Briggson, July 25.—The recent hot wave has done little or no damage to the grain in this section. The late sown spring grain is in excellent condition. The fall sown wheat is slightly damaged.

School closed in district 95 Friday, after a three months' term taught by Miss Mand Sherman of Athena. The 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Ray is dangerously ill of cholera infantum. Dr. Cashatt of Weston was called and at the present writing the child is improving.

Milan Lafin, the young man who was accidentally shot while with the searching party last Wednesday noon near the tollgate, is resting quite comfortably today, and it is thought he may soon recover.

William McCorkell spent a few days in Walla Walla last week on business.

The riflemen seemingly are becoming too careless in this vicinity of late, as several head of cattle have been found shot at different times. James Navin lost a valuable calf Monday, it having been shot and several others have reported finding cattle dead or wounded from a gunshot in the past two weeks. This is looked upon by some as accidental, while others deem it reprehensible, and it will no doubt be looked into at once.

Mrs. William Vanderpool, who has been quite sick, is convalescing.

Young Sams, who was quite severely injured last Thursday near here by a tree falling on him, is getting along nicely and no serious results are anticipated.

Mrs. Jeff Troxill has been quite sick with pleurisy for the past few days. The grain is ripening fast the past week here, and harvest will begin early.

L. J. McAtee will come in a few days with his family from Pendleton, to the mountains, where they will spend the rest of the summer. More especially for the benefit of Mrs. McAtee's health, which is quite poor.

Abe Abrahamson went to Walla Walla Wednesday for the purpose of disposing of his fat cattle. Mr. Abrahamson says an offer of 2c for cows and 3c for steers was made him, which he thinks is a very low figure.

Guy Kilgore, who has been quite sick for the past week, is very much improved.

THE EAST AT BOISE.

Pennsylvania Will Attend Irrigation Congress.

Among the states of the east to send delegations to the National Irrigation congress, which meets at Boise September 3, Pennsylvania will be the most numerous represented. This is accounted for by the fact that irrigation is being practiced to a considerable extent in the Keystone state.

A recent report of the department of agriculture states that "in the state of Pennsylvania there is a great deal of irrigated meadow land, and the testimony of the farmers is given to show that by means of irrigation the crop in every instance doubled and in frequent cases tripled. In Lancaster, Berks and Lehigh counties the experience of 22 farmers with irrigation is given by the department and each of them says irrigation brought the yield of hay from his land up from one-half a ton or a ton per acre to two tons."

"The west is fortunate indeed in process there is never any fear of a bad season." The Pennsylvanians will be given an opportunity of comparing methods and results existing in the west with those carried on at home.

BUILD 20 MOTOR CARS.

Harriman Will Give the New Cars a Thorough Test.

The McKean motor car builders at the Union Pacific shops in Omaha are about to begin on an order for 20 of these new cars, says the Omaha Bee. This order has been received from the east and must be filled as soon as possible. It is understood the cars will be well distributed over the country, more for advertising purposes than anything else.

While the motor car leaped into the front rank of popularity at the outset, and Mr. Harriman has thrown the weight of his personal influence behind it, it is tacitly admitted that the ingenious and stimulating effect of advertising—that greatest of all motives needed to put this new enterprise where it belongs before the public, and so Mr. Harriman has decided no better means of advertising is possible than the car itself.

These cars have been turned out on the local shops by numbers and when this gigantic order came the workmen were engaged on No. 8. The seven cars in service are scattered over the Harriman lines in various parts of the country. The one sent east has aroused a riot of enthusiasm and it is believed others will be as eagerly received there as rapidly as they can be manufactured.

WORK BEGINS TONCE ON NEW ROUND HOUSE.

Portland Contractors Putting in Concrete Foundations—The Hannaford is Out of Commission With Badly Leaking Boilers; Will Be Replaced With the Norma, Now at Riparia—Mountain Gem Went Up the River Last Night.

Umatilla, July 25.—Marshall Bros., contractors of Portland, are here with their entire outfits to commence work at once on the concrete foundation for the new brick roundhouse.

Capt. E. W. Baughman of the J. M. Hannaford, tied up at the Switzer grove, opposite Umatilla last night, with her boilers leaking so badly that she cannot move today. She is to be taken out of commission and Captain Baughman goes to Riparia tonight to get the steamer Norma, which will take the Hannaford's place.

The Mountain Gem stopped here last night on her regular trip up the river.

RANGE WAR NEAR WHITEBIRD.

Stock Rustlers Trying to Drive Out Settlers.

A dispatch from Weiser, Idaho, says:

J. B. Lafferty, ranger in charge of the Weiser forest reserve, has received a communication from the upper country in regard to the range war that is now going on in that section. The letter states that notices have been posted on the doors of the farm houses, warning all people around Whitebird hill to leave the country before July 25 or they would be killed and their houses blown up.

This is an old war that has been going on between stock raisers and the farmers. The rustlers have watched with jealous eyes as the farmers have invaded their ranges and at times the tension has been drawn taut between the two factions. The letter mentioned in particular the places of William Howard and Charles Blomquist as the ones at which notices had been left. At the Howard ranch it stated men had been seen skulking around at night, as many as five at a time.

The communication stated that the residents were organizing for the purpose of resisting any attempts that might be made to run them out and to find out who the leaders are. It is thought that unless the authorities take hold of the situation at once that bloodshed will result.

SALTON SEA UNDER CONTROL.

Over 5000 Mexican Laborers Turning Waters of Colorado.

J. M. Cardiff, formerly a well known business man of San Bernardino, and now one of the most extensive agriculturists of Imperial valley, says that the Southern Pacific company will soon have 5000 laborers from Mexico at work in connection with the gigantic plans for controlling the waters of the Colorado river, says a San Bernardino paper. Cardiff states that the company has 2500 laborers at work on the project at present, and when he left agents were taking orders to Mexico for as many more to work on the projected branch line from Yuma to the point where an immense rock levee is to be thrown across the river.

Thousands of laborers will be employed in the granite quarries of Superstition mountain, getting out rock for the levee, which is to tower 15 feet above high water, 25 feet wide at the top. It is expected that this permanent structure will protect Imperial valley for all time to come from the inroads of the Colorado.

Cardiff claims that the results of the floods, sweeping through the valley into the Salton sink have proved highly beneficial, having created a fine drainage system which will in itself be a protection from future floods, and should the communities in the valley grow to cities these canals through the valley would serve as sewer systems.

He declares that the flood is steadily falling, having dropped seven feet in 10 days, and was less than 21 feet deep yesterday. He states that the prospects for the valley were never better.

The barley fields are yielding at the rate of 75 bushels to the acre, melons are being shipped to market at the rate of 30 cars a day, there are four varieties of grapes ripe on the vines, date culture has passed the experimental stage, and a large acreage will be set out by private interests in the proper season and bananas are also proving a profitable crop, although but a few acres yet having been set to this fruit.

Okanogan Bids Rejected.

Bids for the construction of storage works for the Okanogan irrigation project have been rejected by the interior department, on the ground that all were excessive. The lowest bidder was Matthew P. Zindorf, of Twisp. The main canal of this project, it has been decided, will be constructed by the government by day labor. The engineers consider that the work can be done for \$79,000.

Bandit-Chasing Car Kept on the System, is a Terror to Robbers.

The daring train robberies which, a few years ago were not uncommon on the Union Pacific, have in recent years gone entirely out of vogue. The reason for this is apparent to all who have had the pleasure of inspecting the Union Pacific bandit-chasing outfit, which returned last evening from the west.

A baggage car has been fitted up with accommodations for several of the fleetest horses obtainable in the western country, these being purchased by Scott Davis, Union Pacific livestock agent, after a visit to several western states.

This car and these horses, together with half a dozen of the most expert riflemen, gun fighters, and trappers in the west, are stationed at Laramie ready to be moved at a moment's notice to any point on the Union Pacific, where a hold-up occurs and to start on the trail of the bandits in such a short time afterward that their capture is almost certain.

The last of the Union Pacific hold-ups occurred in 1898. After that the bandit-chasing car was established, and since then train robbers have given the Union Pacific a wide berth. They did not care to run up against such noted sleuths and fighters and Tim Koller, special agent for the Union Pacific; Joe Fefors, deputy marshal for Wyoming and the Nemesis of the celebrated Tom Horn; Peter Bergerson, champion rifle shot of the world, and H. Davis, a dead shot who is in direct charge of the posse horse. The maintenance of the bandit-chasing posse car probably costs the Union Pacific a neat sum, but it is not improbable to infer that as a result no train hold-ups have occurred on the Union Pacific for eight years and none are apt to occur in the future.

"Sheep King" Ayre Again.

The Lee brothers' dipping tanks were kept busy yesterday with 5000 head of sheep from the flocks of W. G. Ayre, of Durkee, the sheep king of Oregon, who with his foremen were preparing a shipment to Saunders, of Salt Lake, the largest sheep buyer in the world. It is expected that the shipment will go forward today. Mr. Ayre is acknowledged the largest individual sheep owner in eastern Oregon and Saunders has no rival in the world as a buyer. The two men have worked together on many deals and probably will come together again in the future. Mr. Ayre's wool clips this season totaled almost 300,000 pounds, now on storage in his warehouses.—Baker City Democrat.
