### GENERAL NEWS.

J. E. McDaniel is dead at New Orleans. For 35 years he was the Associated Press correspondent from that point. He was a confederate soldier from Alabama, and does not leave a living relative.

Thirty-four indictments against 19 bridge companies and agents, alleged to be in a trust, and to have charged from three to five times the proper price for bridges in Ohio, have been returned by the grand jury at Lima.

The striped bass was first introduced into California waters five years ago. Recently the largest striped bass on record was caught in the lower Sacramento river. It weighed 70 pounds, or five times the average weight attained by the largest of the species usually.

The American government has established the first permanent leper colony in the Philippines, on Cullion island, and 200 lepers have been taken there from Cebu. All cases discovered in the future will be sent there. Four Catholic nuns have volunteered their services and are now en route to the settlement to devote their lives to nursing the afflicted.

Homer Grafton, a private of the 12th infantry, shot and killed a native on Guimaras island, Philippines. A court martial acquitted him, but the civil courts sentenced him to 12 years imprisonment, which was sustained by the Philippine supreme court. He has appealed to the United States supreme court.

Albert Voss, aged 24, a carpenter's apprentice, stooped down in front of an unfinished building in St. Louis to pick up a hammer which had fallen from the building, when another hammer fell five stories, struck him on the back of the head, split his skull and broke his neck. Death was, of course, instantaneous.

On May 26, 57 light earthquakes shook Houghton, Mich., and vicinity. Buildings rocked, and in several places there are cracks in the earth six inches wide, the disturbance seeming to center in the Atlantic mines, which shut down two weeks ago as the result of similar disturbances. Great alarm prevails.

David Rankin, of Nodaway county, Missouri, will found an industrial college at St. Louis. Rankin is the second wealthiest exclusive farmer in the United States, and is worth \$2,000,000. He is 76 years of age and has lived in northwestern Missouri 60 years. Before the war he refused to own slaves, though he was not an abolitionist.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

Near Seaside, Arthur Miller, aged 12 years, was badly gored by a bull, but may recover.

The Gerhardt-Bradick company will not rebuild the mill recently burned at Iola, Idaho, during a forest fire.

McMinnville's new water system will be completed by September 1. It taps an inexhaustible supply of spring water in the hills.

The first burial in the new Rose City cemetery, in East Portland, took place May 27, when the body of Jacob Koch was laid therein.

At Eugene, Ovid J. Kizer was killed by the kick of a horse on the upper part of his face. He lived in great agony for several days.

Aurora, Barlow, Canby, Hubbard and Gervais are now all furnished with electricity from one central plant located at the first named place.

The Northern Pacific will be double-tracked from Portland to Vancouver. The company has long held an option

on all the right of way and additional terminal grounds necessary.

At Linton, Antonio Tomaso, a sawmill employee, had his left hand sawn entirely off and his right hand badly mangled. He lately came to America, and has a family in Italy.

Gas leaked from a piece of old and defective rubber tube and caused the death of Carl L. Escherich at 840 Second street, Portland. The tube connected the jet with a reading lamp, and when the lamp was turned off the gas continued to flow through the orifices in the rotten tube.

William Malcolm, who is charged in Passaic, N. J., with embezzling \$150,000 of the funds of the Passaic Building & Loan association, was arrested in Seattle at his mercantile store, where he has been in business for four years. The alleged defalcation occurred five years ago, when Malcolm was the secretary of the loan association.

### THE BEST WESTERN STATES.

**Equal Suffrage States Lead All in Development.**

The following facts concerning industrial conditions in equal suffrage states of the Pacific coast are offered in evidence to the voters of Oregon:

According to the last census, in the past 10 years population increased 30 per cent in Colorado, 32 per cent in Utah, 49 per cent in Wyoming and 88 per cent in Idaho. In Oregon it increased only 40 per cent.

The value of manufactures increased \$1 per cent in Wyoming, 137 per cent in Utah, 142 per cent in Colorado, and 187 per cent in Idaho. In Oregon it increased only 11 per cent.

The value of farm property increased 151 per cent in Colorado, 237 per cent in Utah, 362 per cent in Idaho and 421 per cent in Wyoming. In Oregon it increased only 100 per cent.

According to the last census, the average earnings of men engaged in farm and factory work were \$512.23 per year in Utah, \$543.68 in Idaho, \$612.61 in Colorado, and \$618.54 in Wyoming. In Oregon they were only \$483.58.

During the last 10 years, according to the census, the value of manufactures increased \$8 for each person in Idaho and Wyoming, \$24 for each person in Utah, and \$37 for each person in Colorado. It fell off \$20 for each person in Oregon.

These figures prove clearly that equal suffrage does not hurt a state's development.

The protest of the big corporations merely shows their opposition to anything that will increase the power of the plain people. Many of the corporations that signed are all controlled by a few persons. In these cases half a dozen separate signatures represent only so many different tentacles of one and the same big octopus.

The initiative and referendum are the chief defense of the people's rights. It is worthy of note that the three rich society women who asked the corporations to protest, spoke against the initiative and referendum in their circular.

The Federated Trades Council of Portland has just passed unanimously a resolution offered by the women of the Garment Workers' union, endorsing the equal suffrage amendment, and calling attention to the fact that the great corporations which are the enemies of the people are also the enemies of justice to women.

## MINERS SATISFIED

GRANITE PEOPLE AGREE ON RESERVE POLICY.

Committee of Grant County Miners Hold Conference With D. B. Sheller and Come to Satisfactory Agreement as to Range Distribution—Peace in the Mining Region.

That the miners of Grant county are satisfied with the management of the Blue mountain forest reserve this year is shown by the following from the Granite Gem:

The committee sent from this place to represent the miners and residents of the Granite district at the forest supervisor's meeting at Austin last Friday returned home much pleased and encouraged that their petition will be granted, says the Gem. A meeting was held in the city hall Wednesday evening at which the report of the committee was read, and as the report clearly shows what was done, it is printed in full:

Granite, Ore., May 20, 1906.

To the Citizens of Granite and vicinity: We, the undersigned, your committee, appointed to attend the forest reserve meeting at Austin, May 18, beg leave to report that on that occasion we met the superintendent of the Blue mountain reserve, D. B. Sheller, and laid your petition before him, which was favorably considered and filed.

As he was very busy at that time he instructed us to say to you that as the matter of mining camps in the forest reserve appeared to have been overlooked by the department, in the matter of allotment, hence he would have to give your matter some attention; and looking over your map expressed the belief that the amount reserved should be large enough to protect the entire water shed. All of which he would determine on further personal inspection.

He wished further to inform you that this portion of the reserve presents many serious difficulties at this time, which would necessarily take some time to surmount, but that you could rest assured although there would be some sheep in this section of the county from June 15 to October 21, 1906, owing to the crowded condition of the ranges throughout the state, such measures would be had as to prevent them seriously interfering with the pasturing of your stock; and certainly they would not be allowed to in any way contaminate any waters used for domestic purposes.

He further asked that every settler use his best endeavors to keep his office informed as to any infraction of this rule, and further, that the cooperation of the settlers was highly necessary to the speedy adjustment of the laws to the local conditions, and while there would be many seeming delays, the department intended to act as quickly as possible to render the most good to the most residents and settlers, and the segregation of capital would be allowed no preference.

### NORTH COAST SELECTS ROUTE.

Will Endeavor to Cross the Yakima Reservation.

Yakima, June 1.—The North Coast railway has just completed the work of notifying some of the Indians of the reservation that it would apply to the secretary of the interior for a right of way for its railway through their lands. This work was done by Elma Dean of Sunnyside, and Lancaster Spencer of Toppenish. Notices had been prepared for them by the attorney for the railway and the notices were served on all those owning lands within the proposed right of way.

The North Coast road will cross the Yakima river into the reservation at a point about two miles northwest of Granger. This is almost due east of Toppenish, a distance of about 1 1/2 miles. From there the road will run northwest in an almost straight line to the Parker siding on the Northern Pacific. Crossing the Northern Pacific at Parker siding the North Coast will bear a little to the west and then parallel the Northern Pacific through the Union gap and to this place.

The distance of the road from Wapato will be about three-quarters of a mile. From the Yakima river eastward the road will pass through Granger, crossing the Sunnyside spur of the Northern Pacific below that place, and continuing on to the new town of Fairview, thence to the Columbia river. Just where it will cross the Columbia has not been definitely settled on.

The application for a right of way through the reservation will be made to the secretary of the interior as soon as the papers can be prepared and forwarded to Washington. The land that will be used has all been allotted to the Indians and will have to be paid for. The application for a right of way through the Rainier forest reserve was made some time ago.

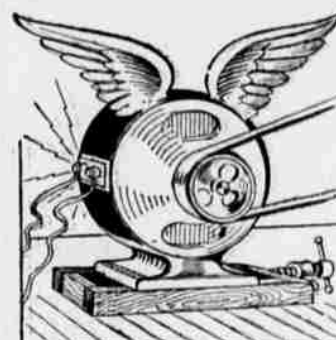
