GENERAL NEWS.

The exports from the United States for the fiscal year 1905 amounted to \$700,000,000 as compared with \$685,000,000 for the year 1904.

There is a wild stampede on from Virginia City and Carson, Nev., into Churchill county, where rich strikes are reported at Cooney Springs.

Portland will have a new bank—the Bankers & Lumbermen's, with a capital of \$250,000. D. A. Pelton, a lumberman, and F. H. Rothschild, are at the head of the institution.

An \$8,000,000 power plant for the development of electricity, will be built this summer on King's river, Fresno county, Cal. Boston and New York parties are back of the project.

Concessions have been granted to a syndicate by the government, for the building of 100 miles of railroad on each of the islands of Cebu, Negros and Panay. Native labor will be utilized as much as possible.

Governor Pennypacker has issued a statement announcing that Pennsylvania has recovered all the public funds, amounting to \$1,020,000, on deposit in the Enterprise National bank of Allegheny at the time of its failure.

Stanley Hallett of Medical Lake, Wash., has the finest collection of trees in all the northwest. He is said to have at least one growing specimen of every tree that is indigenous in the northwest, and many that are not.

The tariff on all American food-stuffs has been taken completely off by the government of Ecuador for a period of five months, or until the next harvest is garnered. Almost universal drouth, combined with earthquakes has put a large per cent of the people on the verge of famine.

According to the official stenographers, the present congressional house of representatives has worked off (on the floor of the house) 2,775,000 words. They estimate that the total for the entire session, including debates in the committee rooms, also transcribed, will approximate 10,000,000.

A great California industry is the manufacture of salt from sea water. In Alameda county 100,000 tons were produced last year. Only a few years ago the state imported all its salt. Now it produces enough for its own use—which is enormous owing to the fisheries and packing houses—and exports large quantities as well.

Merchant S. Waters has begun the erection of a store building and warehouse at Rosevelt, on the north bank of the Columbia, opposite Arlington.

John E. Brooks is dead at McMinnville, where he had lived continuously 54 years. He was 83 years of age and a Mason and Odd Fellow ever since he attained his majority.

There are 4099 Italians in Portland, and they last year sent \$4000 to aid the sufferers by the Calabria, Italy, earthquake. It is probable they will send a like amount for the relief of the sufferers by the eruption of Vesuvius.

At Milwaukie, Oregon, stands a frame school house erected upon its present site, just 59 years ago. It has been sold to the Milwaukie band boys, who will move it across the street and fit it up for gymnasium purposes.

In a sheep camp 12 miles from Mountainhome, Idaho, William Brady, one of a crew of seven herders, accidentally shot and killed himself with a .38-caliber rifle. He was a single

BOUNDARY DISPUTE

WASHINGTON MIGHT GET A LONG STRIP OFF IDAHO.

Ancient Surveys Failed to Hit the Fortieth Meridian, as Provided for in the Organic Act, and Senator Heyburn Has Introduced a Bill for a Resurvey, Which Will Amount in Fact to a Quieting of Title—The Erroneous Line Was Run in 1873 by Reeves and Dennison.

Senator Heyburn has introduced a bill into congress providing for a resurvey of the boundary line between Idaho and Washington. From Lewiston, north, the 40th degree of longitude, west from Washington, is designated as the boundary line, and monuments mark the line as surveyed in 1873 by a boundary commission.

More recent surveys of the country prove that the state line is not located upon the 40th-degree of longitude, and therefore congress will be asked to permit of a resurvey of the state line.

Owing to the mistake made in locating the state line at some distance from the 40th degree, which is designated in the organic act of the two states, a number of towns along the line are in doubt as to which state they are really located in.

Lewiston is very near the 40th degree of longitude and if the old survey is a few seconds off, that city may be within the state of Washington, instead of Idaho. Other towns located very near the present state line are Moscow, Garrison, Viola, Palouse, Alameda, Farmington, Seltice, Phoenix, Liberty Lake, Hauser and Newport. A resurvey may give Washington a strip of immensely rich farming land lying just east of the state line from Lewiston, northward. The actual location of the 40th degree of longitude is a few seconds east of the present state line as marked by government monuments and as accepted by the two states as the actual boundary.

As shown by the report of the interior department, the state line was surveyed by Reeves and Dennison in 1873, but their survey has been proven erroneous in many instances, and there is much doubt about the accurate location of a great deal of country lying along the 40th meridian west from Washington, which is supposed to form practically all of the boundary between these two states.

It has been the custom in times past to make no resurveys of state boundaries except upon request of the states interested, and the secretary of the interior recommends that the Washington-Idaho boundary be not resurveyed until Idaho and Washington express a desire for the survey. This will be done, though the Heyburn bill may be passed with a proviso that the resurvey shall not be made until requested by the two states involved.
