BADLY HURT BY LIVE WIRE.

Peculiar Accident Occurs on Baker County Farm.

Earl Willett was probably fatally injured at the Eppinger ranch northwest of Baker about noon by a current from a live wire caused by the cable of a hay derrick which had become crossed in some way with the electric light wires running into this city from the Rock Creek power house, says the Baker City Herald.

Willett, in company with his father had been moving the hay derrick from where it had been in use, to the Eppinger ranch.

A cable was connected with the top of the derrick and Willett was guiding his cable in keeping the derrick in place. When the accident occurred he had allowed it to swing around the derrick and the electric wires came in contact. The cable which had been used for guiding the derrick carried the current down through the body of Willett, which received all its intense voltage.

So powerful was the shock that the boy could not release himself, and the body clung convulsively to the cable. He was fearfully burned by the force of the current.

They had just crossed the ditch with the derrick and the father turned and looked to see his son's hand smoking where it was being burned by the electricity. He rushed to his assistance and attempted to pull the boy off, only to be knocked down himself by the shock.

The horses became frightened and ran away, pulling the derrick pole away from the live wire, and releasing young Willett from his perilous position.

According to the surgeon, the boy's left arm is almost burned off, one finger of the left hand is burned off, and his left leg and right side are badly burned also.

The father escaped with but slight injury except from the awful shock.

No Wool Sales at Boise.

The wool sales conducted this morning at the Falk warehouse under the direction of the Idaho Wool-growers' association, resulted in practically no sales, as only 60 out of 600 sacks were disposed of, and these through the private arrangements of the parties. The remainder of the wool will go east under individual assignment. The prices which the commission men were willing to pay was much below the value placed by the woolgrowers.—Boise Capital News.

Creamery Man Missing.

No trace of Emil Watz, the missing creamery operator, has been discovered. For some weeks he has worried incessantly over little difficulties in the working of the machinery, and to his wife he had signified an intention of quitting the trade. This has occasioned much surprise as he was known to be a very efficient operator. He was easily agitated, but of a happy disposition. Family troubles have been hinted at, but this is without ground, as he was a devoted husband and father. He was 32 years old, tall and rather slight, and had a mass of wavy brown hair, also a brown mustache. Mrs. Watz is prostrated and fears are entertained as to her sanity. She has neither slept nor eaten since the disappearance of her husband. She believes that he suddenly became insane and destroyed himself.

A slight irregularity in his books had occurred and this also worried him considerably. However, the other sets kept by officers in the company, tallied perfectly, and his mistake could easily be accounted for.—Troy (Idaho) News.

Northern Pacific Extension.

Two carloads of horses, several carloads of equipment, a carload of powder and two cars of provisions were received here by Porter Bros. & Welch last Monday, says the Culdesac Register. The second big steam shovel was received here a few days ago and is being put up so that it can be put into operation in a few days. The new shovel is built on the principle of a traction engine and does not require a track like the one at present in use. It is also of greater capacity and will accomplish more work.

As soon as the cut is completed at the depot both shovels will be moved to the east end of town to make a cut at the Fisher place, where quite a quantity of blasting powder will be used. The teams will be used at the grading camps and in moving supplies and equipments to the several camps on the prairie construction. Men are coming into the country in large numbers, and within a short time the highland camps will be filled with laborers.

Lee Phinney Held for Trial.

Lee Phinney, who is charged with murdering Jeff Letton by administering morphine and cocaine into his arms by means of a hypodermic syringe, was held to the district court without bonds at his hearing yesterday afternoon before Judge Hanlon. At the hearing the depositions of George Bradley, G. Brockway and Charles Vickers gave strong testimony in support of the prosecution. The crime with which Phinney is charged occurred at Culdesac last Thursday afternoon and the victim of the poisoning died the next morning after being unconscious from the effects of the drug for many hours. Bradley, Brockway and Vickers were arrested at the time of Phinney as possible accomplices.—Lewisville Tribune.

New Ditch Company at Baker.

The McCreary Irrigating Ditch company, recently organized to preserve the rights of property of the people in the western portion of the city using certain irrigation ditches, met last evening at the residence of O. C. Johnson, completed the organization and received their certificates of stock in the company. 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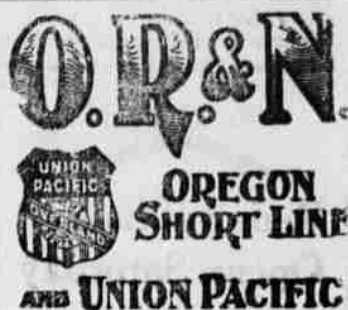
