ECHO NEWS NOTES

J. H. KOONTZ WILL SELL SEVEN-BLOCK ADDITION.

Some Lambs Lost During Storm, But There Was No Damage to Crops—Wheat in Fine Condition—Water Will Be Turned Into Furnish Ditch Very Soon—Picnic and Carnival April 30 to May 1—Water Users' Stockholders' Meeting—A. L. Esteb Will Build Residence.

Echo, March 19.—J. H. Koontz, who owns considerable land about Echo, has decided to sell off about seven blocks of land between the mill race and depot grounds for town lots. This is a very desirable place for the building of homes, and is on the east side of the track. This will shortly be blocked out and sold. All available land is now being sold for homes and business houses in Echo.

The Storm.
The big storm the early part of the week did some damage to crops about Echo. There were reports of lambs being lost where lambing was going on. Joe Cunha, the well known sheepmen, having lost quite a number, and other sheepmen in the vicinity report small losses. The coldest weather in Echo was 19 above.

Furnish Ditch.
Water will be turned in the Furnish ditch as soon as the cement work on the ditch where it runs under the O. R. & N track is completed. This work will be done by the railroad company, and as soon as this is completed the water will be run in and tested. It is believed that the ditch will be in good running order in three weeks.

Cattle Shipped.
Four carloads of cattle were shipped Saturday to the Portland yards by V. F. McCullough and G. W. Vinson, each shipping two loads.
Frye-Bruhn's buyer was in the vicinity for several days, and purchased about 19 carloads from different parties, which will be shipped out the early part of the week.

held April 30 and May 1st, the local Eagles will also hold a carnival, which promises to be one of the best things ever attempted in Echo. The carnival and picnic will be held in the grove where the picnic has been held heretofore. The Eagles are arranging for a first-class vaudeville company, and will have many attractions, baseball and various sports. A committee now has the matter in charge.

Stockholders' Meeting.
The stockholders of the East Umatilla River Water Users' association, will hold a meeting at Hermiston, April 14th for the purpose of making a contract with the secretary of the interior, securing the payment of all expenses for the carrying out of the project and everything pertaining to the same. They were also authorized to close the subscription for stock on April 16th, after which time any one desiring to subscribe for stock must take steps through the secretary of the interior, recommended by the association. There are about 19,000 acres already subscribed.

The association must have the right of way before the secretary will approve of the carrying out of the project, and the association will try and have the same secured by this time, so that the advertising for bids for the same will be drawn up and published at once. It is expected that actual work will begin May 1st. This will be the most important meeting of the stockholders.

Mrs. Lizzie Jones of Athena, has leased the Hotel Hoskins, which is now being built, and will soon be completed.

O. B. Morton, government attorney for the East Umatilla Irrigation project has been in Echo for some time looking over the work of the project.

Mr. Morton was the principal attorney in the Salt River, Ariz., project, and is well versed on the legal work of irrigation projects.

R. N. Stanfield, Joseph Cunha, H. P. Carr and Pete Sheridan have purchased fine phonographs from a Pendleton firm.

Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Esteb let a contract Saturday to W. A. Morse for the erection of a fine dwelling on their lots near the city. This will be one of the most modern homes in the city. It will have hot and cold water and all conveniences.

Entertainment March 22—Application for Trout.

ONYX MINES IN MEXICO.

Extensive Fields on the Border Between Durango and Coahuila.

One of the most extensive fields of onyx marble in Mexico lies along the border between the states of Durango and Coahuila.

Rich beds of this marble have been found in the hummocks at the foot of the high mountains which fall within the jurisdiction of the Hacienda Jimulco and on both sides of the Aguanaval river. The most important of these marble beds lie west of the Mexican Central railway, being 20 kilometers from Peralta, at the foot of the high sierra on the way to Cuernavaca.

The beds east of the railway lie in a similar position in the hills at the bottom of deep valleys. Some are in the Viboras ravine, while others are near Paso de Calvo ranch, four or five kilometers from Norin station. The proximity of the railway, the quantity and beauty of the marble, unite two facilities for making these beds of easy exploitation. They are not only very extensive, but are important because of their accessibility.

With few exceptions the quality of the Jimulco onyx is good from the surface, though the deposits are the remains of ruined caverns. From this surface made to secure samples to send to expositions it is possible to calculate how much marble can be secured from a cut. It is estimated that the preliminary works for the extensive exploitation of the Cuernavaca will cause the removal of 200,000 cubic feet of marble.—Mexican Herald.

PIGMY ICELAND PONIES.

Pets in Parlors of London Society Twenty-Eight Inches High.

London society has a bad case of the zoologicals, says the London Post. Tiger cats, gentle little lemurs; gazelles, with their "soft brown eyes," fretful porcupines and ant-eaters have in turn been made pets, but they have all been dethroned as rulers of petdom by the parlor ponies of Iceland.

These tiny creatures are the funniest little things imaginable. They are no larger than a Newfoundland dog, their height is twenty-eight inches, slightly less than that of the ordinary table, are as woolly as sheep and quiet as lambs.

Seven of these little fellows were imported by Mr. Jamrach, the naturalist, and he insists that they are quite at home and well mannered in the house and that a baby might safely play with them. Two of the herd are chestnuts, two mouse, one bay, one black, but the "pick of the bunch," the smallest of all, has a long cream-colored coat and a tail that sweeps the floor.

All seven were brought at \$75 each on the first day of their exhibition. One of the customers is an intimate friend of the queen, so that it is quite probable that a pigmy pony will find a royal mistress.
