ATHENA BREVITIES ADAMS HAPPENINGS

\$400 RAISED TO BACK THE YELLOW KID TEAM.

Expect Strong Aggregation—Quiet Election Chose J. D. Plamondon Mayor—Bob Lockhart Under Arrest and Gave a Bond to Appear for Trial—Fire Extinguisher Saves a House From Burning—Gone to Alberta—Frazier Company Opens With a Good House—Baptist Meetings at Helix.

Athena, March 9.—At a meeting of the citizens held in the Commercial club rooms Wednesday evening the sum of \$400 was subscribed for the purpose of supporting the "Yellow Kid" baseball team, which is being organized here.

A second meeting was held last night of which Mayor Plamondon was chairman. An athletic association was organized for Athena, and a board of directors was elected to take charge of the ball ground and suits.

The city election was rather quiet Tuesday, though there was some interest shown in the different candidates who were run in for diversion.

Mayor J. D. Plamondon, 108; David Taylor, present mayor, 21; councilman, C. A. Barrett, 117; T. J. Kirk, 127; A. B. McEwen, 124; M. L. Watts, 117; T. J. Kirk, who received the largest vote, will serve two years; recorder, O. G. Chamberlain, 128; treasurer, I. M. Kemp, 128; water commissioner, G. W. Gross, 128. David Taylor, the present mayor, declined to run, and did not know that his name was put up.

Bob Lockhart, an alleged dope fiend, was arrested in Athena a few days ago and was made to spend a night in the city jail. The next morning he was bound over by Justice Chamberlain in the sum of \$250 on the charge of petit larceny. Lockhart and a woman drove up from Pendleton, and soon after discovered indications that he had stolen a number of articles at different places. Officers found him and the woman in hiding in a bunk at a China joint near Clemon's chop mill, and soon after all the stolen articles were found. A search of the baggage of the pair resulted in the discovery of enough opium "to put the whole city of Hongkong into a seiza for 40 days and nights," are the words of Col. Boyd. Lockhart comes from a good family. His father owned the first hardware store in Athena. E. R. Cox purchased his store away back in the eighties, and the family removed to California.

For Woman's Suffrage. Miss Mary N. Chase, who spoke in the city Saturday evening on the woman suffrage question, has raised considerable enthusiasm in the community. A committee of 30 was organized, with Hon. Will M. Peterson at its head as chairman, and J. M. Craghead, secretary.

Monday morning an alarm called the fire department to the home of Dr. and Mrs. J. D. Plamondon, where a conflagration caused by a defective flue, was narrowly averted by the prompt action of Mr. Booher, who doused the contents of a fire extinguisher down the chimney.

Adams, March 9.—There was a meeting of the Adams fire department held Monday evening, and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Charles Otterstedt, chief; T. A. Llewellyn, assistant chief; Lawrence Llewellyn, second assistant; H. A. Richardson, president, and J. A. Winn, secretary and treasurer. M. A. Ferguson, who expects to leave shortly for Helix, tendered his resignation as chief, having served faithfully as chief of the volunteer fire department for seven years.

A well dressed and nice appearing couple drove into the city at a rapid rate Tuesday morning at 4 o'clock from Pendleton, and remained at the Commercial hotel until the passenger train passed through from Pendleton to Walla Walla, when they left for the Garden City. Austin Rice, before the enraged mother of the bride prevented it. A few minutes after the license was issued a message was received by the authorities from the mother, Mrs. Minnie Reynolds, who claimed the girl was only 15 years of age and the young man it was claimed was a stranded actor. The mother went after the girl, and all parties returned to Pendleton. It is claimed that a reconciliation has been effected, and that the couple will go into theatrical work in Spokane.

J. A. Baker has leased the chop mill in Adams from W. M. Nash, and is now conducting the same.

N. P. PROTESTS ASSESSMENT.

Claim to Be Taxed Much Too High in Washington. Jay Sedgwick, tax commissioner of the Northern Pacific Railway company, who paid over to the county this morning about \$50,000 in taxes for the N. P. company, left this afternoon for Ellensburg, says the Yakima Daily Republic. Mr. Sedgwick was asked what he thought about the result of the assessor's meeting in Olympia last January in regard to their raising the assessed valuation of the railways to \$14,520. "This is a matter which I don't much care to discuss," said Mr. Sedgwick. "The Northern Pacific is perfectly willing to pay its just proportion of the taxes, but does not like the idea of being discriminated against."

If the N. P. complained against paying the tax levy of 1904 will it not probably also kick about paying on the 1906 valuation of almost double the former amount?"

"The Northern Pacific won't kick about anything that's perfectly fair," continued the tax commissioner. "The assessors are giving us the worst of it."
