

# Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire

**High Priced Hay in Baker.**  
While there is no immediate danger of a shortage of hay in Baker county yet the stockmen are beginning to feel uneasy and yesterday the price jumped to \$11 a ton and one man offered \$25. The offer of \$25 a ton was made under circumstances where the proximity of the hay to the feeding grounds made it more valuable. G. H. Perkins on Lower Powder sold several tons of hay in the stack at \$11 a ton. In the afternoon another buyer said he would have paid \$25 for the same hay.

Last week John Brand purchased 11 tons of hay at \$6 and yesterday he was offered \$11 for the same. The advance in price is due to two causes, first the sudden change in weather, and second, to the fact that when the good weather came on a few weeks ago many feeders believing that spring was here, sold their surplus.—Baker City Herald.

### Bought 2650 Cattle.

One of the largest cattle deals made in the Lewiston country in many years has been closed during the past week. The information relative to the deal became public yesterday when A. V. McCarty, the stock buyer of Kamiah, completed the purchase of 500 head of steers which he secured under a contract for the Empire Cattle company of Helena, Mont. Included in Mr. McCarty's purchase are 200 head secured from Ralston Vollmer and Ben Reeves of this city. The Montana company has also secured through other contracts agreements from W. M. Clemens of Ananah, Bert Buchet of Pomeroy, John Lamb of Kamiah, and El Hickman and Sol Caldwell of Lapwai, about 2,150 head, making the total purchases to date 2650 head. From Mr. Buchet about 500 head were secured.—Lewiston Tribune.

### Found Dead on Mabton Trail.

The belated news was received here today that George Brouchou was found dead on the trail south of Mabton this week by a searching party. Brouchou left Mabton Saturday at 3 p. m. with a friend, with whom he intended to ride a part of the way to his home. Brouchou left the man at a point on the trail in order to take a short cut to his ranch and that was the last seen of him until his body was found by one of the parties sent in search of him.

His body was found in a position that would indicate that the man had become lost and had decided to spend the night where he was. His shoes were under his head and the body was in a position of repose. There were no marks of any kind on his body and the coroner decided that

cause of death was unquestionably freezing in the severe storm of Saturday night.—Yakima Republic.

### Thirty-Six Below Zero.

Almost since the blizzard of Sunday it has been extremely cold in Tipton and the intervening country as far as the John Day valley. Superintendent Barton of the Sumpter Valley, says the temperature has been reported at 36 degrees below for several days. Mr. Barton made a hurried trip to Canyon City, returning last night and says that on the road he saw hundreds of birds drop dead from cold. Around Tipton the birds are dying off rapidly. One man picked up 60 in one day.—Baker City Herald.

### Holcomb's Body Found.

The body of William Holcomb, who was lost November 28 of last year, while on his way to the Big Fiddler was found yesterday morning by a couple of miners who were on their way to Boise from the south fork of the Boise river, where they had been mining. The body was on the slope on the south side of the Boise river, about 14 miles from Neal and about 15 miles from where Holcomb was last seen at Dan Shamrock's camp near the Balbach mill.—Boise Statesman.

### Will Enlarge Sawmill.

W. R. Kevitt of Boise, Idaho, was in North Powder the first of the week looking after his interests here. Mr. Kevitt recently purchased H. O. Gorham's sawmill and will enlarge the mill to about 30,000 capacity per day. Mr. Kevitt has already ordered about \$4000 worth of new machinery, which will be here in about 19 days. In this shipment includes machinery for a lathe mill and sticker. Mr. Kevitt has made arrangements to have logs shipped from Telecast to this place.—North Powder News.
