BACK FROM ITALY

JOHN GRIVETTE WRITES
TO THE EAST OREGONIAN.

For 22 Years a Resident of Cold Springs, 16 Miles North of Pendleton—So Many Changes in Italy That He Could Not Stay There—Amusing Experiences With Mirrors in New York City—Stopped at Spokane to Rest for a Time.

The East Oregonian has just received the following interesting letter from John Grivette, an Italian citizen of Cold Springs, who has been on a visit to his native land for the past two months and who is expected home in a few days:

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 25.—(Editor East Oregonian.)—I started from Pendleton on November 28, 1905, and reached New York on the 24 of December. How I got across the river from New Jersey I don't know. I was asking everybody I was where the boat was, and was on the boat all the time and did not know it until it was half way across.

Well, when I got to New York, I started out to find the Hanover bank, where I had business, and seeing an extra fine looking building I thought I would step inside to look around a little. I thought I was going to walk through a door, when a man grabbed me and said, "Hold on there, you will be smashing a hole through that looking glass."

Well, I turned round and said, "I guess it's my treat. If I have lived 48 years, I did not know a glass from a door."

Of course I saw myself, but thought it was another man, as I had on a new suit of clothes I bought in Chicago.

I stayed in New York three days, as I missed the steamship La Savoy of the French line by about 15 minutes. As the water looked so rough I looked around for a good safe ship and finally took the American line steamship Philadelphia, which sailed three days later.

In seven days after a moderate rough passage, two days of which I did not know whether I was alive or dead from sea sickness, I arrived at Cherbourg, France, at 6 p. m.

At 6 o'clock the next morning I was in the beautiful city of Paris. I left Paris the same day at 11 a. m. and got to Torino, Italy, the next day at noon. I left there at 2 p. m. for Geneva and arrived there at 5 p. m. I stayed there four days, but was only acquainted with one man there, so I went back to Torino and stayed four days. From Torino I went to Covena and stayed two weeks with my folks, whom I had not seen for 21 years.

No one knew me, and everything looked so strange and old-fashioned that I could not stand it, and just wished I was back again in Pendleton. So I wished them all good-bye forever and started again for free America.

I took a second-class ticket from Torino clear through to Pendleton. I sailed from Havre, France in the French liner La Savoy on Saturday and reached New York on the next day a week, making eight days on the water, which was rough all the way over.

When I got to New York the officials tried to hold me on the ship, but when I proved that I was an old American citizen, they let me go, but all the other Italian and Austrian passengers (about 300) they held on the ship till the train was ready to leave for their various destinations, when they were put on the cars like a lot of cattle and shipped off, and furnished with what provisions the government thought fit to sell them at a dollar a head.

Well, I arrived here at Spokane over the Great Northern from St. Paul, Minn., five days after leaving New York. By the time I reached

USING O. R. & N. TRACKS.

Washouts on the Northern Pacific Forces That Road to Get Into Portland by Way of O. R. & N.

Because of high water and washouts on the Northern Pacific near Pasco, the trains of that system are now using the O. R. & N. tracks into Portland from Spokane, while the damage to the Northern Pacific tracks is being repaired.

Both passenger and freight of the Northern Pacific are now passing through Umatilla over the O. R. & N. to Portland, but the damage is not heavy and it is expected that the Northern will be using its own tracks again tomorrow.

The Connel branch of the O. R. & N. is also damaged somewhat by high water and last evening the Spokane passenger train was delayed for two hours by high water near Starbuck.

This afternoon the Northern Pacific made arrangements to use all the O. R. & N. bridge carpenters available in order to rush the repairs needed on Northern Pacific bridges and track. A large damage was done on the Northern Pacific near Eltopia.

DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE

WILL MEET SATURDAY.
FEBRUARY 3, AT 10 A. M.

Called by Chairman Stillman to Convene at His Office—Stillman Urges Upon the Consideration of the Democrats of the County the Issues Developed by Events of the Past Several Years, and Issues a Word of Caution and Warning in the Application of the New Primary Law.

The following official call for a meeting of the democratic central committee of Umatilla county, has been issued by Chairman A. D. Stillman, to be held in Pendleton on February 3, 1906:

Pendleton, Ore., January 26, 1906. Esteemed Fellow Committeemen: A state and county election occurs in June. A vast political breaking up is taking place throughout the nation. The crust of wealth, graft and special privilege that has protected the republican party and given it its prestige and from which it has drawn its power, is being broken in every direction, and the campaign of education running through the last two years—the investigations of the big life insurance companies in New York, of the Standard Oil in Missouri, of the beef trust in Chicago, the breaking of corrupt republican rings everywhere—have at last taught the people that what we told them in 1896 and again in 1900 was true.

The democratic party has now an opportunity in state and national affairs that it has not had for more than a quarter of a century. To it the people must turn for relief from the unbearable conditions that now exist, produced and fostered by those who have shaped the destiny of the republican party.

Will we be great enough to lead straight forward on the path that is opened before us, to take the opportunity at high tide? If so we must carefully guard the integrity of our organization and of the people, members of our party, who have trusted their welfare to our keeping.

The primary election law now in effect, if misinterpreted or given the interpretation that under its provisions any kind of an assembly where the business of the people, party principles, or the relative merits of candidates may be discussed, is improper would be the greatest evil that has ever fallen upon the people of our state.

Because then the people would be hopelessly and helplessly at the mercy of the few usurping bosses, self-anointed apostles, or an office-holding trust. The preservation of a single right to the people depends upon their being able to meet and "reason together."

A number of nominating petitions are already being circulated, some by men utterly unworthy. Generally, as soon as a man registers, petitions are poked at him with request for his signature. Sometimes in all thoughtlessness, he signs, and will be challenged to find later that a really fit or proper man for the office cannot be properly presented at the primaries because the careless voters have already wasted their signatures.

Already, there is no way suitable as a candidate who is in no way suitable as a candidate or to hold office whose little scheme is simply to secure as many democrats as possible to sign his petition as they register, all if possible, and thus make it impossible for anyone to contest with him at the primaries.

Obviously, it is unwise to sign any petition until the voter knows the names of all those from amongst whom he may pick his candidate. Please aid us as far as possible in advising our people to withhold their signatures from all petitions until they have the full list of names to select from.

As chairman, I hereby call a meeting of the democratic central committee, to meet at my office in Pendleton, on Saturday, February 3, 1906, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

This will be in my judgment more important than any meeting ever held by this committee. New questions are before us that we must decide. Some strife is threatened. I trust that you and every other member of the committee will be present. I would like to have present also as many leading or representative democrats from your precinct as can possibly attend.

GENERAL NEWS.

During a heavy fog January 25, at Salt Lake, there were three collisions between street cars, in which 20 persons, nearly all school children, were more or less injured, but no one fatally.

The American Athletic union at an expense of \$25,000, will send a team to Athens, Greece, next summer, to compete in the Olympic games. The Portland Multnomah club hopes to have a representative on the team.

A score of Chinamen engaged in a revolver fight in Chinatown, New York city. Ching Yung and Lee Soon and two others whose names could not be learned, were killed. It is a detail in the feud between the On Leong society and the Hip Slags.

Stephen Decatur, a great-grandson of Commodore Decatur, first-class United States Naval academy, has been dismissed from the academy by Secretary Bonaparte in conformity with the sentence of the court-martial in his case on the charge of hazing.

Governor Carter, of Hawaii, is dangerously ill at Honolulu with a fever resembling typhoid. Secretary Atkinson, who is in New York, has been notified and will start on his proposed trip to Europe for the present. Atkinson succeeds to the governorship in the event of a vacancy.

The result of the British parliamentary elections so far is: Liberals, 228; Irish nationalists, 81; laborites, 48; unionists, 142. The new house of commons already contains 13 Jews, with several constituencies to be heard from. This is a larger number than previously recorded.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Multnomah club, at Portland, is in debt \$37,000. When it moved into the new club house five years ago, it owed \$63,000.

Claude and Paul Ford were badly hurt at Yakima by an explosion of calcium light chemicals while preparing for a moving picture performance. The hall was damaged about \$250 worth.

Mayor Lindstrom, of Aberdeen, has appointed Frank Drake police judge and has ordered all gambling to close down immediately. The policy for the ensuing year will be strict repression of vices.

The largest band saws ever made are on exhibition in Portland. They will be used by the Hoquiam Lumber company. One is 65 feet long, 18 inches wide; the other 59 feet long and 18 inches wide.

At Gardiner, Perkins brothers and Frank Varrelman and son are under arrest charged with being in the saloon business in a dry precinct. These are the first prosecutions in Douglas county under the local option law.

General John S. Harris, aged 81 years, is dead at Butte. He was a native of Vermont and a "carpetbag" senator from Louisiana from 1869 to 1873. He came to Montana as surveyor general of the territory, appointed by President Arthur.

A Great Northern passenger train was wrecked near Rock Island, Wash., by running into a landslide. The engine, tender and baggage car were thrown into the Columbia. L. M. Murray, the baggage-master, was drowned. No one else was injured seriously.

The oldest native Oregonian yet to register at Portland, is S. H. Abrams, a tailor of 501 Jefferson street, 69 years of age. The oldest man is Thomas Johnson, an inmate of the poor farm, aged 91. He is an Irishman by birth and has lived in Oregon 42 years.

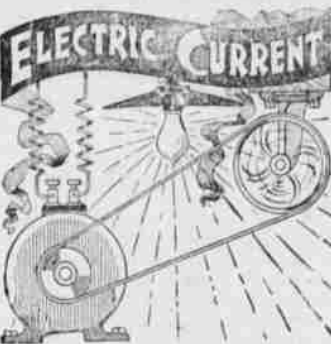
