TRAFFIC IS HEAVY

NORTHERN PACIFIC BUILDING DOUBLE TRACK.

Ten Loaded Passenger Trains Cross the State of Washington on the Northern Pacific Daily Aside From Large Number of Freight Trains—Business Is Abnormally Heavy and the Double Track Is Necessary.

The Northern Pacific is doubling-track its line across the state of Washington. Camps have been established at the east approach of the Stampede tunnel and extended from there to Cle Elum. Ties and rails are strewn all along the main line of the road and the grade in many places is already widened. It is the report that comes from Tacoma.

The traffic of the Northern Pacific has grown so great that a double track is almost an absolute necessity. Trains 3 and 5, the one the regular overland and the other the Burlington train connecting at Billings, with the new Northern Pacific train from St. Paul, are loaded now with summer tourists.

Orders have been issued that these trains are to be run in two sections until further notice. This makes 10 trains, inclusive of the Spokane-Sound special, that must cross this state daily.

Add to this all the freight trains—admittedly inadequate to handle the traffic—and it is seen that a single track is hardly sufficient for the road's purposes. Officials of the Northern Pacific expect still greater traffic. A part of this may be taken care of by the new north bank line, which should be completed about the first of the new year. But that line is developing a vast amount of new territory, which will supply a great traffic itself.

An instance of this is afforded by the new town of Hoover, a short distance south of Pasco. A year ago the place was a desert. The first building was erected there September 27, 1905. Today the town has 85 buildings, most of which are of a substantial character.

This sort of thing is being repeated all along the north bank. The river traffic as far north as Kennewick has grown, too, with wonderful rapidity. A regular boat line is now established on the Columbia from Kennewick and another is running on the Snake from a new town near Hunt's Junction. Additional boats are being built at both these points. Connections are made at The Dalles at present with O. R. & N. trains, but later connections will be made there with the north bank line.

Much New Business.

All this development will provide the new north bank road with just about all the traffic it can handle and so a double track across the state is being prepared against the emergency that seems sure to come. The development of an electric system for the handling of passenger trains is also in prospect. Its business is ready as soon as it can be built.

After some hesitation I let her do it. I expected to be punished at the time, and expect to now."

"I have no money, and will not admit I am crazy, for I am not. I am just as happy here now as I have been at any time since my husband was killed. I do not care what comes now."

Brothers-in-Law Fight Duel.

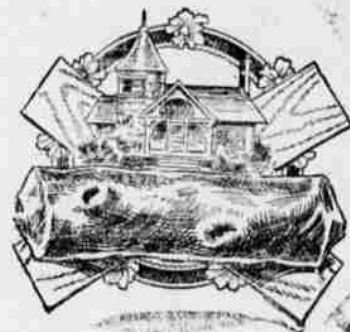

WILL ORGANIZE TONIGHT.

Umatilla County Agricultural Society at Club Rooms.

At the Commercial club rooms this evening a mass meeting will be held for the purpose of organizing the Umatilla County Agricultural society. The meeting will be held pursuant to a call issued Wednesday by the soliciting committee for the fair organization. After the society has been formed three men will be named to serve on the joint commission which is to have charge of the Umatilla-Morrow county fair.
