EDWARDS ARRESTED

UMATILLA AGENT
IN TROUBLE AT YAKIMA.

Refused to Give Bail, But Was Released on His Own Personal Recognizance—Row Originated in Edwards' Efforts to Secure the Return to the Umatilla Reservation and Agency School of Umatilla Children—Said That Local Yakima Officials Are Greatly Incensed at Edwards.

The following dispatch from North Yakima gives an account of the trouble between Major O. C. Edwards of the Umatilla reservation and the authorities at North Yakima in regard to Umatilla Indians now working in the Yakima hop fields. The dispatch says:

Major O. C. Edwards, agent of the Umatilla Indian reservation in Oregon was arrested here tonight, charged with threatening to handcuff a deputy sheriff of Yakima county. He was brought before Justice of the Peace Taggard, who fixed his bonds at \$100, for his appearance tomorrow. This Edwards refused to furnish, saying he would go to jail first. He was then turned over to the custody of Sheriff Grant, who made the arrest, and he permitted Major Edwards to go on his own recognizance till tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, when the hearing will take place.

The trouble occurred over a difficulty in the hopyards this afternoon. Major Edwards and two other officials of the Umatilla reservation are here after children belonging to the Indian school. There are about 60 of these working in the hopyards of Yakima county who should have returned to school September 1, but who have failed to report.

This afternoon the Umatilla officials went to the hopyards of C. S. Mead and Harry Coonse to get some of the children. The Indians objected to the officials taking their children and came at the Indian authorities with knives and the latter drew their revolvers and threatened to shoot. They also called upon other white men present to assist them.

J. Dodd, foreman of the yard, is a special deputy sheriff, and he demanded of Edwards and others that they show their authority. Dodd claims that they refused to do this, and threatened to handcuff him if he did not aid them in capturing the Indians. They did handcuff some of the Indians.

Because the white men went to the assistance of the officials 150 Indians working in the yard went on a strike and the owners say that if they can not be prevailed upon to return to work a loss of \$7000 to \$8000 may result.

Dodd says that if Major Edwards had shown his authority he would have helped him get the children, but that he absolutely refused to show his credentials. Major Edwards denies that he made any such threats. He says that he took dinner with the deputy sheriff and that they had no trouble.

Local Officials Incensed.

County and city officials are much incensed at the action of the Umatilla authorities. Moses Christensen was the first Umatilla official to come, and without notifying the local authorities he went out in the hopyards and commenced to gather up children to return them to Pendleton. Sunday a big crowd followed him after he had taken two Indians in charge. Chief

Cayou met him and inquired the cause of the disturbance. Cayou says that he could show no badge of authority so he was made to release the children. Christensen immediately wired Major Edwards for instructions, who replied for him to follow out instructions, and get the children, and today Major Edwards arrived in person. The officers here say that he was insolent and arrogant, telling them that he would place them under arrest if they interfered with him or his men while in the performance of his duty. It is these matters that have led up to his arrest.

About 25 Indian children have been gathered up and are quartered under guard at the Davis house. They will be returned to Pendleton in the morning. Only two have escaped. Major Edwards intended to accompany them but his arrest will prevent this.

WARRANT FOR JOHN ANKENY

HE AND A FRIEND WANTED
UNDER OREGON GAME LAW

Accused of Killing Deer Out of Season—Case Very Similar to That Successfully Brought Against Others Last Winter in This County—They Are Under Indictment and Will Be Arrested at Any Time They Show Up Within Jurisdiction of Oregon Game Wardens.

John Ankeny, son of United States Senator Levi Ankeny, of Walla Walla, and Richard McLean, of that city, are now under indictment for having killed deer in this state out of season. Unless they appear and dispose of their cases previously they will be arrested when next found within this state.

The complaint against the two young men was made before District Attorney Phelps today by Otto Turner, deputy game warden, whose official seal seems capable of taking in game violators of both high and low degree.

According to Deputy Turner, he has evidence which shows that young Ankeny and McLean were hunting near Fairbank Springs some time in December or January last year, and while there killed some deer. It was at about the same time several deer were killed out of season by Messrs. Le Grow, Grasty and Pamburn, who were arrested and fined for the same. Whether or not the two Walla Walla men were in the same party is not known, but the case against them is very similar to the one against the men from Athena.

As both Ankeny and McLean are outside the state the warrant against them cannot be served at present. However, it will stand against them and may be used should they ever be found within this county or state. In view of this fact it is presumed both the men will appear in court here in person or by attorney and have their cases disposed of at once. By doing so they would avoid the displeasure of an arrest at some future time.

Mr. McLean is an employee in the office of the water board at Walla Walla.

ATTEMPTED BURGLARY.

Intruders Scared Away by Mrs. Hartman's Investigations.

While Judge G. A. Hartman and the most of his family were attending the fair last night an attempt was made to burglarize the family residence on Water street, tho the fact did not become known until this morning.

During the evening a number of callers were at the Hartman home and shortly after 9 o'clock the last of them left, thus leaving Mrs. Hartman alone until the judge arrived a half hour or more later. In the meantime a noise as of a wire screen being cut was heard by Mrs. Hartman, and she was somewhat alarmed thereby. However, she could not discover where the sound came from.

When Judge Hartman returned he was told of the affair, but regarded it as a needless alarm and no further attention was given the burglar. However, this morning it was discovered that an attempt had evidently been made to enter the house thru one of the windows on the west side. The wire screen covering the same had been torn away, and the noise of the same was doubtless what attracted the attention of Mrs. Hartman. That no further progress was made by the burglars is believed to be due to their becoming frightened away upon learning that the house was not entirely deserted. Had they not heard the sound of Mrs. Hartman's footsteps they would doubtless have broken in thru the window and ransacked the place.

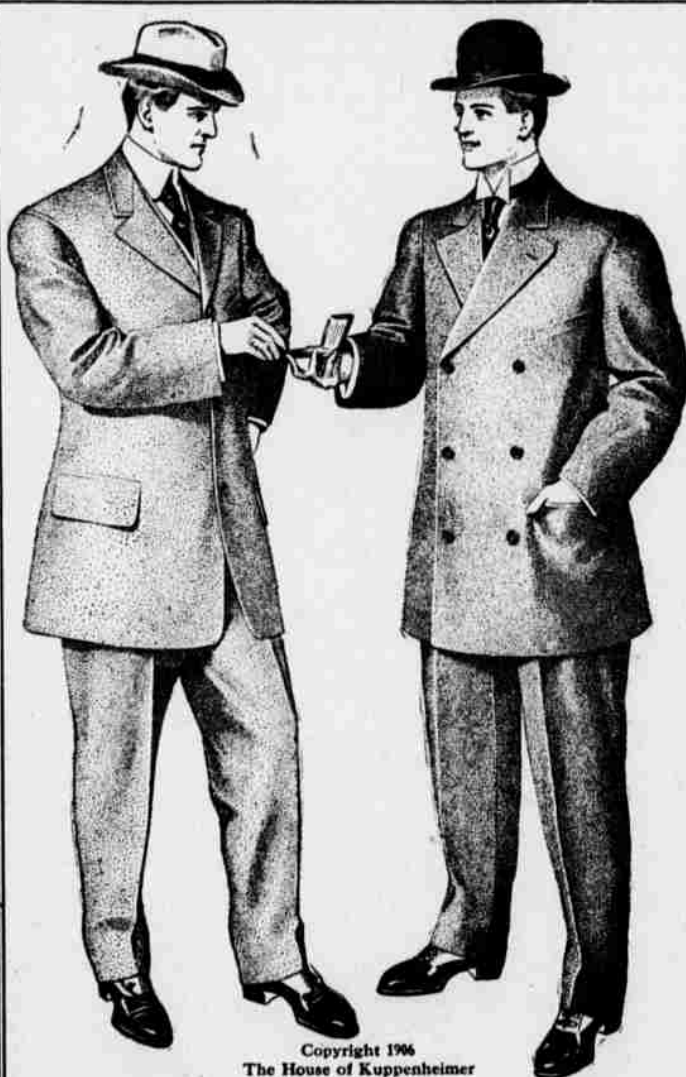
