The turkeys were being fattened for the holiday trade and were kept in the coop in the rear of the market.—Lewiston Tribune.

- Fruits.** Apples, \$1.40 per box. Cranberries, 16 1/2 cents per quart. Oranges, 40 cents per dozen. Lemons, 25 cents per dozen. Bananas, 40 cents per dozen. Grapes, 60 cents per basket.
- Vegetables.** Sweet potatoes, 5 cents per lb. Cabbage, 3 cents per lb. Turnips, 2 1/2 cents per lb. Celery, 40 cents per doz. Potatoes, \$1.25 per sack. Onions, \$1.50 per sack.
- Butter and Eggs.** Creamery butter, 70 to 75 cents per roll. Country butter, 50 cents per roll. Fresh eggs, 40 cents per dozen. Case eggs, 35 cents per dozen.
- Miscellaneous.** Sweet pickles, 80 cents per gallon. Sour pickles, 60 cents per gallon. Mince meat, 15 cents per lb.

EXCURSION TO CALIFORNIA.

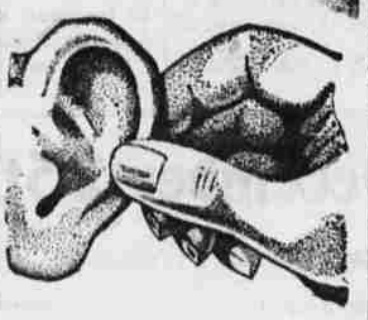
Under Auspices of the Oregon Development League Leaves Portland on Special Train, January 13.

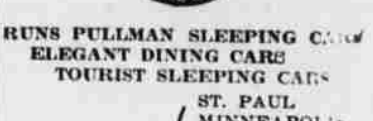
