EIGHT CARS WENT INTO THE DITCH

Landslide and Torrent of Water Struck No. 23 Sunday Afternoon.

ENGINE HAD GOTTEN PAST AND NO ONE WAS INJURED.

Two Hundred Men Are Clearing Away Debris Today, and No. 2 Will Probably Get Past the Scene of the Wreck This Evening—Heavy Mountain Rains Made the Trouble—Twenty-foot Wall of Water, and Debris Came Down the Canyon—Train Nearly Escaped Being Caught.

By a heavy rainstorm which occurred on the Blue mountains at 4 o'clock yesterday evening, traffic on the O. R. & N. was tied up last night. A landslide and waterspout combined, struck westbound freight train No. 23, yesterday evening at 4:30, a mile and a half east of North Fork station and eight cars were dished and about 150 feet of track damaged.

The engine passed through the slide but the cars were caught and partly buried by the flood of debris which came down a canyon just east of the McLaughlin place at North Fork. No one was injured in the accident. The engine of the train in charge of Engineer Frank Pike, came on into Pendleton last evening.

About 200 men were at work clearing away the debris this morning, and it is expected that No. 2, the eastbound train, due here at 5:35 this evening, will be able to pass over the mountain.

No. 2 from Portland turned around here last night and ran back to Portland as No. 5, at 10:50 and No. 5 turned around at La Grande and went east as No. 2. This morning train No. 6 left here at 9 o'clock and ran to the wreck where the passengers were transferred to a train waiting there and the passengers from No. 1, were brought back on the train returning to this city. This train was run to Portland as No. 1 this afternoon.

Trainmen on the wrecked train say that a wall of water, dirt, rocks, trees and broken logs at least 20 feet high came down the canyon and across the track and it is a miracle that the engine passed through. However, the engine passed before the worst came down.

A very heavy rain fell on the Blue mountains and several small bridges and culverts east of Huron were damaged, but not enough to delay traffic. The train which was wrecked was running cautiously and was almost out of reach of the danger when the flood of debris came down the mountain. Had the train been two minutes earlier it would have missed the slide entirely.

Reports of a heavy rain all over the eastern portion of the state have been received here. Little damage was done anywhere else and the O. R. & N. will not be disabled at any other point.

Riots Were Incited in Mexico.

New York, Aug. 13.—Colonel Green today declared that New York speculators furnished the money to incite the riots at Cananea. He has been investigating for a week and declares it is a deliberate attempt to depreciate his property.

HAS FAITH IN THE FLATHEAD

REGARDS IT AS SUPERIOR TO CROW RESERVATION.

A. D. Stillman Bought Three Thousand Acres of Bottom Land Near Kalispell—Has No Intention of Leaving Pendleton or Abandoning the Law—Attended Meeting of the Woodmen of the World Board of Managers at Denver.

After having passed several weeks in Montana and at Denver, A. D. Stillman returned to the city yesterday. While in Denver he attended a meeting of the board of head managers of the Woodmen of the World and attended to other matters.

Stillman was in Montana for the purpose of looking over lands in that section with a view to making investments, and he purchased 3000 acres of bottom land near Kalispell which he regards as a very fortunate buy, having already been offered a large advance on the price paid.

Regarding the future value of lands in the vicinity of the Flathead reservation Mr. Stillman is optimistic, as the soil is very fertile and adapted to general farming, though the elevation is higher than Umatilla county. However, he has less faith in the Crow reservation country, in which many Pendleton people are interested, because, through lying east of the Rockies, the Crow country is much cooler than on this side, where the country is warmed by the winds from the Pacific.

Will Remain in Pendleton.

Regarding the late rumors that he is contemplating leaving his law practice in this city, Mr. Stillman said: "I have no intention whatever of leaving Pendleton and will continue to conduct my law business at the same old stand. However, as in the past, I will continue to devote more or less of my time to my outside interests and may make other investments similar to the one in Montana."

FIREMEN ARRESTED.

Charges Were Not Sustained in the Courts. London, Aug. 13.—Nine firemen on the steamer Minnetonka were arrested today upon the arrival of the ship. Firemen kicked about the food, and it is charged that they deliberately allowed the fires to die so the ship lost thousands of dollars by the delay. The charges were not sustained in court.

Presented Credentials.

CONEY ISLAND SCENE OF RIOT

"The World's Playground" Turned Into Surging Camp of Angry Fighters.

ROW STARTS WITH DISPUTE OVER STREET CAR FARES.

Citizens Organize to Carry Quarrel in the Courts Over Whether They Shall or Shall Not Pay Return Fares Into the City—Several Persons Killed and Others Injured, and Much Property Is Destroyed—Police Unable to Maintain Even a Semblance of Good Order.

New York, Aug. 13.—An organization of citizens was formed today to fight in the courts for a single fare to Coney Island and return.

Immense Crowds Out.

New York, Aug. 13.—The Coney Island street car riots brought out 250,000 people early this morning.

One man was shot in a restaurant, when a waiter in the rear swung a revolver toward the crowd which choked the Oceanic walk in the Coney Island bower. Four victims fell, three probably fatally wounded: Thos. Fitzpatrick, aged 25; Thomas McDonald, aged 19; George White, aged 26. All may die. Annie Smith, aged 20, was seriously hurt. The shooter escaped, but his description is known, and there is no outlet for him except the ocean.

Thousands Slept in Cars.

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit company's stalled cars moved at 4 this morning after 16 hours of continuous rioting.

Superintendent Mayberry paid from his own pocket the fares of 10,000 passengers who slept in the cars, refusing to be ejected, or submit to the payment of a second fare to Coney Island. The courts had decided the road had no right to collect a second fare.

SULLIVAN MUST GET OUT.

Democratic Committee Must Be Purged of Such Men. Paris, Aug. 13.—Bryan, discussing his demand that Sullivan, of Chicago, resign from the committee, says he was unimpressed by Dunlap as Sullivan charged. He says the organization needs to be purged of such as Sullivan. He hopes to cleanse it without a fight, but if a fight is necessary, the sooner it starts the better he will like it.

ROSS GALBRAITH IS ON TRIAL.

Is Charged With Murder in Connection With the Triple Lynching. Springfield, Mo., Aug. 13.—The trial of Ross Galbraith, charged with murder in connection with the triple lynching, began this morning. One hundred deputies surround the court.

Conference at Oyster Bay.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 13.—Chairman Sherman, of the republican congressional committee, Chairman Shonts, and Secretary Bishop, are in conference with the president today.

County Treasurer Suicided.

Goshen, Ind., Aug. 13.—County Treasurer Drake killed himself this morning. He was in ill health and brooded over a bank failure.

There were 21 births at Walla Walla, during July, of which 10 were boys and 11 girls.

FOURTEEN CARS FAT CATTLE TO SEATTLE

The second largest shipment of cattle made this year was sent out of the city tonight over the W. & C. R. to Frey-Bruhn company at Seattle. The shipment consisted of 354 head altogether, 252 of them being from the Johnson and Caldwell herds of John Day, and the remainder from Isaacs and Maple brothers of this county.

LABOR DISPUTE IS COMPLICATED

The Demands of Riggers and Stevedores Granted for Better Wages at 'Frisco.

THE BOILERMAKERS AND REPAIRERS HAVE STRUCK.

Roofers Go on Strike All Over San Francisco; Some Are Granted Their Demands, Others Are Not; They Asked for a 25 Per Cent Increase in Wages—President Diaz in the Field as a Mediator Between Mexican Labor and Capital and Will Recommend Former's Demand.

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—The water front strike was further complicated this morning when several hundred boilermakers and repairers on iron ships presented a demand for an increase of from \$3.50 to \$4 per day. Unless the raise is forthcoming or a compromise effected another strike will undoubtedly result. Up to this afternoon all members of the Riggers' and Stevedores' union, numbering some 1800, returned to work on all docks with the exception of the American Hawaiian company.

The stevedores' demands conceded were increased from 40 to 50 cents an hour for eight hours' work and 50 to 75 cents for overtime on coastwise vessels, and 55 cents for loading and discharging of deep water vessels.

Composition Roofers Strike.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 13.—Two hundred composition roofers struck this morning for an increase of from \$4 to \$5 a day. The Green Wilson & Harrison company complied with the demands and their employees returned to work. Other contractors refused the demands.

Strike on Mexican Central.

El Paso, Aug. 13.—Two thousand employees of the mechanical department of the Mexican Central went back to work today after a strike lasting a couple of weeks as the result of a meeting between the strikers and President Diaz. The latter advised the men to return to work saying he would recommend that where men the equal of Americans in skill would receive the same wages. This was the cause of the strike. Freight business was almost at a standstill.

ROBBED OF LARGE SUM.

Mrs. C. Lampert Had \$3500 in Satchel Stolen. San Francisco, Aug. 13.—Mrs. C. Lampert, of 100 Lopez street, was robbed of a satchel containing \$3500 in gold in a lobby of the San Francisco Savings Union this morning. She drew the money from theibernian bank for the purpose of purchasing some realty, and not meeting customers, decided to deposit it in the Savings Union.

While standing before the teller's window she was suddenly approached by a man about 50, who tapped her on the shoulder and said, "Oh, you are Mrs. Smith, I believe." Mrs. Lampert said she was not, and the man apologized and turned away. It was then she discovered her satchel had been taken, and the one belonging to another customer in the bank was substituted. No clue.

Will Not Issue Emergency Bonds.

Washington, Aug. 13.—Secretary Shaw denies he is going to put \$50,000,000 into outstanding loans to relieve the stringency of crop moving time.

MATCHES AND SUN FIRE.

Moscow Combination That Any Town Is Liable To.

Moscow, Idaho, Aug. 13.—Matches on a shelf exposed to the strong rays of the sun this morning started a conflagration which completely destroyed one residence, partially destroyed and gutted another frame house and completely soaked a third house. But for the efficient work of the firemen and the fine water pressure which answered every requirement, a whole block of Third street residences might have gone up in smoke.

The destroyed residence is at 201 Third street and is owned by E. O. Rudinger. Insurance to the amount of \$800 is carried on the structure.

The adjoining residence, 207 Third street, was occupied by Joe Mordhorst and Frank Osewalt and the house at 211 was occupied by Mrs. Rose Stratton and family. From the two latter residences all the furniture was removed, but from 201 the furniture belonging to Mr. Hiler, who for the past four years has had a room there, was completely burned. Harry Guertin, the barber, was just preparing to move into this residence. All the three houses are owned by Mr. Rudinger.

DIVORCE INQUIRY.

Investigation Starts in All Portions of the Country.

Washington, Aug. 13.—The court clerks in the offices of the big cities of the country are today filled with clerks from the census bureau who have started compiling divorce statistics.

LA GRANDE LAND OFFICE IS BUSY

MANY ENTRIES ARE MADE EACH DAY.

Land Fraud Trials in Oregon Do Not Affect Business in the Least—Entries in Every County in the State, Especially Willamette and Union Counties—Much Is Timber Land.

The land fraud trials in Oregon have not affected legitimate land entries in the least, in the La Grande land office, according to Register E. W. Davis, of the La Grande office who with Receiver A. A. Roberts spent Sunday in this city.

Mr. Davis says that from six to eight final proofs are now scheduled for every working day between now and November 1, beside several hundred on the desk dates for which have not been fixed.

The entries are being made in every county in the district but especially in Willamette and Union county districts where the Willamette railroad gives promise of new sawmills and other industries.

Much of the land being entered is timber land, but a large proportion is also homestead land, showing that bona fide settlement is going on constantly. Considerable agricultural land is also found within the forest reserves and much of this is being entered this season. Taken altogether, this is as busy a year as has been experienced in the office for a number of years.

Mr. Davis and Mr. Roberts returned home on the delayed train this forenoon.

SAFE BLOWERS BLOWN UP.

Laid Their Own Trap and Were Caught to a Finish. Selo, N. Y., Aug. 13.—The corpses of two safe blowers were found in the ruins of Files & Smith's general store which burned this morning after an explosion thought to be caused by dynamite placed under the safe.

MEAT INSPECTIONS.

Bonaparte Orders Meat Vigorously Inspected.

Washington, Aug. 13.—Bonaparte today ordered an increase of vigor in the inspection of meat for the navy yards. He ordered an immediate substitution of good for bad wherever inspectors suspected the quality.

The annual rabbit hunt on Blatock Island this year will be during October.

WOODMEN'S CASH MISSOURI BONDS

Head Managers at Recent Session Voted to Invest \$66,000.

MONEY COSTS MORE SINCE SAN FRANCISCO DISASTER.

Bonds Taken in at 4:75 Which Prior to April 18 Could Have Been Had at 4:30—Enormous Amount of Money Diverted to Paying of Losses and Rebuilding of 'Frisco Causes Comparative Shortage—Mr. Stillman Regards Pendleton Bonds as High Class Anywhere.

That the San Francisco fire and earthquake losses have had a very decided influence upon the money market is shown by the bond purchases that were made at the meeting of the Woodmen head managers recently held in Denver. At that session \$66,000 of the equalization fund was used in purchasing Missouri county bonds which netted 4.75.

According to A. D. Stillman, head manager, these bonds would have gone for 4.30 a few months ago, and the advance is attributed entirely to the stringency caused by the 'Frisco disaster.

"Within the past few months," said Mr. Stillman, "the netting in the bond market has advanced an average of about 20 points, the same being due to the enormous amount of money needed by the insurance companies in meeting their losses."

Pendleton Bonds Good.

But while the bond market is now stronger than a few months ago, Mr. Stillman says no difficulty should be met with by this city in disposing of the street paving and levee repairing bond issues which must be made shortly.

It has been estimated in the past that the street paving bonds would draw 6 per cent as they will be redeemable after one year and run for but 10 years. In Mr. Stillman's opinion 6 per cent bonds will readily sell at par, and the same might be true if they drew but 5½ per cent.

MORE FORGED NOTES FOUND.

Interest in Relations Between Stensland and Women.

Chicago, Aug. 13.—Probably the depositors and stockholders will lose between \$2000 and \$3000 more than was estimated upon the additional forged checks found in the Milwaukee Avenue bank today.

Assistant State's Attorney Olsen applied for additional bench warrants against persons alleged to be connected with the wrecking of the Milwaukee Avenue bank. Olsen says: "There is interest just now in the relations of Stensland and some woman prominent in Chicago and elsewhere. Possibly one of these women will throw light on extensive forgeries. They may even be involved directly."

Police are searching the Stensland mansion for the alleged secret room in which Stensland may be hidden or for evidence now concealed by the builders of the house may be aiding.

Work of Convicts.

The report of the warden of the Walla Walla penitentiary for the month of July shows that 850 convicts were confined in that institution for the month, 12 of that number being women. The penitentiary turned out 182,100 grain bags at an average cost of \$5.23 per 100, and 375,980 brick at an average cost of \$5.63 per 1000.

The Standard Gets Information.

Columbus, O., Aug. 13.—The Standard has established ways and means to get the inside information from the state and national legal departments. The co-operating prosecuting attorneys have found there has been a serious leak and are endeavoring to find where the trouble is.
