Extraordinary Bargains in Timber.
The big timber companies in north Idaho which have been getting their rafting logs for \$1.25 a thousand feet on the stump, are trembling lest individual timber holders wake up to the fact that they are only receiving about half market value.

C. J. Munson, state land commissioner, has returned from Rathdrum, where he sold 6320 acres of timber and land for the state. He reports that that section sold to the Lewis Lumber company for the magnificent sum of \$25,000 was not so heavily timbered as has been made to appear. He said:

"Our estimate on this land had been carefully made and showed 4,085,000 feet of white pine, 1,286,000 feet of yellow pine, 637,000 feet of red fir, 555,000 feet of tamarack, 60,000 feet of black pine, 812,000 feet of white fir, 1,170,000 cedar poles and 493,000 ties. The Lewis Lumber company paid an average of \$42 an acre or \$4.45 per thousand. The state still owns the 614 acres of land, having sold only the timber."

A strenuous effort was made by a number of the large companies to have the sale postponed and a proposition was made to the state that if the sale was postponed for one year these companies would take the land at the state's estimates and give \$3 per thousand for the white pine, whereas the state's valuation was only \$2.—Coeur d'Alene Press.

Searching for C. M. & St. P. Route.

Mr. H. W. Canfield, who lives in the north end of the county about five or six miles east of Princeton, has been in town for a day or two on business, returning home this morning. It is on his pretty home place, in a sharp bend of the Palouse river, on the line of the Washington, Idaho & Montana railroad, that he has platted a town that he has named Harvard. The railroad company has built a depot and water tank there and will make it a regular station. It is at the point where the road leaves the Palouse river and begins the ascent of Flat creek to the divide separating Palouse river from Bear creek. Steel has been laid past his place and the work of construction has been pushed rapidly during the past fine weather.

Mr. Canfield says that a crew of over 20 men are now engaged in running a preliminary line across that section of the country for the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul. Mr. Canfield says the chief surveyor of this party has on several occasions stated that he has been instructed to search out a route that will run north of Collins. This indicates a desire to keep

on high ground and leads to the belief that the entrance of the Milwaukee into Idaho will be made through the Lolo or the Fish creek pass.—Moscow Mirror.

Drove Over the Hose.

Lawrence Johnson, J. C. Wheeler and Thomas Foster, the three men arrested for driving over a section of city fire hose yesterday, were tried in police court today and a fine of \$20 was passed against each of the defendants. That sort of driving will be made so expensive that no one will care to indulge in it. Chief Two-good is determined to enforce the ordinance and put a stop to it, and thereby greatly lengthen the life of his hose.—Boise Capital News.

Grant's Agent Resigned.

E. W. Madox, O. R. & N. agent and operator at Grant's, has resigned his position and leaves today on No. 1 for southern California. This move was considered necessary on account of the health of Mrs. Madox, who has been a patient at The Dalles hospital for some time. The lady's physicians have recommended the southern California climate as a protection against the trouble with which she has been suffering.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Planting 21-Acre Orchard.

C. A. Neyland is in the city today from his fruit ranch below Altona. Mr. Neyland is planting about 21 acres to trees this season, and has a force of men busy now setting out 2500 peach and cherry trees. The irrigation motor in use is similar to the one on exhibition here last summer and it is doing effective work and will solve the problem of irrigation for the high river bars along the Snake and Clearwater rivers.—Lewiston Tribune.

The Northern Pacific has during the past several months shipped 300 Japanese from east of the mountains to Spokane and distributed them from that point throughout Washington and Idaho.

SHIPPING STOCK TO ALASKA.

Cattle and Sheep Sent North on Early Vessels.

With the sailing of the steamer Dirigo yesterday forenoon for Skagway there was marked the beginning of the livestock shipping season to the north, especially to the interior, says the Seattle Star. The Dirigo had 60 head of cattle and 157 sheep, the former to be taken on at Vancouver for the Pacific Cold Storage company, final destination being Dawson.

Within the next three or four weeks the interior stock shipments will be very heavy. This year there will be little scowling done with stock for Fairbanks, although Dawson stock will be sent down the river on scows. Stock for Fairbanks will be handled by the White Pass route and connecting steamer lines, as the extra precaution and time required in transporting stock through does not warrant the outlay which is occasioned by scowage.
