New Editor Capital News.

C. O. Broxon, who assumed editorial charge of the Capital News Monday, when asked by a Statesman representative yesterday afternoon if he cared to say anything about what will be the policy of the paper under his editorial management, stated that the control of a majority of the stock is vested in Mr. Sheridan, former Attorney General Frank Martin, and himself, and under those circumstances he said it would hardly be courteous to his associates for him to attempt to define the policy that would be adopted without consulting them. Broadly it could be stated, he said, that the paper would be an advocate of democratic principles. It would support Judge Stockslager for governor as the representative of the party in the state, and the entire democratic state ticket. Referring to the attitude of the paper toward the Dubois propaganda, he said he preferred not to make any statement at this time. The policy would be disclosed through the columns of the paper.

Mr. Broxon comes from Pocatello, where he was for several years editor and publisher of the Advance, a democratic paper.—Boise Statesman.

Beet Sugar Business at La Grande.

The expenditures of the Amalgamated Sugar company during the next three months will be much more than \$150,000 in cash. All of this money will be paid out to employees and to farmers who have raised sugar beets.

The payroll at the factory alone will comprise at least 120 names. The first beets of the season of 1906 were received today, being delivered by G. Top. The factory confidently expects to handle 30,000 tons altogether this season, and there will be a steady stream of wagons to the plant.

The Central Railway of Oregon is rapidly completing its line to Hot Lake and to Cove, and will not doubt be able to deliver a large amount of beets by rail via the O. R. & N. company's road.

The operating period starts next Tuesday or Wednesday, and will continue for from 75 to 90 days.—La Grande Observer.

BOT HERMISTON LAND.

Miss Annie Beard of St. Louis, Acquires 840 Acres.

Miss Annie Beard, of St. Louis, recently completed the purchase of 840 acres of land lying between Hermiston and the reservoir site, A. C. Crawford being the agent, says the Echo Register.

Miss Beard spent several days in looking over the ground and is well satisfied with her investment. In the last year she has traveled extensively over the Pacific coast and has examined some 30 different projects and

towns. She considers that the Umatilla project affords the greatest opportunity for the investment she has contemplated. She represents a number of other parties and hopes to obtain their active interest in many lands.

The lady expects to go to her home in a few days, but will return to reside in Hermiston as soon as developments are carried to a point where improvements can be made.

Three Charged With Perjury.

Shortly after the June election complaint was made to District Attorney Menefee by advocates of the local option law that irregularities prevailed in the election at Hood River and a number were charged with perjury in signing affidavits of voters. The district attorney subpoenaed a number of witnesses and made a thorough investigation of the charges, with the result that direct information was filed charging P. F. Fouts and J. B. Hunt with perjury and Seneca Fouts with subornation of perjury.

Bonds were fixed at \$1000 each, and thru their attorney surety ball bonds were filed this morning for their appearance at the November term of court. Bondsmen are C. P. Johannsen and William Michelbach.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Charge, Subornation of Perjury.

George Loe was arrested on a bench warrant issued from the federal court, about 10 o'clock yesterday morning, on a charge of subornation of perjury. This is the first arrest arising from the investigations being conducted by the federal grand jury in the alleged fraudulent timber transactions near Meadows, in Washington county. Loe was found by Deputy United States Marshal Bryon on Eighth street, near Main, and taken at once to the federal building. He was arraigned at 2 o'clock, entered a plea of not guilty and was placed in custody of the United States marshal pending the securing of a bond in the sum of \$2000.—Boise Statesman.

Grain Standing in Union.

There remains considerable grain to be threshed in this county. In fact there are a few fields that have not yet been cut. However, every day of sunshine like the present means thousands of bushels in the sack.—La Grande Observer.
