## Among the Exchanges of the Inland Empire

### Sale of Wallowa Cattle.

Judge and Mrs. Peter O'Sullivan returned Saturday from a visit to their former home in Wallowa county. The judge brings the report that times are lively in all parts of the Wallowa country. One of the contributing causes is the increase in cattle prices. Representatives of the Pacific Meat company are making extensive purchases and there are also buyers from the Walla Walla section who are looking for feeders. The prices range about as follows: Cows, \$21 and \$22; 2-year-old steers, \$24 and \$29. Unlike the practices heretofore, buyers are not so particular about culls, but will accept a round lot at straight figures, although a few in the bunch may not be up to the standard. Wallowa county has an abundance of hay, and consequently the stockmen are in a position to feed, and are not compelled to sell. However, outside demand and competition among buyers are the principal causes for the recent advance in prices.—La Grande Chronicle.

### La Grande Circuit Court Notes.

This morning Judge Eakin passed sentence on the following three who had been convicted. Gonta, the Japanese who attempted to shoot one of his fellow countrymen, was given three years.

Burke, convicted of larceny in a dwelling, one year; and Maroney, alias "Box Car Casey," two years for larceny.

In the case of the state vs. Sharkey, who was charged with wantonly beating a horse, Sharkey was acquitted.

District Attorney Ivanhoe filed a motion to withdraw the indictment against Councilmen Gardiner and Bartlett and to be permitted to later file a new information.

The jury in the case of the state vs. Meyers, charged with assault with intent to kill, brought in a verdict of guilty.—La Grande Observer.

### Big Land Sale.

The carrying out of the objects of the corporation known as the Co-operative Christian association of Portland, is under way.

A few days ago the association bought the farm of John McPherson and son, situated on upper Willow creek, eight miles above Malheur City, consisting of 900 acres for a consideration of \$20,000.

The McPherson place is said to be one of the best reservoir sites in Malheur county and it is the intention of the association to build a mammoth reservoir here to store the water of Willow creek and distribute it by canal on the lands purchased by the association between the reservoir and Ontario, a distance of about 60 miles. The association has options on many thousands of acres and will un-

doubtedly do farming on a very extensive scale in a few years.—Baker City Democrat.

### Strange Find.

A few days ago J. and R. Leggett, brothers, and both young men residing at Ballard's Landing on Snake river, returned from a hunting trip in the Innahua country and relate that on their return home they lost their course for a time and in their wanderings found an old rifle with the barrel bent as if it had been struck on a rock.

The rifle is a Winchester 45-60, and of the model of 1876. Its chambers were empty. Besides this, on the ground where the gun was found were pieces of what seemed to be wearing apparel.

The young men fear that the finding of the gun gives evidence that some hunter or prospector met his death and in giving publicity to the story a mystery might be cleared up.—Baker City Democrat.

N. P. Wallace has returned to Arlington and reports his sheep in good condition. He summered them near Hot Springs in King county, Wash. He says that his band is the only one that ever summered in that county. He was within 60 miles of Seattle. He sold his lambs, 2956 head, to Loid & McKiley of Ellensburg for \$2.85 per head. He delivered them at Hot Springs, near where they were summered. The balance of his band, about 3500 ewes, are on their way to his winter range near Arlington, where they will be bred and wintered.—Arlington Record.
