Walter Grover Arrested.

Owing to some difficulty unexplained as yet, on information filed by District Attorney Lomax yesterday, and a warrant issued by Justice of the Peace Alf L. Curry, Walter Grover was arrested on a charge of the larceny of a horse from Hindman's barn in Baker City, the property of Frank Bailey. Grover was placed under \$250 bonds to answer to the circuit court.

Walter Grover is the son of a large rancher in Eagle valley, and it is known that in 1905 they sold something like \$20,000 worth of cattle to local butchers and dealers. The family is among the pioneer settlers of the county and it is presumed that there must be in this some misunderstanding or mix-up, possibly growing out of the Bailey case tried in the circuit court yesterday.—Baker City Democrat.

Were "Looking for Mamma."

A terrible story comes from Liberty, in this county. A couple living there have two children, a boy of six and a girl of two years. A few nights ago the parents decided to attend a dance in the neighborhood. They left the children asleep in bed. When they returned about 12 o'clock, the little ones were gone. An all-night search failed to locate them, but in the morning they were found near the house in the snow. The boy's feet were so badly frozen that both had to be amputated at the ankles. The little girl had to have all her feet taken off. The reason that her feet were not frozen was due to the fact that her brother had put a pair of stockings on her before they left the house, while he went barefoot in the snow. When found, and asked why they had left home, the boy said they were "looking for mamma."—Montpelier (Idaho) Examiner.

Pleading Guilty to Gambling.

Yesterday afternoon on the complaint of Dr. T. R. Monk, Pat McDowell of Summerville was arrested for gambling and Jack Newbill for permitting gambling in his place of business. They were brought before Justice Hough and they waived examination and were bound over in the sum of \$150 each. This afternoon they appeared before Judge Eakin, pleaded guilty to the charge and were fined \$50 each. McDowell paid his fine as we go to press. Newbill has not paid and is in jail.—La Grande Observer.

Navigation Tied Up.

The O. R. & N. boats on the Snake river are again tied up on account of low water. The Spokane did not leave here this morning but is tied up at the docks and the Lewiston will

make the trip here today and then wait a better stage of water.

"It was necessary last night to get a line and drag the boat into the dock," said Captain Baughman. "There was not enough water to float in, though most of the load was left at way points on the river. The boats can run but they cannot carry any freight. The gauge at Riparia when I left yesterday morning registered 1.5 feet and the river fell three inches during the day. Snake river raised a little last night, but the Clearwater is still falling, and is nearly as low as it was before the late rain."—Lewiston Tribune.

Largest Fruitgrowers' Association.

W. H. Paulhamus of Sumner, president of the Puyallup & Sumner Fruitgrowers' association, arrived here Wednesday morning to attend the State Horticultural association meeting, having come directly from Puyallup, where the annual meeting of the association of which he is president was held Tuesday.

In speaking to a Republic reporter of the showing made by his association during the past year, Mr. Paulhamus said: "Our association is the largest in point of numbers in the country. We now have over 500 shippers who belong to the association. Last year, we shipped 75,000 crates of red raspberries and blackberries to various points in the west and middle west. The gross receipts from our business last year amounted to \$150,000."—Yakima Daily Republic.

An Extensive Farmer.

H. H. Vincent was in the city last week and paid the Courier-Press a pleasant visit. Mr. Vincent is one of the most extensive farmers in the inland empire. An idea of the extent of his operations can be gained from the fact that the value of his farming machinery, horses, harness necessary to do his work, is over \$30,000. He uses 125 head of work horses. This season he has 2000 acres seeded and has 1500 acres more to seed next spring. Last season he needed 45,000 sacks to put his grain in.—Dayton Courier-Press.

Two Hundred Families Out of Coal.

The coal famine which has swept over this entire section of the northwest is acute at Payette, where they have no wood. The schools have been compelled to close and there are 200 families out of fuel. Agent E. C. Moore yesterday wrote to O. R. & N. officials for authority to furnish La Grande two cars of company coal to relieve the situation until our dealers can secure a supply.—La Grande Observer.

PENDLETON HIDE MARKET.

Prices on All Hides Have Greatly Increased in Past Year.

Perhaps the greatest advance made in the price of any common commodity in Umatilla county within the past year has been on hides.

Although the price of beef has advanced but little, yet the butchers sell their hides for almost double what they were worth this time last year. The industry has been greatly stimulated by the larger demand for boots and shoes caused by the Russo-Japanese war and the failure of the hide supply in South American countries to come up to the usual standard.

L. Shank & Co., one of the most extensive hide firms in this part of Oregon, handle large quantities of dry and green hides and the following prices are given by this firm.

This week the following prices pre-

vail on the different grades and varieties of hides and pelts:

Green hides, salted, 9 cents per pound.
Green hides, unsalted, 8 cents per pound.
Dry hides, 16 1/2-2 cents per pound.
Horse hair, 16 cents per pound.
Full wool sheep pelts, 16 cents per pound. The pelts will probably average 10 pounds each, making the price from \$1.40 to \$1.60.

Last season at this time the following prices prevailed in this city:

Green hides, from 5 to 6 cents.
Dry hides, 15 to 12 cents.
Horse hair, 10 to 12 cents.
and sheep pelts 10 to 13 cents per pound.

Pendleton is the most active hide market in the inland empire and tons of hides are hauled to the city from different parts of the county every week.

The company has projected a railroad, a telegraph and telephone line from Coeur d'Alene to Wallace, a distance of 50 miles, with a number of branch roads extending in different directions, amounting to a total of 82 miles of branches. The capital is placed at \$2,500,000, of which \$132,000 has been subscribed.—Boise Capital News.
