Partition Made No Difference.
Frank O. Nelson, proprietor of the Log Cabin saloon on Main street, was yesterday adjudged guilty of a violation of the midnight closing ordinance by Police Magistrate Locke. This was the result of the famous Wagner lunch counter case, the decision of the court being that the lunch counter is a part of the saloon, and must therefore be closed during prohibited hours, the same as the bar itself. There is a partition between the bar and the lunch counter, and the door connecting the two is locked at midnight, there being no access to the saloon from the lunch counter. But during the day both spaces are used as a single room, and it was held by the court that this constituted them a single room during all hours of the day or night. The case was tried on a stipulated state of facts, it being conceded by the city attorney that no one entered the portion of the building used for the bar during prohibited hours, and that no liquor was sold in the Wagner lunch counter by Proprietor Nelson of the saloon during hours when the bar was closed. Because of these facts, Judge Locke assessed a low fine, \$20 and costs, for the offense. Notice of appeal to the district court was given by the defense.—Boise Statesman.

Enforcing Local Option Law.
Beard Bros appeared in Justice McFarland's court Tuesday, and pleaded guilty to a charge of violation of the local option law, filed by Deputy District Attorney Collier. A fine of \$50 was imposed, with \$6 costs added. A Beard has promised the local option leaders to shut up his "blind pig" tight and fast, provided other charges that could be brought against him are not pressed, and it is not yet known what the outcome will be. The specific charge for which Beard Bros. were fined was selling liquor on November 5 in this town to Ernest Jones and Earl McConnell.—Fossil Journal.

Lexington Fiscal Affairs.
The city records show that \$3562.95 has been received by the Lexington city council in the short time that the town has been incorporated. This bonus of \$1000 on the water works and other incidental expenses have been paid, and there is a balance of \$705.67 on hand. The new council chamber and fire house is almost completed at a total cost of \$100,000. Fire fighting apparatus purchased.

Guilt of Rape as Charged.
Such was the verdict of the jury in the case of Ed Stutiles, tried last week in the district court on the charge of rape.
It will be remembered that Ella May Stutiles, eldest daughter of the defendant, made a confession under oath on November 15, which resulted in the arrest of her father. In this confession the girl said her father had been guilty of an unnatural crime, of which she was the victim. At the trial of the case, as well as before the grand jury, she testified that she had sworn falsely before and that her father was innocent of every charge she had made against him.
It was undoubtedly the testimony of Ruth Hudson, for whose pitiable condition Stutiles was responsible, according to her statement, that resulted in a conviction of the man.
The penalty for rape in this state is imprisonment in the state penitentiary for a period of seven years or for life.—Boise Statesman.

Creamery at Halley.
Thomas J. Davidson, of Helena, Mont., who has been in Halley for several days, has succeeded in raising enough money by selling stock for the establishment of a creamery in Halley.
The stock is all owned by local parties, and one-half the amount subscribed is not payable until the creamery is built and in operation, and the balance is due three months later.
The plant and machinery will cost \$1500 and the stock has all been sold. The plant is to be in operation by July 1, 1906.—Halley Miner.

Coal Shortage Continues.
The coal shortage in Baker City continues although it looked for a time as if the cars were going to be supplied, but this only lasted for a day or two and now coal is almost out of the question. The Wyoming mines are refusing to take any orders for delivery whatever, either present or future. They are now so far behind that it will be almost impossible to catch up before the winter is over.—Baker City Herald.

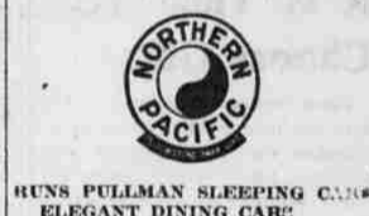
