Denouement in Baruth Case.
Mrs. Josephine Baruth, waiting trial in the Spokane superior court on a charge of murdering C. L. Baruth, is said to have been a divorced woman at the time she shot Baruth in their home. Mrs. Baruth was divorced from Baruth 10 years ago in Minnesota. They lived apart about three years.

When asked today if they were remarried and when, she said: "I can't talk about that until after the trial." Friends, however, say that they understand there was no second marriage. It is said Baruth started off to town with her for the purpose of remarrying, but before they reached there he changed his mind and told her a marriage ceremony was unnecessary because the divorce was illegal; that to satisfy her, he took her to a lawyer who told her the divorce was of no effect. Later, it is reported by friends, Mr. Baruth said to her he would kill her if she ever said anything about it. They lived together as man and wife for about seven years just prior to his death. One child was born to them during this time. He had an insurance policy made out to her as wife, and she recognized her everywhere as his wife. The insurance policy he surrendered shortly before he died.—Spokesman-Review (Medical Lake Cor.)

Sunday was the first day in the history of Caldwell when the saloons were all closed from midnight the night before until Monday morning, and was the beginning of the Sunday closing ordinance. The saloon men of the town complied strictly with the law, keeping their curtains down and their premises locked. Boise River Is High.
Everybody in Boise is complaining today about the disagreeable unseasonable weather. Much December weather here is unusually more agreeable than the brand sent out today in Boise. But there is always a compensation somewhere. The river has been rising so rapidly of late, that a day or two more of warm weather would have sent a heavy overflow across Central addition, that might have done irreparable damage. The present stage is higher than ever before known at this season of the year. It is about stationary today, and by evening, on account of the cooler weather, it will no doubt fall rapidly.—Boise Capital News.

Enormous Growth of Postal Business.
The business of the Boise postoffice has increased in volume 200 per cent since 1904, according to a report received here yesterday by Postoffice Inspector C. L. Wayland, in charge of the Spokane division. In this respect Boise lends every city in the northwest division, including the states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and the territory of Alaska, with the exception of Seattle. The gain in the business of the Seattle office for the same time is reported to be 201.3 per cent.

According to the same report, Bellevue, Wash., becomes a first-class postoffice city beginning July 1.—Boise Statesman.

Land Boom Around Pasco.
Sixteen acres of land on the Columbia river, south of town, sold this week at \$150 an acre. Lots between the town and the river are selling at higher prices than prevailed during the boom of a year ago. Several real estate transfers were made yesterday and today. The railroad activity hereabouts is causing lots to rise rapidly in value. The passing of the Palouse project has had no harmful effect on land values, which have steadily advanced since the unfavorable report was made.—Spokesman-Review (Pasco Cor.)
