GENERAL NEWS.

The body of Maudie Newbury was found in the lake at Beacon Hill park, Victoria, sanding bolt upright, with both feet imbedded in the ankles in the muddy bottom, and her head barely submerged.

Alfreda Woods, a 18-year-old chambermaid at Portland, was accused by R. N. Bennett, a transient roomer, of stealing \$100 left under his pillow. He could not prove the charge, and Miss Woods was discharged.

William ("Kid") Hulen, the well-known expert baseball player, has been missing from his home at Ashland since February 20, and has not been seen elsewhere since that date, that is known to any relative or acquaintance.

At Sandpoint, Idaho, the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Nelson got hold of a 22-caliber hammerless rifle, pointed it at his mother and pulled the trigger before he could be hindered. The bullet struck the woman in the right temple, killing her instantly.

George ("Red") Davis was arrested, after a chase with robbery W. J. Alexander of \$400. When the day came for the preliminary hearing, Alexander had jumped a bond bill and disappeared, and the charge against Davis was dismissed for want of evidence.

A bloody "smash" fight took place in Spanaway park, Tacoma, last Sunday. Young Fessio of Tacoma, beat "Kid" Miller of Spokane, in 15 rounds. It was a desperate battle, and both principals badly injured. There is talk of action by the police to punish the principals.

Mrs. Walter Quigley, aged 35 years, killed herself with arsenic at her home just north of Vancouver, Wash., because her husband accused her of infidelity. They had been married 16 years, and Mrs. Quigley bore an absolutely untarnished reputation. They had one son, aged 2 years.

Joe Scott, aged 62, of Spokane, is dead at Naples, Italy. He was a heavy property owner in Spokane, owned a cattle ranch of 25,000 acres in Nevada, and was probably worth at least \$1,750,000. He was a personal friend of Roosevelt from the time the latter made his first investments in Montana during the early '80s.

The boiler of Meyers' sawmill, near Estacada, Ore., blew up. It was a complete wreck, and the building housing it, as well. The front end of the boiler was blown 15 rods. A young boy was the only person nearby at the time, and he was inside the shed, but escaped entirely unharmed aside from being "considerable shook up" when thrown to the ground by the concussion.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The state of Texas, through its attorney general, is about to bring action against the Standard and other oil companies, the line of attack being the same as adopted by Hadley, of Missouri.

The steamer Silvertown, which on March 24 began laying the Commercial Cable company's cable which is to connect Manila with Shanghai, is now 315 miles from Manila, heading toward Shanghai.

Charles G. Holland is dead by Bright's disease, aged 60 years, at New York. He had been in the employ of the Associated Press 40 years, and for many years was the New York city manager.

A strike of truck drivers of Chicago is probable, and sure to occur unless the employers grant certain concessions as to wages for overtime, size of loads, etc. The strike last year was of 79 days' duration.

Fifty-six arrests have been made in Kansas City of persons charged with illegal registration for the coming municipal election. The city Law and Order league is responsible for the arrests, and more are expected to be made following the same charge.

Jacob Schiff, the New York banker, has arrived at Tokio, and the Japanese papers are full of eulogistic comment on his services rendered in raising Japanese loans in America. The bankers of the city are preparing to give him a magnificent reception.

The National Electric company of Milwaukee, has gone to a forced sale as a result of the default of Banker Frank G. Higgins, who is now in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth. The plant invoiced at \$1,550,639, with liabilities of \$1,242,000. A Chicago syndicate bid it in.

A saloon row at Aguilar, Cal., resulted in the death of Samuel Vigil and Andrew Martinez and the wounding of City Marshal Davis and F. M. Vigil. Both the dead men were shot by Davis, who was badly stabbed and beaten. F. M. Vigil was clubbed while attempting to shoot Davis.

It is regarded as likely that the present congress will take the internal revenue off all forms of alcohol known as "denatured" (or wholly poisonous to the animal system.) This will be done to promote their use for fuel, lighting and heating, and is expected to prove an immense stimulus to their manufacture and sale, as they can be made from any vegetable product containing starch.

AMERICA IS FIRST

STIRRING SENTIMENTS
FROM OREGON'S FRIEND.

Roland D. Grant, formerly of the White Temple in Portland, Makes a Stir in Salt Lake Congress—Compares Western Scenery to That of Europe—Would See America First.

Roland D. Grant, traveler, lecturer, author and enthusiastic lover of Oregon, formerly pastor of the Baptist White Temple in Portland, delivered one of the most stirring addresses heard at the "See America First" congress, recently held in Salt Lake City. The object of the congress was to stir up an interest in American scenery, and to encourage tourists to visit American points of interest before going to Europe.

In comparing western scenery with that of Europe, Mr. Grant said:

"The Rhine is more than matched by our Columbia and Snake rivers, and the history of the Columbia can match the Rhine in delightful story. Grant's causeway and Fingal's cave are matched a hundred times in Idaho, where the seas of ancient lava have formed a hexagonal basalt that looks like the spiral column of yest ancient giant forces.

"The Colorado canyon, with its mile of depth and dozen miles from shore to shore, makes all similar scenery of the old world diminutive in the extreme. The Yellowstone park stands forever alone, the wonder piece of the world, where God is still at work finishing the crust of the earth.

"Between the Yosemite and Kings River valley of the south and the almighty Yoho valley of the north, with its enormous glaciers, there lie lesser craters in the earth's surface, making an array of these enormous upturned vaults to astonish the world. While in waterfalls of every possible size and height and combination we have so many that it is really a confusion to remember their names. There are places where our mighty cliffs show a dozen of these great catenars from some precipitous height, all to be seen at a single glance.

Need of Home Pride.

"If the money that was spent in war to win the Philippine Islands, and the money that we then paid to buy them, and the money that was spent in Manila bay to get them after we bought them, and the money spent to keep them since we did not get them—if all this money had been spent to prepare the vast areas of this western world for the civilization that is ready to receive it, it would have been a more profitable use of funds. This would have been an act of civilization indeed, and a fair field for the exercise of that superabundant genius, which they think they have in Washington for the benefit of the rest of the world.

"Underneath these deserts are rivers of living water waiting to come to the surface to transform all the regions into gardens of bloom. This is the land flowing with milk and honey, grass for the cows and flowers for the bees. This is the land of promise, the land whither ye go to possess it is a land of hills and valleys and drinketh the rain of the water of heaven."

"In the east I was asked if it did not rain all the time on the Pacific coast. And I replied that it really was a web-footed country and that all children born in the Oregon region had their 10 toes all grown together. (Laughter). Of course, they have grown together. Everything grows out here.

"When asked if western cities were as well laid out as eastern cities, I replied: 'No, but they will be laid out when they have been dead as long.'"

FRUITMEN TO COMBINE.

Michiganders Will Get Together for Mutual Benefit.

Fenville Mich., March 27.—Delegates representing every district in the fruit belt of Michigan are assembled here to attend the meeting called by the State Horticultural society, for the purpose of bringing about a federation of the fruit growers of this state. Such a federation is considered of great importance to improve the fruit marketing conditions and thus preventing serious losses to the fruit-growers. It is planned to have one central officer, who will keep the growers posted in regard to the demands for fruit in every market, the ruling prices, so as to regulate the supply and keep up the prices. It is quite probable that some effort will be made to bring about the adoption of a law requiring each grower to stamp all sealed packages of fruit sold by him, with his name and address.

For the Starving Japanese.

Boston, Mass., March 27.—An entertainment for the benefit of the starving people of Japan will be given by the Japanese of Boston and vicinity in the Town hall of Brookline this evening. A highly interesting program has been prepared for the occasion, which includes demonstrations of the Japanese art of fencing, of Jiu Jitsu and Kenjitsu, sword dances, music, singing, dancing and juggling. N. Kawasaki of the Boston university, will deliver a lecture of the daily life and customs of the Japanese people, which he will illustrate with stereopticon views. A number of prominent society women are the patronesses of the entertainment.
