today received a letter announcing the
finding of a body in the Columbia
river, three miles east of Paterson

The body was dressed only in drawers
and laced railroad shoes and is badly
decomposed. The man was about
5 feet 11 inches tall and weighed 160
pounds, had dark complexion, and
three upper and four lower front
teeth were missing. No other clue to
his identity is obtainable. Commis-
sioner Carey referred the letter to
Coroner Hedger, of Kiona, who will
probably order the body removed
from the river and buried.—Prosser
