OTHERWISE RENEWALS OF LICENSES JEOPARDIZED

Unless the Saloonmen Act in Good Faith, the General Issue of Sunday Closing Will Be Turned Over to the State Authorities—City Council Plainly in a Humor to Make No More Concessions—Some Applications for Renewals Held Up While the Applicants' Behavior Is Being Noted.

That the saloonmen of the city will have to abide by their agreement to remain closed Sunday forenoons was plainly shown at the council meeting last night, when licenses were granted to several dealers. One of those asking for a renewal was J. A. Ogg.

and before action was taken by the council Mayor Fee told of the actions recently taken by the police to enforce the Sunday forenoon closing agreement. When first notified to close by Marshal Gardane, Ogg had refused, but later upon a visit from the district attorney decided he would comply.

Mayor Fee then said that the recent grand jury had approved of the present Sunday plan and had refrained from returning indictments for violations of the Sunday closing law upon condition that the city enforce the half day agreement. Accordingly the mayor insisted that all saloons should be required to close until 1 o'clock, and that if the saloonmen refused to do this the matter would have to be turned over to the state authorities, who would close the town entirely.

The above sentiment was approved by the members of the council present.

Some discussion also occurred over the granting of a license to Thomas Murrell. It was intimated that his place had been doing considerable Indian business, and the sentiment of the council was that he would have to show deep respect for the city ordinances if he wished to continue in business. The licenses will not be issued until the first of the month, and in the meantime the actions of the applicants will be noted by the councilmen.

former husband. From the time of their marriage until the commencement of the suit the plaintiff declares her husband has been cruel and inhuman towards herself and son. She says he frequently drove the son away from home, calling him and the defendant also by vile and insulting names.

Also the plaintiff alleges her husband was frequently away from home for long periods at a time and failed to provide her with the necessities of life. Consequently the plaintiff was forced to work for a living.

Made \$7000 at "Speculating." Mrs. Estes states in the complaint that her husband followed the occupation of a "speculator, easy life," at which calling he made \$7000 since they married. However, the wife declares the defendant hoarded all of this amount to himself and has even failed to properly support her during that time.

It is claimed in the complaint that aside from the money which the defendant has "hoarded" he also owns a house and three lots in this city, but that the furniture in the house is the individual property of the plaintiff. She asks that the court award her title to the three lots, that the defendant be required to account for the \$7000 and to pay \$50 attorney's fee in the divorce case.

As the plaintiff says she is afraid of the defendant the court was asked to issue an order restraining him from in any manner molesting the plaintiff, or disposing of any of his property while the suit is pending. The order was issued by Judge Ellis.

UNG GOEY ARRESTED

CHINESE IS ACCUSED OF RUNNING GAMBLING GAME.

First Time Officer Scheer Interrupted the Game He Lacked Proof, But Later Was Accompanied by a Witness—Mrs. Goey Was Apparently the Dealer—Goey Pleaded Not Guilty and Will Stand Trial—Defendant Is the Well Known Merchant.

Ung Goey, the well known Chinese merchant, was arrested yesterday afternoon upon the charge of conducting a gambling game. The complaint was made out yesterday afternoon by City Attorney John McCourt and was sworn to by William Scheer, night officer. For several days past the night officers had been watching the noodle joint on Alta street believing a game to be in progress there. On last Sunday night Mr. Scheer appeared upon the scene. However, the Chinamen quit the game so suddenly that it would have been difficult to prove they were gambling, especially since the officer was alone.

But on Tuesday night the place was again visited and evidence secured which led to the arrest of Goey yesterday afternoon. When the game was found by Officer Scheer Mrs. Goey was serving as dealer for the game.

On being brought before the recorder yesterday afternoon Goey pleaded not guilty and the case was set for trial at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Goey Pleaded Guilty. At 3 o'clock this afternoon C. H. Carter appeared for Goey and entered a plea of guilty to the charge against him. Thereupon Recorder Fitz Gerald imposed a fine of \$25, which was paid.

SEATS FOR FOURTH OF JULY.

Alleged That Improvements Encroach Upon City Property.

Licenses were voted last night to Bollons & Brown, Oregon Wine & Liquor company, James Shipp, A. J. Ogg and T. W. Murrell. The license of Turner Bros. was transferred to W. W. Hoch.

Upon the request of the Fourth of July committee it was voted to allow business men to place seats on the sidewalk in various places for the Fourth only.

A warrant for \$75 was ordered drawn in favor of City Attorney John McCourt.

Guarding City Property.

After the council had adjourned last night it was again convened for the purpose of discussing the strip of land at the north end of the Main street bridge. It was alleged that the strip was being gobbled up into the tract being improved by W. F. Matlock, and the city attorney was ordered to take necessary steps to protect the city's property.

Work on O. R. & N. Track.

A large force of trackmen and bridge carpenters are now at work making permanent repairs to the track three miles east of Bingham Springs, where there was a washout 1000 feet in length. This is exactly at the point where Engineer Patty and Fireman Milligan were instantly killed by their engine plunging into a washout in January, 1903. The track will be built in a substantial manner and the creek channel will perhaps be changed at that point to avoid future danger from high water.

JOE BENNETT DEAD

FOUND IN HIS CELL LATE YESTERDAY AFTERNOON.

Complained of Being Tired a Short Time Before, and a Few Minutes Later Struck His Head on the Iron Door of the Cell—Nothing to Excite Suspicion in the Circumstances of His Death—Was Serving a Term for Taking Liquor Upon the Reservation—Was Well Known.

Major Edwards Investigates.

This afternoon Major Edwards, agent on the reservation, has been in the city for the purpose of looking into the death of Joe Bennett. It has been found that the dead man had two flasks of whiskey in his cell when found and it is believed by the same was smuggled to him by his wife when she visited him during the afternoon. However, it is not likely the whiskey was doped, as other Indians in the jail also drank of it without becoming sick. However, Major Edwards will have the whiskey remaining in the bottles analyzed to see if anything injurious is contained therein.

John Heathman Implicated.

After considerable investigation this afternoon, Major Edwards and District Attorney Phelps learned that the liquor which had been given to Bennett in the afternoon yesterday had been sold to Frank Norrest, a three-quarter Indian, by John Heathman, bartender for the Oregon Wine & Liquor company. It is said that Norrest secured the liquor from Heathman and then gave the same to Bennett's wife, who passed it to the latter through the bars of the jail door. It is probable that Heathman and Norrest will both be indicted by the district attorney.

Bennett Was Found Dead.

Joe Bennett, the Umatilla Indian, passed to his "happy hunting ground" from the county jail sometime between 5 and 6 o'clock last evening. He was found dead in his bunk shortly before 6 o'clock when Deputy Funk made the rounds of the jail to place the prisoners in the cells for the night. The deputy's attention was called to Bennett by other Indians in the jail, who had noticed him lying very still for some time.

According to the other prisoners, Bennett started to go to his cell late in the afternoon, saying he was tired. As he was going through the cell door he fell and struck the back of his head on the iron door. However, he arose and went into the cell, so his fellow prisoners were not alarmed over his injury.

In the opinion of Coroner Henderson, who was called immediately, Bennett's death was caused by concussion of the brain resulting from his fall. As there was nothing suspicious connected with the case the coroner did not consider it necessary to hold an inquest. The dead man's body was removed to the Rader undertaking parlors and will be buried in the cemetery on the reservation.

Joe Bennett was well known among those who are familiar with the Indians of the reservation. He was a man of medium age and rather jovial disposition. He was a frequent visitor in the local police court and was serving a term in the county jail for taking liquor on the reservation.

Like many others of his tribe, Joe insisted on wearing long hair and moccasins. When asked one time why he did this he said that an Indian who did so would go to the Indian heaven when he died, but that if he wore short hair and shoes he would

During the afternoon yesterday, Bennett's wife and mother called on him at the jail and had a long visit with him through the bars of the jail door. However, as they were all in a good humor, the officers do not think the Indian's death was the result of the visit.
