Oregon Is More Thoroughly Organized
This Year Than Ever Before and
forces Feel Assured.

Never before in the history of Ore-
gon have the equal suffrage forces
of the state been as thoroughly orga-
nized as now and every feature now
looks favorable for the success of the
amendment giving women the right
to vote if they desire.

Some of the leading speakers in the
United States will be brought to the
state during the coming campaign.
Among them is Miss Anna Shaw,
president of the National Woman suf-
frage association, who is now in west-
ern Oregon doing active campaign
work for the cause. Miss Shaw is one
of the very foremost women orators
in the world and has an international

come to Pendleton for one night dur-
ing the progress of the campaign, the
exact date not having been fixed yet.
