SECOND ANNUAL COLT SHOW GREAT SUCCESS.

Proposed to Organize a Permanent Horse Exhibit Association—Total Indebtedness of School District Been Reduced to \$877.58—Mrs. Cynthia Turner's Will Will Be Contested; \$12,000 Estate in Controversy—Sale of Fine Farm Horse—Suit on Promissory Note.

Athena, June 21.—The second annual colt show held at Athena Saturday was a success in every particular. Over 100 head of horses and colts were in the parade, and on the exhibition grounds. The following named gentlemen were chosen as judges: George Haggabone, Walla Walla; F. M. Mansfield, Athena; J. N. B. Gerking, Athena; L. T. McFride, Weston; D. H. Preston, Athena.

It is now proposed to organize and incorporate an association, the purpose of which will be to give an exhibition in Athena each year at which colts and horses may be shown in competition, with the object of creating interest in the higher breeding of horses. It has been proposed that a meeting be called in the near future for the purpose of taking steps to organize an association of this character.

School Director.

At the annual school meeting held in the city Monday, M. L. Watts was elected to the office of director on the board, and O. G. Chamberlain was elected clerk of the board. One year ago the district had an outstanding indebtedness of \$6345.97, of which amount \$6000 was the bonded indebtedness.

For several years the district has borne a school tax levy of 15 mills, with the result that at the present time the total amount of the district indebtedness is but \$877.58. In other words, the debt during the past year has been reduced \$5467.49. The reduction of the indebtedness includes the wiping out of the interest-bearing bonds and there is now but one outstanding warrant of \$1600, and with the cash on hand of \$122.42, leaves the total indebtedness \$877.58.

The game of baseball played last Sunday between the Colts and the Has Beens, resulted in favor of the Colts by a score of 10 to 9. The game was interesting from start to finish and was well attended.

A petition, contesting the last will and testament of Mrs. Cynthia Turner, deceased, has been filed in the circuit court. The contestants are Alvin F. Turner, Horace B. Turner, Ida A. Clark, Harry E. Turner, all represented in the case by Peterson & Peterson of this city, and Carter, Raley & Bailey, of Pendleton. The petition contains 14 pages of typewritten matter, among the allegations being that Oliver C. Turner exercised undue influence over Cynthia A. Turner, whereby the contestants were defrauded out of a sum aggregating about \$12,000.

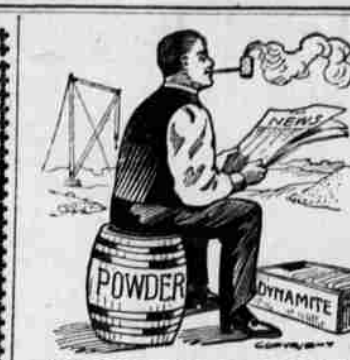

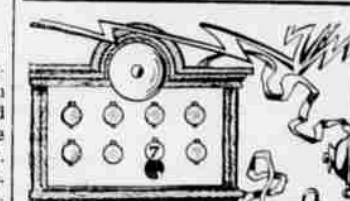
