Christian Mumm was 63 years of age and had resided in this county for many years, having been a resident of Pendleton for many years past. He has no relatives in this country excepting his brother and family.

The funeral will occur on Thursday, and the interment will be in the cemetery at Warren Station.

BUYING HORSES.

Stock is Being Secured for the Alaska Market.

Jack Kincaid of Pomeroy, arrived in the city yesterday for the purpose of purchasing horses for the Frye & Bruhn Co. of Seattle, says the Lewiston Tribune. Mr. Kincaid inspected a number of head yesterday, which had been brought here from the Astoria and Genesee sections and he will complete his work this morning. The company is buying saddle horses, 4 to 8 years of age and the prices range from \$65 to \$75. The horses are being secured for the Alaska market.

The company has been buying in eastern Oregon and the regular buyer was taken sick there. In response to a telegram Mr. Kincaid came here from Pomeroy to make the inspection at this point. The next inspection will be made at Pomeroy.

Boy Highwayman.

Because, as he admitted to Deputy Sheriff Lane and Chief of Police Phillips, he had been reading "Diamond Dick" stories and had been associating with evil companions, Earl Eby, aged 15, held up a freighter named Martini at the point of a rifle south of Caldwell Wednesday afternoon and relieved him of \$9.98 in cash. He is now in the county jail at Caldwell having been arrested here yesterday by Chief Phillips and taken to Caldwell on the afternoon train by Deputy Sheriff Charles Paynter of Canyon county.

Young Eby resides with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Eby, on their 40-acre ranch north of Perkins, some seven miles from Boise. They are highly respected citizens, and had no idea but that their son was in school, where he was supposed to be on Wednesday, until after his arrest.—Caldwell News.

Vindict of Manslaughter.

The case of the state of Idaho vs. Albert Barber, charged with murder, was concluded in the district court yesterday afternoon. At 5 o'clock the jury was instructed by Judge Smith and retired. At 2:30 a. m. a verdict of manslaughter was announced. Sentence will be imposed by Judge Smith Monday. An appeal to the supreme court will be taken by Barber's counsel.

The crime with which Barber was charged was the killing of Charles Macomb by stabbing him with a pocket knife. On the evening of December 23 a dance was being held at Woodman's hall, with Barber in charge. A quarrel took place at the hall between Macomb and Barber, but was settled without difficulty. Macomb left the hall and went to his brother's saloon. About midnight Barber went to the saloon to arrange for a dance to be held at the hall on the evening of Christmas day. The quarrel was again resumed, when Macomb struck Barber twice, who stabbed him twice in the left breast. Macomb lived eight or nine days after the stabbing. Barber is a young man about 22 years of age, while Macomb was a large, powerful man about 37 years of age. He was married. Barber had always borne a good reputation.—Weiser Signal.

IDAHO SUMMER SCHOOLS.

Three Principal Schools for the Gem State This Year.

Summer schools and institutes are to be held in three sections of Idaho this summer—the southeastern, southwestern and northern, says the Boise Statesman. Pocatello and Boise will be the places where the teachers from the first two districts will congregate for their summer drill, while the northern city has not been definitely settled. It will likely be held either at the state normal school at Lewiston or at the university at Moscow.

These district summer schools are endorsed in very cordial manner by Miss May L. Scott, the state superintendent of public instruction, who urges the teachers of the state, whether in the city or country schools, to take advantage of the opportunity to secure benefit from them and to acquire knowledge that will help to raise the standard of school work in the state.

The summer school and teachers' institute to be held at Pocatello will be held at the Academy of Idaho in that city, the sessions beginning July 2 and continuing until August 22. The term in Boise will begin about the middle of July, and will continue for six weeks. The sessions will be held at the high school building.

The law provides that each county shall appropriate funds for summer institute purposes and the joint institute thus planned offers infinitely greater possibilities than a merely local institute.

Dr. Annie Jeffreys Myers, of Portland, has been elected auditor of the National Woman Suffrage association, now in session at Baltimore.
