O. R. & N. OFFICIALS THRU.

Have Been at Durkee and La Grande Investigating Cause of Runaway Train.

General Superintendent M. J. Buckley, General Master Mechanic J. T. Langley, Trainmaster J. D. Matheson and Superintendent D. W. Campbell of the O. R. & N. system past down the line today after an extended stay at La Grande and Durkee, where they have been engaged in a thorough investigation as to the causes of the runaway which occurred at Durkee last week, causing the collision with passenger train No. 1.

The matter has been most thoroughly investigated by the officials who have been on the ground several days in their labors.

COHEN HOME BURGLARIZED.

Watch Was Taken While Family Was at Theater.

On Wednesday evening the home of Leon Cohen on the north side of the river was entered by burglars while Mr. and Mrs. Leon Cohen were absent at the theater and a gold watch belonging to the latter was taken. From the fact that only the watch was taken and that the doors of the dwelling were left open, it is believed the robber or robbers were frightened away. Other jewelry, principally diamonds, and of considerable value, were not taken, evidently not being found by the intruders.

So far the police have no clue to those who committed the crime.

CASHER CONFEST ROBBERY.

C. S. Van Auker, Who Robbed Ranier Bank, Escaped From Deputy Sheriff and is Now in Hiding.

Portland, Sept. 21.—After making what is virtually a confession of robbing the bank of which he was cashier at Ranier Ore., C. S. Van Auker last night escaped from the custody of the deputy sheriff in Portland while attempting to make restitution for the robbery of the bank.

Van Auker gambled with funds of the bank it is said, and in order to hide his shortage, he bound, gagged and shackled himself in the bank offices on September 3, claiming that he was assaulted and robbed during the noon hour by two thugs.

After an investigation it was found that he had gambled away more money than he had drawn in salary and he was placed in custody until a further examination could be made.

On leaving Portland last evening in charge of the deputy sheriff, he made an excuse to step into a building to pay a bill and kept on going.
