Fight at Ball Game.

Today's ball game was a disgrace to the great national game. It was marred by a free-for-all fight which resulted in the sheriff of Washington county and his deputy and one other player being arrested and fined \$10 each. The contesting teams were those of Webster and Caldwell, and while the fight occurred in the fourth inning the game was finished, resulting in a score of 8 to 1 in favor of Webster.

It seems the Webster team came to Caldwell with blood in their eyes and with the determination to run in the most scores by any means. There was considerable wrangling from the beginning, which culminated in a general mixup in the fourth, when Webster's first baseman, deputy sheriff of Washington county, struck one of the Caldwell players.

This precipitated a fight, which was joined by Webster's manager, Sheriff Landman, of that place, and things were fast coming to a critical point when Sheriff Nichols and a deputy put a stop to the affray, which resulted in the arrest stated above.—Caldwell News.

O. R. & N. Improvements.

Bids will be asked for by the O. R. & N. company this week on construction of 17 miles of railroad from Troutdale to Bonneville. The work is said to be very heavy and will cost the railroad company upwards of \$500,000.

The company's purpose is to secure a straighter line between the two points. The present track, while desirable so far as easy grades are concerned, is too crooked to suit the requirements of modern railroading. The large improvements that have been carried on for two years on the O. R. & N. main line have brought the operating standard to a high point and the section between Bonneville and Troutdale is not up to the mark. Surveys have been completed by Chief Engineer Hoske's men and contracts for rock work and grading will be let immediately. A large part of the 17 miles to be constructed is in basaltic rock and a vast amount of dynamite will have to be used in the work.—The Dalles Chronicle.

When the News Reached Lostine.

The terrible storms and floods that swept over the Umatilla and Walla Walla valleys last week were the worst that have visited that section during the past 25 years. The towns of Pendleton and Walla Walla were flooded and while the loss of life was small, the property loss was very great, amounting in the aggregate to several hundred thousand dollars. About 10 miles of the O. R. & N. company's track between Pendleton and Meacham was washed out, including several bridges, causing great delay and damage.—Lostine Democrat.

Mashed Off Three Fingers.

Joe Nibley, an employee of the O. R. & N. working with a construction crew up in the mountains, met with an accident that cost him three fingers. He and several other men were carrying a steel rail when all but Nibley dropped the burden. He was jerked off his feet and three fingers caught between the two rails. He was brought to this city on the early train yesterday morning and his wounds dressed by Dr. Bacon. He lives at Perry and is not considered seriously injured.—La Grande Observer.

Yakima School Census.

North Yakima has a school population of 2663. This is 252 more than the census of 1905 showed.

The work of taking the census was completed Saturday by Prof. James Bever and his assistants. They were two weeks making the enumeration of district No. 7, in which North Yakima is located. The increase is up to the average of previous years. Five years ago there were between 1200 and 1300 pupils of school age in the city and yearly the increase has been about 250.—Yakima Republic.

Was Put Out of Business.

M. Jacobsen, formerly of Baker City, but for the past six months in the wholesale liquor business in Ontario, was put out of business completely by the county going prohibition. He closed up shop and left, coming to Baker Friday and leaving here some time yesterday or Saturday. E.
