DEFENDS PARSONS.

Pilot Rock Record Reviews the Haymarket Riots.

It is 29 years since half a dozen Chicago anarchists were hanged for throwing bombs in the Haymarket riots. Parsons, one of the men hanged, is said to have been innocent of the bomb-throwing. J. P. McManus, of the Pilot Rock Record, who was personally acquainted with Parsons, writes as follows of the riots and the "judicial murder" of Parsons:

It has now been 29 years since Mr. Parsons was hanged for his connection with the Chicago anarchists who killed seven policemen at the Haymarket riots.

Mr. Parsons had no connection whatever with the Haymarket riots, and was not present at the time the bomb was thrown which resulted in the death of several policemen, and for which several of the leaders were hanged, while others were given terms in the penitentiary.

Mr. Parsons was not a "noted bomb-thrower" and it was shown at the trial that he never had a bomb in his hands, but he was unfortunately at the time editor of a red rag, on which he worked for a salary, was found guilty of being one of the leaders and hanged.

Ben Butler pronounced the hanging of Parsons "a judicial murder," but Parsons was in bad company and was made to suffer the consequences.

For four years previous to accepting the editorship of the anarchist sheet, which was no more inflammable in its editorial utterances than many of our now city papers, and paled in comparison with the Appeal to Reason, Mr. Parsons was a compositor on the Chicago Times, which was owned at that time by W. F. Story.

He had come to Chicago from Texas, where he had married his mulatto wife, and where he had served two terms in the legislature of that state. The devotion that existed between this man Parsons and his wife, Lucy, would put to shame many of those

who now pose as society leaders, as it bordered on adoration.

If a stepmother whom he hated was the cause of Most's anarchy, few will blame Lucy Parsons' anarchy following the hanging of her husband, after a mock trial in a Chicago court.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The price for residence phones at Grangeville, Idaho, will be reduced August 1 from \$1.50 per month to \$1.

Michael Brink and John Mullins were burned to death in the Bellevue, a hotel at Libby, Mont., which was destroyed by fire.

Upon clearing away the ruins of Coffin Bros' general merchandise store, destroyed by fire at Tappanish, the charred body of Moses Strong, a Yakima Indian, was found. While drunk, Strong had crawled beneath the store to sleep upon the cool ground.

Owen B. Williams, of Custer, Mont., who drew No. 1 in the Crow land drawing, may not get his pick of the land without a contest. It appears that he is married to a full-blooded Indian woman and as she has received her allotment from the Crow tribe, this will operate against the husband taking the land.

The Roberts Drug company, at Eugene, has gone into bankruptcy. Liabilities, \$2000, assets \$3000.

E. Spencer Stanhope, son of a Scottish member of parliament, suicided by cutting his throat in the Hotel Holy Rood at Riverside, Cal.

T. W. Parkes shot and killed T. J. Corbin at Kansas City because of attentions Corbin was paying Mrs. Parkes.

The Great Western Sugar company, (the trust) now capitalized at \$30,000,000, is building beet sugar mills at Brush and Fort Morgan, Col. and at Billings, Mont.

Rev. Dr. P. L. Moyer, pastor of the Church of the New Jerusalem, in Chicago, and for 25 years pastor of the largest church of his denomination in Chicago, dropped dead of heart failure at his home in Chicago. Dr. Moyer was the originator of the Parliament of Religions, which was one of the features of the World's Fair in 1893.

MONUMENT RAISED

SCENE OF FIRST NORTHWEST CELEBRATION MARKED.

Governor Mead of Washington Was Orator at Dedication of a Monument Near American Lake, Marking the Spot Where the First Fourth of July Celebration Was Held in the Northwest, on July 4, 1841.

There is as much dispute in the northwest as to where the Fourth of July was first celebrated west of the Rocky mountains as there is over the "first white child" born west of the mountains, but it seems that the state historical society of Washington has finally decided where the first celebration was held, and honored it with a monument.

The following special from Spokane gives an account of the marking of the spot near American Lake, where the very first celebration was held in the northwest, on July 4, 1841. The special says:

Governor A. E. Mead was the principal speaker at a celebration at American Lake today commemorating the first Fourth of July celebration ever held west of the Missouri river, July 4, 1841. The celebration was held under the auspices of the State Historical society at a point between American Lake and Lake Squilchew. This is believed to be the exact spot on which the first celebration was held, 65 years ago.

At that time Captain Charles Wilkes, U. S. A., was on an exploration and landed at Fort Nisqually, near which the Hudson's Bay company maintained a post. He went inland a short distance to the flat table land where the Fourth of July celebration was held. American Lake was at that time given the name which it has ever since retained.

The celebration today brought together notable orators and pioneers from all points on Puget Sound. In his address Governor Mead spoke almost entirely on the historical phase of the early exploration of this territory.

A plain shaft of granite marking the spot where the first Independence day celebration was held was unveiled with elaborate ceremonies.

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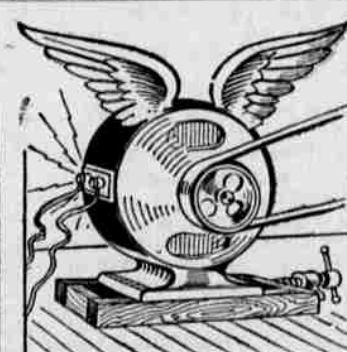

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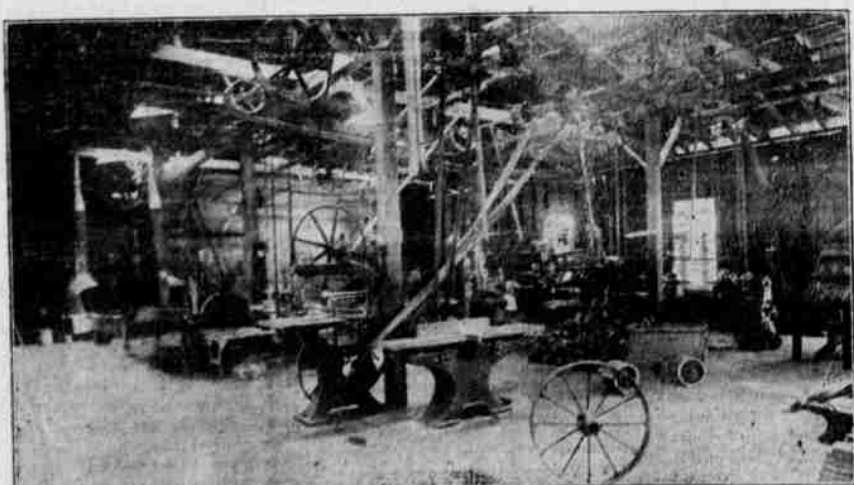


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
