In Both Cases Desertion Is Urged By the Plaintiff.

Two divorce cases were filed in the circuit court today and in each instance a separation was asked for on the ground of desertion.

William A. Rulston sued Elvina D. Rulston for divorce, the case being filed by Peterson & Peterson. The two were married at Hartford, Kan., in 1873, and subsequently moved to Athena. The wife evidently became dissatisfied with her married state and left her spouse to return to her home in Kansas.

Bessie E. Rolfe vs. George E. Rolfe is the title of the other suit, and it was filed by J. E. Burdette, of Arlington. The Rolfes were married at Salem in 1900, and the plaintiff alleges desertion on the part of the defendant.

TO TEST FREIGHT RATES.

Washington Roads and Commission Will Confer.

When Harry M. Adams, assistant traffic manager of the Great Northern, returns from St. Paul, a conference between the traffic and legal departments of the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Union Pacific will be held to outline a defense on the joint rate and distributing rate fights to be made in Colfax and Walla Walla this month before the state railroad commission, says an Olympia dispatch. The three roads are interested to an almost like degree in the defense of these suits and will agree upon a course of action, says the Seattle Times.

The O. R. & N. would be the principal sufferer if a decision were given by the railroad commission ordering the roads to make joint rates on wheat from O. R. & N. territory to Puget sound points.

But the principle involved in such a decision is likely to affect any of the lines elsewhere in the state and might at some time become a vital issue with one of the Hill roads. For that reason they will assist in resisting a joint rate order. On the question of the equity of distributing rates the three lines have identical interests.

VERDICT OF GUILTY

STONE WAS CONVICTED
JURY OUT SHORT TIME

Stone Did Not Waive Time, and Sentence Is Not Yet Passed—Holdup Man Gets Two Years in the Penitentiary, While the Men Who Robbed the North Fork Section House Each Got Three Years—District Attorney Phelps Was Severe in His Strictures Upon Stone.

In the case of Oscar C. Stone, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses, the jury returned a verdict of guilty this afternoon. Sentence has not yet been passed upon the defendant, as he did not care to waive time for sentence.

The trial of Stone was resumed this morning after having been postponed from yesterday afternoon. The greater part of the forenoon today was consumed with the hearing of evidence in the case.

Shortly before 11 o'clock the attorneys began their arguments to the jury and the same were concluded just before noon. In his closing address, District Attorney Phelps said he lamented the fact that one who had been admitted to the bar should so act as to be placed on trial for a felony. However, he said, no consideration should be shown the defendant because of his legal standing, and referred to Stone as "a wart on the nose of the profession."

The jury was out but a short time when a verdict of guilty was returned.

Penitentiary for Three Years.

Three of the prisoners in the county jail were brought before Judge Ellis today for sentence. They were D. D. Lewis, who pleaded guilty to being in a holdup at Echo, and George Hall and Charles Snyder, who robbed the section house at North Fork. Lewis was given a sentence of two years in the penitentiary, while Hall and Snyder were each given three years in the same institution.

LIGHTS AND POWER RESUMED.

Policemen and Everybody Else Greatly Relieved.

For the first time since the memorable evening of May 23, when the lights went out at the beginning of the flood, Pendleton was lighted by electricity last night. During the two weeks which ensued after the current was off the people were compelled to rely upon candles and lamps for lights, with the result that the electricity was warmly welcomed yesterday.

Among those who rejoiced at the return of the lights are the night policemen. While the city has been without street lights the officers have been in nightly dread of some out-

rage being committed in the darkness, and accordingly have been forced to keep a much sharper vigil than usual. It was doubtless largely due to this and the fact that all suspicious characters were forced to leave town immediately after the flood, that no depredations were committed. During the 13 nights in which the town was in darkness not an arrest was made for anything other than the usual offences, nor was anything in the nature of a holdup or robbery reported.
