Combine Factory at Moscow.

After more than two years of hard labor and experiments, during which there were repeated setbacks which would have discouraged the average man, A. Anderson and Neil Quenell have perfected their new combine harvester that experienced farmers who witnessed the trials yesterday afternoon declare that the implement will be revolutionized. It was announced by the inventors this afternoon they would go about the preliminary details for the establishment in Moscow of a factory, the structure and the necessary machinery to cost in the neighborhood of \$40,000.

The new combine harvester does the cutting, threshing and sacking and does away with the binder now in use. The machine can be placed on the market for \$700, while the present harvesting machines cost \$2000. The present harvesters require from 36 to 40 horses to operate them, and the new Anderson-Quenell is worked nicely with four horses. But two men are needed on the machine instead of six or eight. One is the driver and the other the sacker.—Moscow Mirror.

Sensational Arson Charges.

John O. Peters, a prominent merchant of this place, and a pioneer of Idaho, was arrested this morning, charged with arson in first degree. The arrest is the result of an incendiary attempt to burn the store of Lowy & Jones about two weeks ago. A box full of rags and paper, and in which a lighted candle had been placed, was set on the wooden sidewalk near the store, where it was discovered. The building caught on fire and was extinguished with great difficulty. The complaint was sworn to by J. F. Lowe. The prosecution claims to have sufficient evidence to convict. Mr. Peters was taken before Judge Richardson and gave bond in the sum of \$1000 for his appearance at a preliminary hearing to be held August 29.

The arrest was a surprise to the people of Council as he has lived here nearly 30 years and had always been held in high esteem. The motive for the deed is said to be personal ill will borne toward the firm.—Council Advance.

Priests Transferred and Assigned.

When seen last night relative to a statement made in the Missoulian to the effect that Rev. Father Palladino had left Missoula to assume charge of the Catholic institution in Lewiston, Father Post informed the Tribune that although he had heard the Montana prelate had been ordered to Lewiston,

he had not been advised as to the position he would occupy there. Father Post stated it was quite likely that Father Palladino would receive his orders from headquarters while in Spokane, and that they would be made known to him on the arrival of the letter in the city. Father Post is at present uninformed as to whether or not he will be transferred.

The Missoulian has the following account of the transfer of Father Palladino:

"Rev. Father L. B. Palladino left Missoula on the Coeur d'Alene train early yesterday morning for Lewiston, Idaho, where he will assume the duties of the new position to which he has been called as announced in the Missoulian of yesterday. Rev. Father Palladino will travel to Lewiston via Wallace and Spokane. He will immediately take charge of the Catholic institution at that place, holding about the same position that he has occupied in Missoula for many years.

"Rev. Father Trevaile, who came here Monday from Pendleton, Ore., is now in charge of the Catholic institutions of this city. Father Trevaile is quite well known in this city, having at one time served as assistant at the St. Francis Xavier church."—Lewiston Tribune.

Yakima Needs Hop Pickers.

The large hopgrowers of the valley say that they will be in need of about 2000 pickers this fall from outside points. With the object in view of inducing pickers to come here a meeting of the growers has been called for 2 p. m. Saturday in the city hall to appoint a committee and take other steps that will provide the help.

"We need help this year worse than ever before," said G. C. Mitchell this afternoon. "There will be a big crop and not the usual number to draw from us in the past. Heretofore we have been relying to a great extent upon the home people and Indians, but there is a big crop of fruit this year and many people who were in the hop fields last year will be in the fruit orchards this year."—Yakima Republic.

Spur to the Beet Fields.

A survey has been made for a railroad spur from the O. R. & N. track at Hot Lake to the sugar company's beet fields this side of Union. From some sources it has been reported that this was a part of the Central Railway's project. Another report is that this work is to be done by the O. R. & N., but this has not been confirmed by any of the officials at La Grande. The sugar factory people are reluctant about the matter.—La Grande Chronicle.
