Federal Grand Jury at Chicago Backs an Indictment With Nineteen Counts.

REBATE BY NON-PAYMENT

Chicago, Aug. 8 .- One indictment and 19 counts were returned against the Standard Oil company by the federal grand jury today charging the non-payment of storage charges to certain railroads, thereby procuring an unfair advantage over competitors in violation of the Elkins law

More True Bills Likely.

District Attorney Morrison after the indictment, said the jury is working on other phases of the case and it is likely more true bills will be returned. The amount the indictments alleges the Standard gained by the transactions is \$8500.
