SKELETON IN SAGEBRUSH.

Evidence of Foul Crime Found Near Wallula.

The remains of what is apparently a human skeleton were found yesterday morning in the sage brush surrounding the old plow factory at Wallula, and an investigation which was made reveals the fact that foul play was the cause of the death, says a telephone message from Wallula. From all appearances the body had been subjected to several fires in an attempt to obliterate all signs of the murder, which had been committed. In placing the bones of the skull together the mark where a bullet had entered the skull was plainly visible, and that a man has been murdered, almost within the city of Wallula, cannot be doubted.

The plow factory, strictly speaking, is within the city limits of Wallula, but stands in an isolated spot, surrounded by sagebrush, with no residences within the immediate vicinity.

The supposition is that one of the many harvesters, who have been frequent visitors in Wallula, was inveigled to the factory by persons on robbery bent, and in the scuffle which followed, was shot.

This theory is strengthened by the fact that an attempt was made to cover all signs of the crime by destroying the remains of the dead man in burning them. In this the conspirators failed, for the skull is in a good state of preservation and the place where the bullet entered tells how the deed was done.

Cattle Broke Out of Car.

As the W. & C. R. was speeding along at a very rapid rate between Helix and Myrick yesterday, a stock car door was broken open and three head of cattle purchased by the Frey-Braun company jumped from the car and escaped on the part of the train crew the other cattle in the car were prevented from jumping out and when Helix was reached a temporary door was made and the car went on thru to Seattle. The railroad company will be responsible for the loss of the cattle and efforts are now being made to locate them that they may be sent out in a subsequent shipment.
